WHITE FOREMAN KILLED AFTER RACIST INSULT AT FORD'S

A WHITE FOREMAN in the Ford Rouge Plant was found dead Monday, Jan. 29, after he had walked into lunchroom during a lunch break and shouted, "You niggers just don't know how to work." A reliable source informed ICV that the letand shouted, "You niggers just don't know how to work." A reliable source informed ICV that the letters B.P. had been written on his forehead. The source also said that the Ford Motor Company allowed the Dearborn police to come in and line up and search all the black workers who had come in and line up and search all the black workers who had been present when the foreman made his racisj remark. This was in violation of Ford's long standing policy of allowing the plant security guards to take care of all trouble on company grounds. The black workers were lined up and told that they had to stand while an investigation was conducted. A committeeman was called, however, and the racist Dearborn cops were removed from the scene.

Apparently no evidence was found and no charges were filed.

There was no mention of the incident in he white controlled news media, and apparently an attempt

comes as no surprise to anyone farmiliar with the conditions which black workers must face day after day in the Auto plants in and around Detroit. Work loads increase al-most daily, while the plant super-vision harrasses black workers often with openly racist barbs. The stage is being set for a general confrontation between black workers and the racist company manage-ment, and events at Ford indicate that the coming confrontation will indeed be quite bloody.

Wayne Persecutes Black Student

On January 11, 1968, Robert Higgins, a black Wayne State University student, go into an argumen with some staff members of the student newspaper, the SOUTH END. Higgins, a staff member of the paper himself had had differences with the SOUTH END over some abuses and insults he had experienced from the newspaper.

Some property was damaged dur-

ing yhe argument.
The SOUTH END editor, Art Johnston and Higgins settled their im-mediate dispute with the understand-ing that the SOUTH END would not consciously or unconsci abuse any Black man. Johnston recognized that the paper had been wrong on points, and chalked it up to experience as a fruitful dialouge from which he, as a sup-porter of Black Power, had learned. The matter was settled there.

A WHITE STORE OWNER ON GRAND RIVER called a west side black woman a black bitch and subjected her to a tirade of abusive and profane language for no apparent reason. Mrs. Verdice Murray, a black grandmother who lives in the Grand River Dumbarton area was subjected to this abusive treatment in Andy's Meat Market on

One day, after having shopped in Andy's for several months, Mrs. Murray entered the market and found that the clerk didn't seem to be in too good spirit. She began her usual conversation with the clerk and found him unresponsive. When she asked the clerk what was the matter the owner entered the conversation and advised her that it was none of her business. He further told her that she didn't have to come into his store and proceeded to call her a number of names. to come into his store and proceeded to call her a number of names and topped it off by calling her a "black Bitch." MURDERS IN ARKANSAS

The recent expose regarding unmarked graves at Cummins Prison Farm in Arkansas, and the testimony of Rueben Johnson, an inmate, that he helped bury a dozen or so peisoners, has spurred a change of heart among some Negores who had denounced H. Rap Brown's report on U.S. Concentration Camps. One prominent Negro told the Voice that he is now inclined to believe there is some merit to Brown's charges that the white power structure is perparing concentration camps and planning other acts of genocide for Black People.

"We so-called safe Negroes can't keep turning a deaf ear on those we view as radical black nationalists when we see factual situations revealed such as the slaughter of inmates at Cummins Prison, starvation of Negroes in the Deltas of Mississippi, and many others," he

Johnson, an 30 year convict, age 5, who took prison officials to the unmarked graveyard, said there are maybe 2000 inmates buried there. He said the murdered prisoners were put on the escape list.

The investigation reportedly started by Prison Supr. Thomas O. Murton has turned up several skeletons, one that was beheaded and a skull which was bashed in.


A move is on to stop publication of Detroit's Revolutionary newspaper, The Inner City Voice. a white named Edwin J. Donnan, of east Detroit sent letters to membdrs of the state senate, legislature, Governor, Lt. Governor and other state officials. Donnan, moreover, petitioned the Michigan Civil Rights Commission to stop the Voice from violating his civil rights. Donnan wanted the MCRC to investigate ICV. The MCRC took up the matter at its Detroit meeting in January and decided that ICV was protected from governmental circumspection by the First Amendment (Ha), and that the injury complained of does not fall within the commissions jurisdiction. Donnan's main criticisms were:

1. We must have law and order. Without effective police protection, our cities will become a battle-ground reminiscent of the 'wild west days' when lawlessness prevailed and people carried pistols on their nips. The trend is beginning in Detroit now. Decent citizens of both aces are afraid to walk the streets ifter dark.

2. A handful of Black, Power extrensists through the Inner City Voice are preaching hatred and disrespect for the policemen; propose violence and revolution (page 7, Col. 2 and page 8, Col. 4). The intent of this paper is clearly recognized—tokeep alight the fires of agitation and militant action with the purpose of undermining the basic foundation of our society.

Since September 18, 1967, H. Rap Brown, Chairman of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, has been a political prisoner in New York City, forbidden to travel by a court order, which, if disobeyed, would result in the forfeiture of \$15,000 bond and Brown's imprisonment. This tactic of PREVENTIVE ARREST is being tested by the Federal Government as a way of dealing with those whose opinions they do not like. It is the same tactic used in a cruder form in the Union of South Africa under the name of "HOUSE ARREST". Whether it is called "house arrest" or preventive arrest," the result of the two is the dealer. an individual's movements are restricted to a proscribed area for an indefinite period.

Upon examining the facts in the caso of H. Rap Brown it has become clear that the conscious intent was not to jail Brown. on various false charges, but simply make it impossible to travel around the country to speak. This would hurt not only Brown, but the organization for which he is Chairman and principal spokesman. Thus, by moving quietly and through the courts, the Government hoped to stop Brown and SNCC

without creating a public outcry.

The facts in the case of H. Rap Brown are simple. On July 24,1967, Brown spike in Cambridge, Maryland. He left the city the same evening on his way to Washington D.C. A while after he had left Cambridge, the Pine Street Elementary School, which has a history of being burned, was burned again. The neat day the State Attorney of Maryland issued a warrent for the arrest of Brown, charging him with inciting the people to burn the school. Later the same day the Federal Government warrent was issued for the arrest of Rap, this one charging him with leaving the state of Maryland to avoid ar est on the first charge. The Federal charge made him, of course, a fugitive from justice.

Brown learned of the warrents for his ar est, and, on the following day, arranged through his attorneys to turn himself in to the F.B.I. in New York. On July 26, Brown was leaving Washington D.C. for New York to turn himself in, when he was arrested by police at Washington National Airport and impartised. port and immediately turned over to the F.B.I. The F.B.I. was fully cognizant of where Brown was going and for what purpose, but they chose to b abrogate the agreement that had

He was taken to a detention cell in the U.S. Post POffice Building in Alexandria, Virginia, held for six hours and then released. The Federal government had decided to drop the charges of "flight from prosecution" against him. However, when Brown walked out of the Post Office Building with "flight from prosecution" under Virginia law. The Federal Government had vowed out to let the state government do the same work knowing that in a Southern court there do the same work, knowing that in a Southern court, there

was much less chance for Brown to receive a fair hearing than in Federal Court.

He was taken to the city jail in Alexandria, Va., and after some time was released on \$10,000 bond. Then, the Governor of Maryland asked the Governor of Virginia to extradite Brown to stand trial on the school-burning charge. The Governor of Virginia honored this request, Brown was once again in jail, but his return to Maryland was preventhrough legal action taken by his attorneys. On September 18, 1967, Brown was released from jail on yet another 10,000 bail on the condition that he would not leave the eleven counties of the Southern District of New York, except to travel to consult with one of his attorneys.

Shortly thereafter, Brown was once again arrested on a charge of carrying a weapon while under indictment, was jailed in New York City and released on \$15,000 bond. The restriction on Brown's right to travel was appealed to the Chief Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court who turned down the 'appeal

It is clear that if H. Rap Brown is going to be released from his "jail" in New York, it will only be because of pressure put on the Federal Government.

This is an important case, because if the Federal Government succeeds in keeping H. Rap Brown "jailed", overnight militants will find themselves arrested on false charges and released, with the condition that their movements be Black liberation fighter form Harlem, in 1964, when he was arrested on charges of inciting o riot during the Harlem rebellions of that summer. Birth of a Nation THE INTERNATIONAL

James Boggs

What is the International Or what are the relations of the movement beyond its national boundries This is a question always in the background of any nation or group inside a naion struggling against oppression, whether the struggle if for liberation from colonialism and imperialism or an internal civil war or a working class struggle over working conditions.

When the question of "The Internationsl" arose in the early days of the civil rights movement, it was usually evaded by the leaders even though there was an inplicit recognition of some relationship with the struggles of the African peoples for delf government. The question was shunted aside mainly because the civil rights movement had as its essential perspective the achievement of some common rights within the country, rights that had hitherto been denied to black people. If these rights could be obtained, the movement, implied the system could go right on its merry way exploiting the rest of the world. Implicit also was the belief that the issues involved in

It was only after some very painful exposure to white morality that the movement began to realize that black people in the United States are in fact a part of the world inderclass which has been system-atically deprived of development by these same people of high morality and high civilization called Western.

At this juncture the possibility of taking the issues before the United Nations began to creep into the minds of some leaders. Any serious leader, however, was quick to realize that the UN would be powerless in relation to these issues as the old League of Nations had as the old League of nations had been to Ethiopia at the time of the Italian invasion and as it has been on every issue involving the vio-lation of the sovereignty of small nations that has come before it since its formation. For how can this be an international body whon the largest sovereign nation in to-'day's world is not even in this body (China)

The history of international relationships in the struggle of revolutionary forces can best be clarified by recognizing that the need for an international always arises most urgently at the time of significant changes in the direction of an old society and the emergence of a new. The International as a movement or an organization emerges from and centers around the highest stage of social development which has been realized at a given time in history by oppressed peoples or classes. In 1889 the Second International was created out of the growing socialist consciousness of the Western European working class and particularly its recognition of the need to organize unskilled workers and of the permanent antagonism between capital and labor. The German Social Democracy was the model for the Second International. Then the imperialist rivalries between the Western powers brought on the First World War and the working class in each country sacrificed international solidarity to the defense of the fatherland and the benefits which the fatherland had been able to dispense to the workers at home on the basis of imperialist exploitation in the colonies. The Second International collapsed, creating a vacuum to be filled by a new international which would wmbody a still higher stage of revolutionary social development.
The Third International was born

of the first workers state created by the Revolution in Russia, a country which was Western and with a relatively advanced working class. yet at the same time backward and with a majority peasant population. sants could actually seize power, the ruling class in the midst one end of the world to the other. Not only advanced workers and sophisticated intellectuals in Europe and America began to liik to the workers state in Russia for the-oretical and political guidance and support, Nationalist students and intellectuals in remote India and China and a Black Nationalist like Marcus Garvey in the United States saw in the Russian Revolution the signal for a deathblow to Western domination over Africa

and Asia. Since the new International, unlike the first two Internationals, had been born out of a successful revolution and the creation of an actually existing workers state, the International now began to embody not only the idea of workers solidarity in socialist revolution across national boundaries but also the idea of allegiance to socialist fatherland, requiring defense against the capitalist counter-revolution from the other Western powers as well as support in the construction of a socialist economy. Thus the question of how to combine loyalty to a successful revoltion with the continued world revolutionary offensive was built into the Third International and continues to remain a fundamenta issue to this day.

It is obvious that the world black revolution, embarked on a world-wide revolt against Western imper-ialism and colonialism and the workers in these countries who have profited from Western imperialism and colonialism, cannot look to the Internationals which have been founded by and for these same workers. The black people who have been systematically deprived of their development by the peoples of the ddvanced countries cannot co-exist in the same International with those for whom colonialism is a normal part of their lives.

The question of what then constitutes the International today is a very complex one. If the International is to be centered around or emerge from the highest stage development of the colonial peopies in their struggle against colonialism and to build a new society, then the center of he International is now undoubtedly China. At the

States have a role in creating the new International which, for exam-, far exceeds that of the American Communist Party during the heyday of the Third International. To many black revolutionists in America, the independence of Ghana was the clarion call for a new black solidarity. This was not so much because of what Ghana achieved but because it was the first African nation to achieve independence and because Kwame Nkrumah, the leader of the movement in Ghana, was conscious of the need, for political theory and a perspective of Pan-African Socialism. But Ghana could not remain a center for the International. It lacked the material resources for combating neo-colonialisn and during the atruggle for independence it had not mobilized forces sufficiently to drive the revolution forward and compel a confrontation with world imperialism. This is not a critism of what Ghana did. It is very possible that there was no alternative, Nevertheless the factfac remains that Ghana cannot be a center for the International.

The new International for the world black revolution has been in the process of birth ever since the Bandung Conference of 1954 when the people of color kame together for the first time with a recognition that they had a specific revolutionary role to play in the world. But since the vast majority of the Bandung nations were more anxious to be neutralists than revolutionists in the conflict between Russia and the United States, they could not be the nucleus of the new International. Insteat they became vulnerable to the fragmentation by the counter-revolution in the form of neo-colonialism and foreign aid, Up to now the highest form so far achieved by the international movement was the Havana Conference of 1967 which not only rejected neutralism but also peaceful co-existence with the counter-revolution and instead made it the explicit duty of the revolutionist to make revolution against the counter-revolution. Therefore today when one thinks of joining the Interna-tional, one has to start with the theoretical concept of the world revolutionary offensive against the world counter-revolution and not with the concept of defense of any particular fatherland, socialist or not. One must be imbued not only with the concept of struggle against an enemy, but with the concept of victory over the enemy. One must be determined not only to destroy the old social order but to construct a new social order based on new truths, new values and new institutions.

The struggle being carried on by the National Liberation Front in Vietnam today contains the ingredients which any revolutionary movement must have before it can seriously relate itself to the International. Chief among these are: 1. The perspective of victory; 2. a concept of the institutions and values upon which the revolutionary forces intend to reconstruct society after they achieve victory; 3 a clear concept of the apecific issues which will have to be resolved in order to unite all the forces in the country; 4. a conscious political cadre or vanguard, organized, disciplined and ideologically clear rather than just emotionally fired up, and able on the basis of its clarity to educate and discipline others.



PRISON

Le Roi Jones is poet laureate of black America, and like the poet laureates of Greece, he must now go to prison for his poetry. On January 4, 1968, Judge Leon Kapp sentenced Jones to 2-3 years in the state penitentiary and a \$1,000 fine. The sentence came as a result of a verdict by an all-white jury in which Jones was found guilty of possessing two two revolvers during the Newark Insurrection of 1 67. The court had been flooded with letters and telegrams from American writers asking for a suspended or light sentence. The Judge reacted by giving what is virtually the maximum sentence

possible with no possible probation.

Judge Kapp said one could "suspect" the 34 year old poet-playwright was a "participant in formulating a plot" to burn Newark on the night he was arrested", a charge not even made by the police.

Jones 'two co-defendants were given shorter terms and smaller than the court and two black on-

fines. A tense atmosphere shrouded the court, and two black on-

lookers were ejected.

The extraordinary nature of the case was highlighted when when

the judge read to the court and jury one of Jones' poems which had appeared in December's EVERGREEN REVIEW, a slick avant-garde monthly. He read the poem in its entirety, substituting the work BLANK for what he termed obscenities. The poem is add-

Jones listened to the poem with a comtempt for the Judge writter on his face. He wore a striped African tunic and a small red cap. Jones interrupted the Judge several times during the sentencing statement. The Judge said, "You are sick and require medical attention." Jones replied, "Not as sick as you are." Later he added, "You are not a righteous person, and you don't represent Almighty God. You represent a crumbling structure. "Sit down" shouted the Judge, waving his gavel like a weapon.

Tones' lawyers satared that they will appeal the verdict and sen-

Jones' lawyers satated that they will appeal the verdict and sentence to the Appelate Division of the New Jersey State Supreme Court. Jones made his appeal in a different manner. As he was being led from the courtroom, he called back over his shoulder, "The black people will judge me."

The notorious Federal Bureau of Investigation, renoun enemy of the Black Revolution has apparently launched an attack designed to prevent further publication of the Inner City Voice. FBI agen's recently visited the Keystone Printing Company, on Tireman, where the INNER CITY VOICE was originally printed. The agents demanded to know why Keystone was printing subversive and seditious literature like the INNER CITY VOICE. This is, of course, a direct governmental violation of the first amendment.

As a result of threats from the FBI, and pressure from conservatives who hold contracts with Keystone (THE MICHIGAN CATHOLIC), the printing company refused to print any more editions of the VOICE. Fortunately the VOICE was able to find another printer for this

It is also suspected that Keystone, part of the company that prints the CHRONICLE and Waymon Dunn's COMMUNITY NEWS, both reactionary, counterrevolutionary Negro papers, doesn't like the VOICE any more than the FBI does. They had made some intolerable printing

errors on previous editions.

The FBI is well known for its right wing and racist sentiments. For years they have carried on campaigns of personal harrassment against organizations or individuals who dare to move against white

racism, exploitation and oppression.
The INNER CITY VOICE has had its phone tapped, and agents have questioned various people affiliated with the paper through personal and business ties.

The FBI's greatest weapon is fear. They know that simply being questioned by an FBI agent will scare the average person out of his wits. But the day when black people get scared stiff because somebody flashes a badge has passed; the VOICE, and the revolution will continue to move forward regardless of harrassment, investigation or disapproval by the power structure. Increased activity by the FBI has raised some speculation on the moves the power structure is planning for Detroit. Over the last year, various areas of the country have been centers of outrageous frame ups. Philadelphia, in particular, has become a virtual police

On the evening of January 2, 1968, the jailer of the Tierra Amarilla, New Mexico Courthous disappeared and was found beaten to death the next morning. Eulogio Salazar (the jailer) had been a key witness for the State of New Mexico against Reies Tijerina and his land grant movement (Alianza Federal, now called Alliance of Free City States.)

Attorney Sanchez was quoted, I told Judge Angel this would happen if he let them out on bond." Judge Angel of the 1st District Court in New Mexico said: "This is an Alianza killing."

The State and the courts violated the rights of the Alianza members broadcasting these kind judiced statements over the radio, T.v, and press. Under these circumstances it is virtually impossible for Alianza members to receive a fair trial on the Tierra Amarilla "raid" case. There are other equally plausable

motives for the murder of Sanazar. He was not well liked nor known for a gen le demeanor in the discharging of his linies as a jailor. For example, two weeks ago four men escaped from the Tierra Amarilla jail, upon their recapture, three were badly beaten by Sala-

Tijerina and all those picked up on Jan. 3 were picked up with no warrants, no court orders of any kind. These pick-ups amount to

on their jobs and subsequently fired. Some were picked up on their backwoods, isolated mountain farms, leaving their wives and children without provision.

Judge Angel signed the petition for revocation of bond (after all had been picked up) without hearing to show that any sonditions of bond had been broken. Bond cannot be revoked in a lawful court without proof that its conditions have been

Their arraignment and charging took place without counsel (after the police rode them around for three hours with questions like "Why did you and statements like "We're going to pistol whip you and shoot you down like dogs.")

The only evidence against the two was "This is an Alianza killing, and you are the top Alianza officials in the area." Martinea lives in Tierra Amarilla. They had air tight alibis concerning their whereabouts. Two reporters even agreed to sign a statement for the D.A. saying the saw them both leaving a restaurant at 9:00pm that evening in Santa Fe (Tierra Amarilla is 150 miles away and the murder was committed between 8:30 and 0:00p.m.) The reporters had to give their reports to their newspaper because the D.A. wasn't accepting anu slibis that day. He was too ousy trying to limk them with the murder. Reporters have also testified that both Cris Tijerina and Felix Martinez were attending a political rally in Santa Fe the night of the murder.

TO HELL ITH PROTEST

WASHINGTON, D. C., LNS) -- Federal Bureau of Investigation anti-subversives agents say they plan to "investigate" a statement by a SNCC field worker that black people should spit on Lyndor Johnson, overturn his car, and make him afraid to leave the White

The assertion was made by Julies Lester in the September - October SNCC Newsletter, published in Atlanta. The FBI investigation was publicly announced to the press as a New Year's send-off. Lester's article follows.

GROTESQUE WEAPON WASHINGTON


Washington, D.C. (LNS) The pentagon has come up with a grotesque new weapon, artillery shotgun shells that spray thousands of dart-shaped steel shafts over

broad areas of jungle or open territory.

"I've seen reports of snsmy soldiers actually being nailed to trees by these things," one officer was quoted as saying in a dispatch by the Associated Press.

The artillery shells are in use in Vietnam where they were first sent on an experimental test basis but are expected to become standard ammunition. AP says: "The round is fired into the air by a propelling charge, then exploses in flight, projecting thousands of shafts especially made to fly nose-first . A fuse on the projectile allows commanders to see the distance at which the dart package bursts. Each shaft weights eight frains. The entire round weights 38 pounds and is slightly over 34 inches long. Its fuse begins ticking 'away as the projectile spins out the artillery tube."

The Washington Ethical Society held a press conference today to denounce the new 'atrocity' weapon. Monroe Freeman, law professor at George Washington University, spoke for the Society when he said "We have invented a new crucifixion, American style."



Since many of the young brothers who read this newspaper and this for your consideration some of the alternatives to combat duty within the Selective Service Act. There is a growing number of young Ameri-cans who have a strong sense of loyality to their country, bu ahose consciences cannot support our country's military policy in regard to the Viet Nam war.

The United States Congress esta-

blished the Selective Service System as a meehod to promote man power for the defense of this nation. Under the Selective Service Act, every young man must, within five days of his eighteenth birthday, "present himself for and submit to registration." Several weeks after registration, the young man receives a Classification Questionaire - the SSS Form 100. After this form has been filled out and returned, the person will be classing fied and receive a notice of classification.

There are many young men, black and white, of draft age who in clear conscience cannot fight in Viet For such a person there are several alternatives. However, befor I mention some of these alternatives I must point out the fact that these alternatives are extremely hard to come by for black men. About the only alternatives a black man really has under the practices of the presen system is either combat duty or prison as a draft resister. Nevertheless, there are alternatives to active duty. If black men, through conscience, cannot fight in Viet Nam they should first of all seek to work through the channels provided in the Selective Service Act. Exemptions will be difficult to receive. The 'man" will try every trick in the book to discourage a person from seeking an alternative to combat duty. Therefore, a person must know what he wants and persevere to see it through. If a person is denied the classification he desires, he has a right of personal appearance and appeal before his local draft board. If one has already returned Form 100 and has been classified, but since has reach-

WORKERS ABUSED

Mike Nance and myself turned ourselves in to the "forces of law and order" with our attorney, O. Lee Mollette at 8:45 a.m. Thurslay morning, Feb. 1, 1.68.

We were interviewed and finger-printed, and all three of us were informed that Nance and myself would be arrainged that day before noon. However, we were not arraigned until 26 hours later

Between the time out attorney left and the time we appeared before judge Colombo, we were constantly harrassed and intimidated by the reactionary cops. We were denied the constitutional right to make a phone call, until quite late at night. 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


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
