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Resolution on The Worker

Dear Editor:

Whereas, The Worker and the Daily Worker is essential to the work of the Communist Party and its membership in all mass organizations, especially in the union movement, in order to lead the daily class struggles as well to educate for an eventual Socialist America; and,

Whereas, The main contribution of the Communist Party,

and most of the left, has been and should be devoted to work in industry, among the workers in the shops, mills and mines, and their closest allies, the farm workers and the Negro people; and,

Whereas, This aim of concentration, in the Marxist press, The Worker, etc., has for some time been inadequately carried out, with the consequent loss of party and press membership among the workers, over and above the losses caused by the attacks of reaction and the objective economic situation, and,

Whereas, The Worker, in our opinion, as presently made up and published, appeals most powerfully to the more advanced workers and intellectuals, rather than to the mass of the working people! and,

Whereas, A more simply constituted and concise "flyer" (in addition to The Worker) of, say, four pages of news, facts, editorials, and ideas of interest to workers nationwide, and area-wide would help rally the workers behind a progressive program, and more readily bring to them the need for Socialism and the role of the Communist Party;

Therefore, Be it resolved:

That the Third District Communist Party of Indiana go on record as favoring the publication of such a weekly four-page "flyer," geared to the needs of shop-workers, and written in a language they understand.

That the Auto Commission in the Midwest Area be requested to consider the printing of a special Auto "flyer" to help coordinate and organize the movement of the auto workers toward greater economic gains and a more liberal political climate nationally.

That we pledge our support to help The Worker continue publishing this very much needed

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ed Marxist paper, without which the work of the Communist Party, and the Left, would be much harder and less fruitful.

That we ask The Worker to begin publishing such a "flyer" on a national scale as soon as possible.
