

DAILY WORKER HIT BY U. S. REDS' LEADER

Eugene Dennis, leader of the Communist party in the United States, has criticized The Daily Worker, Communist newspaper here, for its recent position on Hungary.

In a letter published in The Worker yesterday, Mr. Dennis declared it was wrong in saying editorially that the use of the Soviet Army in Hungary "does not advance but retards the development of socialism." Mr. Dennis said that "the opposite was and is the case."

He accused The Daily Worker of having tried in its editorial Nov. 5 to equate the Soviet action in Hungary with "the imperialist aggression against Egypt." On this "comment is really superfluous for those who have a Marxist, scientific, working-class outlook," Mr. Dennis wrote.

OSLO, Norway, Nov. 12 (UP) —Norway's Communist party openly criticized today the Soviet move in Hungary.

The party sent a statement to the Communist parties of the Soviet Union, Hungary and other countries expressing its "worry and concern."

"The Norwegian Communist party believes each nation should decide its own future," the statement said. "The problems of a people cannot be solved by foreign troops."
