A copy of informant's oral report follows.

September 6, 1962

The Provisional Organizing Committee for a Marxist-Leninist Communist Party (POC) Fifth National Conference was held September 1 and 2, 1962, at Estonian Hall, 2061 Lexington Avenue, New York City, with delegates attending from all branches, including Chicago, Cleveland, Philadelphia, New York, and the West Coast.

The main conference report was made by ARMANDO ROMAN, National General Secretary. In a speech of about 31 hours in length, ROMAN analyzed POC activity for the preceding year. He indicated that POC work was progressing satisfactorily and all programs were being carried out. He reiterated the POC stand that Premier KHRUSHCHEV's policy proposes revisionism and that the people of the U.S.S.R. are being taken for a ride by the wrong party down the wrong road. He said the POC stands one hundred per cent for the policy stated and followed by Albania and Communist China. He discussed Latin America and criticized the attitude of the United States toward Latin American countries. He stated that after many years of deception from the United States the people are tired of waiting. He said the U.S. Alliance for Progress has been a failure, as the people do not understand it and are skeptical as under this new program the help is given in the same manner as before. He stated that the time has come and the POC is now trying to establish contacts in Latin Amerof the New York POC and his trip He spoke of to the Dominican Republic which has been very helpful in this has been working with revolutionary forces there and through this has contacted people from other Latin American countries. He said these and other contacts will be of



great value to the POC. He said that following his tour exlier this year of POC branches, he was very optimistic for growth in the POC and a gain in recognition for the POC.

Following ARMANDO ROMAN's speech, the conference convened for lunch.

noon session and the organizational report was given by She discussed the members of the POC who have been controversial during the preceding year. She discussed who stayed in the POC for a short period. She said he was a former/member and believes he was sent to the POC in order to spy and try to infiltrate the POC with revisionist theory. She stated that met with the POC staff three or four times because the staff wanted to know what his aims were. She said he took the opportunity of these meetings in order to bring out the policy of the CP and to try and convince the POC that they have to go along with the CP in order to achieve the aims of both organizations. She said that he found a lot of opposition to this and found it was impossible to change the minds of the POC members.	b
She stated that as he failed on his mission he discontinued his POC activity and went back to the CP. then discussed the teacher, stating that he was petty bourgeoisie and had in his mind ideas which were not in accord with the struggle of the workers. She stated he was a very critical person and criticized the way the POC discusses the political policy of the United States Government. He also disagreed with the POC's criticism of Premier KHRUSHCHEV for trying to bring a new line into the international Communist movement. In discussing KENNETH BRUTON, stated that his attitude toward the leadership of the POC was not friendly and he wanted to impose his own personal criterion conscruing policy. When his position was not accepted he boycotted the POC by not assisting them. She stated that they have attended a number of mass meetings where they had a chance to bring out the policy of the POC and at the same time have unmasked the insincerity and demagogue of the white people who have been engaged in the Negro area. She stated they have been doing a good job in the united front work against police brutality. She indicated she was very sad that while the POC has been doing such good work among the Negroes the POC has no Negroes there to work with them in Chicago.
of Philadelphia said that in the field of Negro work they have been able to do a very good job, especially working together with the Equal Justice Committee. She said they have grown in numbers and they are very optomistic that in the coming year they will be able to make out of the

of New York gave a report on the work done by the Puerto Rican Committee to Defend the Cuban Revolu-He stated that this committee was first organized under the temporary presidency of ANTONIO RIVAS but little work was done. He said that after the July 26 Movement was removed from **b6** b7C

the political scene in New York City, the committee was under Since this time as President. the leadership of the committee has been doing everything possible in order to support the Cuban revolution. He stated that some indoor meetings have been held, contacts have been made and leaflets distributed. He stated that he felt even this had not been enough because the committee has not been able to rally round it those forces who can be capable of organizing a real mass movement to back the Cuban revolution. He stated that the Trotskyites and the members of the CP, disguised as various committees, have been using the Cuban revolution. He stated that these people, while saying they are for the Cuban revolution are actually trying to demoralize and antagonize the workers and those who sympathize the Cuban cause. He called on the conference to give this committee its full support in order that the work can be done in the right way. of New York started her report by saying that she was very happy to be back in New York after being in Puerto Rico. She stated her trip there could not be called a pleasure trip because the only things she did there was to engage herself in contacting people whose names and b7C addresses were given to her by persons with whom she is friendly. 

She indicated however, that the POC is now studying to find out a way in which they can push these leaders into turning their doubletalk into action. She stated that when she returns to the West Coast she will be able to give a good report on the conference because she has been impressed with the sincerity, the unity and the willingness to work that exists among the delegates from the different areas at the conference.

an invited guest, stated it was with great satisfaction that he received the invitation to attend the POC Conference because he sees in the POC an organization which turns into action what the leaders of the organization preach. He said that before he had the pleasure of meeting the POC leadership he did not realize how many mistakes, politically and organizationally, he had been making. He stated that by meeting ARMANDO ROMAN he has learned in such a short time more than he learned during his previous political career. stated that he wanted to say that the teaching and cooperation given him by the POC's great leader, ARMANDO ROMAN, has resulted in the creation of a real fighting organization as it is today, He stated that he has been criticized for being so the MLPR. close to a Communist group but that he feels the criticism comes from those who are not able to realize that the progress made by the MLPR has been as a result of the counseling received from ARMANDO ROMAN.

ARMANDO ROMAN then explained to the conference why a member of the National Committee during the previous year, was not being recommended at this time. ROMAN stated that during the past year became so imbued in his personal approach to things and has taken a negative trend in attitude toward working in accord with the collective group. ROMAN explained that before anyone votes he wanted to make it clear that the POC was an organization that was opposed to any kind of hypocrisy. He stated that no one in the POC was going to hold a position for any long period because this creates in the individual the belief that he owns the organization or the position. ROMAN stated he has been General Secretary of the organization for five years, that when he accepted this position it was during the founding caucus, because at that time he thought and those with him thought that he was the most experienced in this type of organizational work. He said that he was not going to retire but would probably do more work than before but it is necessary that we keep on developing our comrades and give them the chance of promoting themselves in order that no one in the POC thinks he is the only one that can hold important positions. He stated that in order to give young blood, an active and healthy leader and one who has proved himself able, the presiding committee was recommending as the new General Secretary of the POC. ROMAN nat with this recommendation he wanted to point out that not only is accepting many sacrifices, but the first sacrifice is that he will be compelled to move to New York no matter how hard he may find this to do, as New York is the center of POC activity.
