Dear Ms Dunayevakaya:



We understand, even as we regret, that the New School paper we originally asked for is committed elsewhere. It was kind of you to substitute the University of Illinois transcript, and we enjoyed reading it to learn of the interesting thesis you develop in the Rosa Luxemburg book. But we ordinarily do not print unrevised lecture transcripts, and in this case must respectfully decline the piece. (The MSS will be returned under separate cover.)
