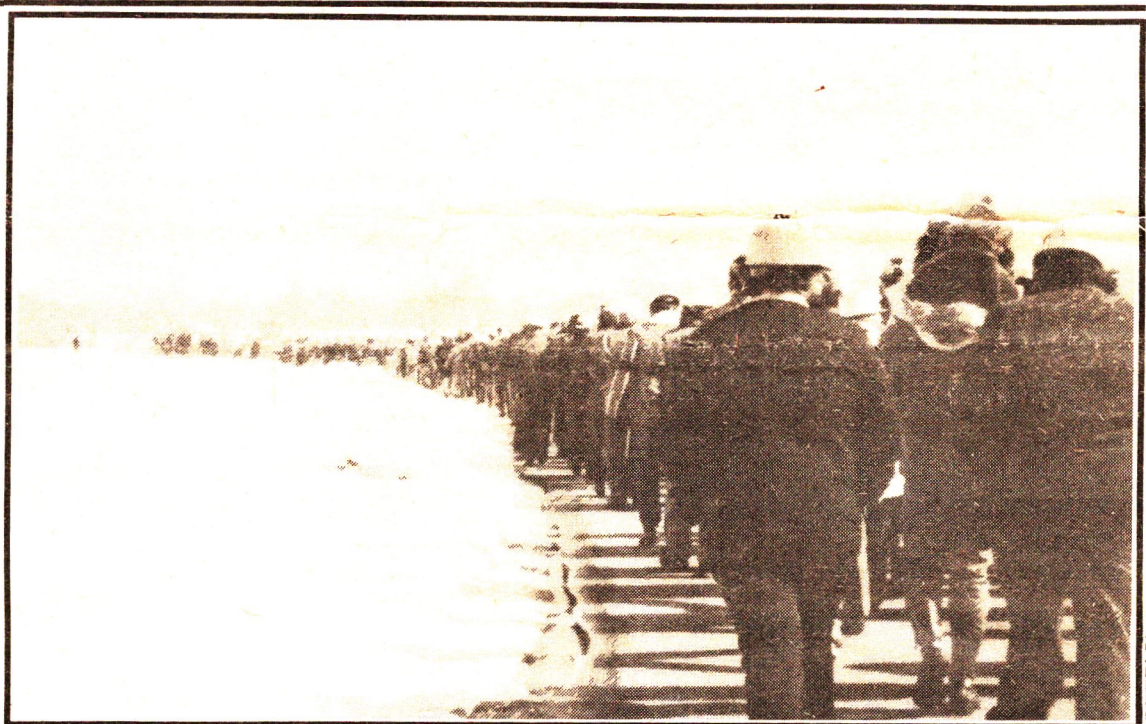

Carter Threatens Armed Take-Over in Coalfields

Miners Battle to Defend Basic Rights of All Workers



Indiana miners and their families march in memory of murdered brother John Hull. The 12-week old coal strike, more than any recent struggle, indicates that miners are rejecting the treachery of the UMWA bureaucrats. Despite the full wrath of the capitalist class, miners are militantly opposing attacks on their health, safety, and right to strike. This battle is a crucial test for the entire working class.

Stand with the Miners!

On February 25, President Carter announced a tentative agreement between the UMWA and the Bituminous Coal Operators' Association (BCOA) to end the 12-week old coal strike. Both Carter and UMWA President Arnold Miller urged rank and file miners to ratify the pact quickly. Carter backed up his appeal with the threat of legal and/or military action against the miners if they don't accept the agreement.

The proposed agreement stands everything on its head. It doesn't meet the demands of the miners. Both Carter and Miller have made much of the 37% wage increase and other economic benefits the agreement offers. But the miners' strike is not and never was primarily over wages. The miners demand full restoration of their

health and retirement benefits financed by the companies instead of by production royalties. They demand the right to strike over local issues and they demand higher wages. The massive wildcats of the last three years were sparked precisely by the cumbersome grievance procedure instituted in the 1974 contract and the companies' suspension of health and pension payments.

In contrast, the proposed agreement includes provisions to ban local strikes, suspend and fine the leadership of wildcats, and require miners—for the first time in 30 years—to pay part of their hospital, doctor and prescription costs. Meanwhile, Carter has promised to set up a commission to "find answers to" the problems of health, safety and "stable productivity."

Miller refused to go to the coalfields himself to muster support

for ratification. He knows his number is up among the rank and file and he's afraid he might never get back to Washington alive. He sent the Bargaining Council and the regional and district officers out to convince the miners and threatened the union officials to "do their jobs" or "face the wrath of the international officers and the UMW International Executive Board."

But the miners are standing firm in the face of the most vicious attack the working class has suffered in years. They have consistently made it clear they intend to stay out as long as it takes to get what they need. Miners have been murdered in this struggle. Thousands more will die in cave-ins, explosions and accidents if the strike is broken. Still others will suffer and die with the gnawing agony of Black Lung. This is common knowledge in mining

towns, where the experience of past battles unites miners to fight for their rights, their lives and the future.

In September, Miller promised the miners "We will do everything in our power to negotiate a contract you will be glad to ratify..." But this contract shows when Miller acts, it is only to surrender more workers' rights. He has bargained away the right to strike, to safe and healthy working conditions, and to a fair wage, after having already sabotaged the miners' urgent need to be organized into one industry-wide union.

As a result, miners have demonstrated and petitioned, demanding that Miller resign. Tens of thousands of signatures have been gathered, demanding an immediate election for new union leadership.

Meanwhile, the strike is slowly bringing the U.S. economy to a

standstill. With each passing day, the strike threatens to close down every other major industry. Steel, auto and rubber have already been gun to layoff.

The determination of the miners, their refusal to be "disciplined" by the bourgeoisie, is throwing a wrench in the bourgeoisie's plans to expand coal production by two-thirds by 1985.

The capitalists are getting desperate. They know that their normal recourse, the Taft Hartley Act will have little impact in stopping the strike. In fact, it has failed three times in past coal strikes. To crush the strike the bourgeoisie knows it will have to rely on armed might.

Troops have been used in the coalfields before to break strikes and protect scabs. The bourgeoisie will attempt to use them again. National Guardsmen are already being used to escort scab coal.

Stand with the Miners at Front Line of Struggle

The capitalists are preparing to intensify their full scale attack on a major section of the working class, the striking coal miners. There is an immediate danger of the coal fields being turned into a bloody battlefield if the miners reject this contract.

The miners have no choice, they must reject this latest sell-out. To work under such a contract would lead to sure death for many miners in the years to come (See Coal Strike article page 1.)

The capitalists know they must break this strike. They know the miners' example of militant resistance challenges their rule. This strike, more than any other recent struggle, shows that miners are rejecting the treacherous class collaborationist policies of the trade union bureaucrats, and militantly opposing the increasing attacks of the capitalists. The capitalists know if they are able to crush this leading section of the workers movement, then they will be in a better position to increase their assaults on all other workers. Steelworkers, autoworkers, rubber workers, meat packers - all workers will suffer if the miners are defeated. This is why the capitalists want to crush the miners' strike. This is why the entire working class must come forward and militantly defend these class brothers and sisters.

The coal strike represents a real threat to the capitalist class. It brings home the reality that it is the working class who produces all the wealth in the country, and despite all the modern technology and armed might of the capitalists, they can do nothing without us. It confirms in the minds of workers across the country the knowledge that with the correct leadership and organization, we will have the ability to bring this rotten system of wage slavery to its knees.

This is a class war. It is not just a struggle between the miners and Peabody Coal or U.S. Steel. It is a battle between the entire capitalist class and the entire working class.

We refuse to allow the capitalists to use their age old ploy of dividing our ranks. We will not allow threats of layoffs or power cut backs to turn us against the miners.

The demands of the miners are many of the

same demands of the entire working class. All workers must support other workers who are fighting for better working conditions, the right to have adequate numbers of elected safety committeemen and the right to strike.

We all must demand a contract which meets the demands of the miners. We must oppose troops in the coal fields whether it is to mine the coal or to protect scab miners. We demand an end to troops escorting scab coal trucks.

In every union and shop in this country, workers must mobilize to come out in full support of the striking miners. We must close our ranks around them and come to their immediate defense.

We must let the capitalists know - if they send troops into the coal mines and attempt to break the miners' strike, they will face the full wrath of the entire working class.

We need a strong international that will back the locals, but we'll have to get rid of the present international bureaucratic scum that don't do anything for us. The way it is now, it is easy for the companies to control the union.

We see clearly the need for "new types" of organization not only at the union local, but right here on the shop floor.

We look forward to future issues of UNITE! and other genuinely communist literature to help facilitate our struggle.

Women's Demands Raised at District 31 USWA Conference

Dear Comrades,

Recently we attended the first Women's Conference of District 31 of the United Steel Workers of America (USWA). It was exciting to see close to 200 women from mills small and large throughout the District gathered together in multi-national unity to really discuss the special problems of women in steel. However, it was nonetheless clear that this was just another example of tokenism, serving only to build the prestige of District Director James Balanoff, a crony of Ed Sadlowski.

The union, not surprisingly, put forward the line that the solution to women's problems and all problems in the mill is to become

active in your local union. The various opportunist and revisionist forces at the Conference, spearheaded by the class collaborationist Communist Party USA, were hardly better, advocating reform through congressional legislation. In addition, the CPUSA was also the main proponent of the creation of advisory Women's Commissions throughout the union structure. These Commissions would have no actual power, and would serve merely as a means for the CPUSA to entrench itself in the union. This would allow them to take over the union leadership for their own benefit.

But the growing level of class struggle and women steelworkers' understanding that the current union structure and bureaucracy are not the answer to women's oppression in the mills is clear. There was sharp struggle over the questions of federal funding for childcare, ending the probation period, the right to ratify the contract and the right to strike. And the revisionist CPUSA's resolution on the creation of Women's Commissions was progressively amended to call for the establishment of Women's Committees in all locals, committees with the same contractual status and rights to bargain with management as the existing Civil Rights committees.

We strongly support the establishment of strong Women's Committees in the local unions that are officially recognized and controlled by the rank and file, with democratically elected leadership. These committees must fight not only for all questions concerning the special oppression and special needs of women workers, but should also take an active role in the struggles for greater union democracy, the right to ratify, the right to strike, and ultimately, in fighting for real working class control of the union. Without these rights any hope of achieving the demands of women in the USWA are mere reformist illusions! Build strong Women's Committees now!

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Celebrate International Women's Day!

Working Class Fights for the Full Emancipation of Women

The mountain moving day is coming
I say so yet others doubt
Only a while the mountain sleeps
In the past
All mountains moved in fire
Yet you may not believe it
Oh Man this alone believe
All sleeping women
Now awake and move

111 years ago, 20,000 garment workers, largely women, marched through the streets of New York demanding an end to brutal working conditions. This began the glorious tradition of International Women's Day.

This day is an important working class holiday when the advances toward the emancipation of women are celebrated. As well it is a day when the entire working class and progressive people around the world resolutely demand an end to the brutal exploitation and oppression of women.

Here in the United States, working and oppressed women are in the forefront of class struggle. The recent strike at the Essex Wire Plant in Elwood, Indiana was an inspiration to the working class, as women workers took up the gun to defend their right to better working conditions. The brave struggles of JoAnn Little, Yvonne Wanrow and Inez Garcia are strong examples of women who will not lie down in the face of brutal assaults on themselves and their

families

There are countless examples of this fighting spirit of working and oppressed women in this country. There is little wonder that each and every day, more and more women come to the fore of the struggle. Exploitation and oppression under capitalism necessitate that working and oppressed women stand up and fight.

The very degeneration of capitalism means greater exploitation of the working class. As each working family knows too well, it is extremely difficult to provide for a family on one person's wage. This has meant that a growing number of women must find work outside the home. But this has not been an easy task.

As the army of the unemployed swells, women are among the last hired. Everywhere they turn, women face discrimination in hiring except, of course, in the lowest paying jobs. Wages and working conditions are outrageous for women workers, whether in electronics, garment, housekeeping or clerical work. \$4.00 an hour is considered low pay for a male worker, but for women it is high. As for benefits, they are scarce. Women consistently have no maternity benefits and lose all seniority when they take a leave of absence for childbirth.

Although women are forced

to work in order to maintain their families, they are faced with the extremely difficult task of finding any, let alone adequate, childcare. Often times the bulk of their wages is spent on this necessary service.

On the streets and in the home women are subject to violent physical assault. Wife beating and rape are on the rise as society further degenerates.

Working and oppressed women, plagued with economic difficulties and poor methods of birth control, are often forced to turn to abortion as their only alternative. For every two births, one abortion takes place. And now the capitalists are undercutting the right to safe abortions. Once more, poor and working women are faced with having to turn to butchers for this operation.

A Revolutionary Program

The anger and determination of women is rising. They demand a revolutionary program which will take up the fight for these day-to-day struggles of women as an integral part of the fight against the sources of their exploitation and oppression — capitalism.

The women's movement lacks conscious leadership. This must and will be overcome. Working and oppressed women know full well that the petty-bourgeois reformist program which separates the women's movement from the class struggle is reactionary. Recognizing the special task the Party has to the working and oppressed women of this country, the Draft Party Program includes the special demands of women.

"The right of women to equality in work, pay, holidays, education, and all social and political activity. The right to be free from rape, violence, pornography or other chauvinist and degenerate assaults on women."

"Full compensation for maternity leave one month prior to childbirth, full compensation with leave for either parent for two months after childbirth. Free childcare on a 24 hour basis."

"Free and safe abortions upon request. Free distribution of safe methods of birth control."

An end to forced sterilization"

These special demands are put forward in the Draft Party Program in order to improve the day-to-day lives of working class women, so that they will be in a better position to actively prepare and fight for the overthrow of the capitalist system. It is only through socialist revolution that the position of women can drastically change. We can see this most clearly by taking a look at the position of women in socialist Albania.

Starting from the Marxist-Leninist understanding that the basis for women's oppression is their exclusion from socialized production, Albania has made great strides in all areas of work. Today 42% of the labor force is made up of women. Only a very small percentage, less than 10% do not take part in socialized labor.

Women also play an extremely important role in the government of Albania. Women comprise 33.3% of the People's Assembly. And women are the leaders of 41% of all mass organizations such as the trade unions.

In the Albanian Constitution there is a special article on the rights of women.

"The woman, liberated from political oppression and economic exploitation, is a great force of the revolution, takes an active part in the socialist construction of the country and the defense of the homeland."

The woman enjoys equal rights with man in work, pay, holidays, social security, education, in all social political activity as well as in the family" (Constitution of the People's Socialist Republic of Albania, p 22).

Around the world, from Albania to Azania, Chile to the United States, women are standing on the front lines fighting against all forms of exploitation and oppression. This participation of women class fighters is an absolute requirement for the victory of the revolutionary struggle of the working class.

On this International Women's Day, we hold high the banner of exploited and oppressed women of the world.

Unsafe Conditions Kill 8 in Tannery Explosion

Chicago, Illinois — Just before a shift change at the Horween Leather Company on February 14, a trucker pulled in with a load of sodium hydrosulfide. He was given the okay to unload it through an intake valve into a vat of chrome liquor. The resulting mixture released deadly hydrogen sulfide gas, a close relative of hydrogen cyanide, the gas used to execute prisoners in the gas chamber. Eight workers were killed and 36 others were hospitalized from inhaling the toxic fumes.

This "accident" should not have happened. No measures were taken by the Horween Company to prevent the fatal chemicals from being mixed.

Two similar accidents claimed nine lives since 1971. In both cases the wrong chemicals were mixed, producing poisonous gas. After the 1975 incident at the Prime Tanning Co. in Milwaukee, the National Transportation Safety Board made these "recommendations":

Tanneries should be required to identify clearly with signs what chemicals were to be piped into what valves. Employers should train truck drivers and plant employees to avoid delivery mix ups. Tanneries should compartmentalize their facilities to limit the spread of toxic gases if they are released.

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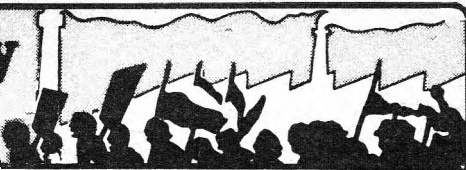
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● Shop Paper Comes Out in Three Languages

Chicago, Illinois — In February, comrades and friends at the Kropp Forge published the second issue of the **Red Forge** with an important change it was printed in three languages — English, Spanish and Italian

The **Red Forge** is a shop paper of the Marxist Leninist Organizing Committee

The lead article "Demand Equality of Languages!" points out, "About 35 % of Kropp's employees speak mainly Italian or Spanish and read little or no English. Yet just think of the important things that are printed in English only! The union contract, the job bids, notices, the company paper, and union meeting announcements to name a few. How can those of us who are Italians have an equal chance for a job bid that's printed in English only? And how can the union leaders possibly represent those of us who are Spanish when we aren't able to read the contract?"

The article goes on to demand that all materials published by the company and the union be printed in all three languages

While only half of the articles are in all three languages in this issue, still this represents a big step forward. The first issue appeared in English and Spanish only

● Workers at Largest Chinese Daily Win Union

San Francisco, Calif — Printing workers at the "Chinese Times" recently won collective bargaining rights by a 17 to 4 vote. Located in San Francisco's Chinatown, the "Chinese Times" is the largest Chinese language daily newspaper in the U.S.

Negotiations for a contract are now in progress between Graphic Arts International Local 280 and the owners.

Wages at the "Chinese Times" are very low. While typesetters in the large printing companies outside of Chinatown get as much as \$11.50 an hour, at the "Chinese Times" they get less than \$3.00 an hour. Hours are long and the work week is six and sometimes seven days. Benefits are few and poor, and there is no pension plan.

The Chinese workers of Chinatown typically work in small, non-union shops. They are exploited and oppressed not only by the rest of the U.S. capitalist class, but also by the capitalists of their own nationality.

The struggle of these printing workers is an example of how the struggles for the democratic rights of national minorities are increasingly fusing with the class struggle of the multi-national U.S. working class.

● Local Union Officials Rob Strikers

Hammond, Indiana — UNITE! has frequently condemned the leaders of the unions who consistently side with the capitalist class against the working class. Their outright treachery is manifested not only when they sell out the workers' struggles, it is also expressed in their selfish corruption.

Striking workers of United Steel Workers Local 1834 discovered in mid-February that their local officials have been robbing the strike fund to the tune of \$100,000. The local's treasurer, Leonard Silwa, has resigned, and now faces both union and criminal charges.

Local 1834 is one of five Steelworker locals in four states who have been on strike against the Pullman Standard Company since October 1, 1977. Some time ago the local funds were depleted and the International allocated money to cover strike costs. But no picket duty pay has been forthcoming since the middle of January. Meanwhile, strikers have had to just about plead with the local officials to get the money that's due them for paying fuel, food and other bills.

Not only have 1800 workers been directly robbed, but their strike has been undermined and they have been brought under direct surveillance of all kinds of high level agents of the capitalist class.

The International Union has stepped in, suspended all local officers, and officially taken over the local. Given the reactionary character of the present top leadership of the USWA, it is not a good thing to have them meddling in the affairs of any local union, especially during a strike.

In addition, the secret police agents of the state are snooping around now too. The FBI has entered the case, and the Internal Revenue Service may come in as well.

It is clear it is impossible for workers to effectively fight the capitalists while also saddled with "leaders" who aggressively work to undermine the strength and struggles of the workers.

The greed and corruption of these Local officials goes beyond the question of their individual character. It is representative of a whole stratum of leeches in the working-class movement. Bureaucracy, opportunism and corruption are all bourgeois behavior. It can only serve the capitalists, whether it is through escorting scabs across picket lines, negotiating away workers' rights or stealing strike funds.

The workers are not sure when they will get the money they have coming, and ask that donations be sent to the International office in District 31, specifying that the money is for Local 1834.

Memorials Held for Slain Indiana Miner

"When he believed in something,
He believed in it all the way"

John Hull

Jan 1, 1945 — Feb 3, 1978

Winslow, Indiana — As power companies cry about decreasing stockpiles and appeal for power cutbacks, the "heat" continues to increase on striking coal miners, as their struggle for a just contract turns into a bloody battle against the coal operators.

On February 3, at the Bowersock strip mine in Indiana, 50 professional strikebreakers fired 500 rounds of M14 and M16 ammunition into a picket of 35 miners for four minutes, killing one miner, John Hull. Teegarden, who runs this eleven-man mine and eleven other scab mines in Southern Indiana, had planned the ambush ever since 500 miners stormed his coal loading dock in Rockport, Indiana weeks before. Nobody has been held responsible for the death, as the government and the courts continue to protect the interests of the ruling class against union activity.

Thousands of UMWA miners, their wives and children, attended memorial services and marches in Illinois and Indiana, mourning the death of John Hull. Many said it could have been themselves who died for the union cause. Robert Edney, the eulogy speaker and union brother, pointed out that if miners had known John was wounded and returned to help him, it could easily have turned into another Ludlow Massacre. Marching miners felt even stronger and more resolved, that with this death, the coal operators will be defeated. Many are preparing for this strike to be the bloodiest in UMWA history.

Miners are determined to stand up for their rights to full health and pension coverage, safety procedures, and the right to wildcat. Their task has become increasingly difficult as the operators, government and bourgeois press attack their strength and solidarity. As each day passes, however, more and more coal miners express the will to achieve the dignity and just demands they have historically fought for and rightfully deserve. ★

In defending their rights, the miners are fighting for all workers. Steelworkers, for example, know from their own experience what this attack on the miners means. U.S. Steel is one of the largest mine owners in the country, and has taken the lead within the BCOA insisting that the miners knuckle under to the industry's demands.

U.S. Steel has already forced "labor peace" on steelworkers with the ENA (Experimental Negotiating Agreement), which bans

strikes. Now it wants to deprive the miners of the right to strike as well. Steelworkers know that not having the right to strike has crippled their struggle.

The entire working class must recognize this trend for what it is — a capitalist campaign to strip them of their rights and means of struggle. Workers in all industries must stop this attack here and turn it around. Steelworkers, unorganized miners, workers in every industry, stand with the miners!

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) pointed out after the incident here that few of these recommendations have been followed by tannery owners.

This so-called accident which the capitalists are trying to blame on the mistake of a single worker is out and out criminal negligence by the owner and the federal government. The capitalists do not give a damn about the lives of their employees. They would rather lose a few lives than take necessary safety measures or install equipment to contain poisonous gases released in workplaces.

The federal government is also to blame for not forcing factory owners to install equipment to protect lives or to even regularly inspect workplaces for hazardous conditions. OSHA never moves until some tragedy occurs. Even then they only fine the owners, who will still usually refuse to correct the problem. This is understandable since the capitalists control the government.

This latest incident points out the collaboration of the union bureaucrats. They did not organize the workers to demand that either the company take safety precautions or else the workers would stop production.

Workers demand safe and healthy working conditions. But the rank and file must gain control of the unions to ensure that the trade union bureaucrats, who don't have to work in unsafe conditions, don't sell out their interests.

All the necessary precautions against mixing dangerous chemicals must be taken, including having someone from the plant supervise the unloading of chemicals. The families of the slain workers must be given full compensation — wages equal to what the dead workers would have earned in their lifetime, paid by the company. All workers must be ensured the right to leave unsafe work areas. ★

Four Die Needlessly at U S Steel Gary Works

A Death Trap for Steelworkers

Gary, Indiana — Whether buried in coal dust, decapitated by a crane hook, rolled into a sheet metal finishing line, pinned under a tractor, scalded in an acid tank or burned in an explosion, according to the management of Gary Works, steelworkers are to blame.

These are just six of the many accidents that have occurred at Gary Works in the past year. Four of these accidents resulted in death. Even though the company owns the machinery and organizes and directs production, they refuse to accept responsibility for these accidents and instead blame them on the individual workers.

Although the company makes a great show of concern for health and safety, when it comes right down to it they say if there is a contradiction between safety and production, production comes first. Time after time when a worker points out safety hazards the response of the company is "Work the job or go home with-

out pay." Some choice!

Union Leaders Follow Company Lead

Whenever there is a safety problem the union misleaders tell the workers to use Section 14-C of the contract. 14-C says workers can file a grievance on unsafe working conditions and/or ask to be relieved from the job. However, if workers encourage other workers to refuse the unsafe job all 14-C rights are made null and void and the individual workers will be charged with creating a work stoppage.

14-C is in complete harmony with the company's policy on health and safety. By telling workers to use 14-C, the union bureaucrats place the responsibility for health and safety on the individual worker.

The bureaucrats refuse to organize workers to fight for safe working conditions. They refuse to demand that production be stopped until the safety hazard

is removed. These misleaders also encourage workers to work in unsafe jobs "under protest" and then later file a grievance. But what good does working under protest do if a worker is killed or seriously injured?

These bureaucrats will not fight for the health and safety of the workers because it would jeopardize their own soft jobs and extra money. This cozy arrangement between the bureaucrats and the capitalists has been made at the expense of the limbs and lives of the workers.

We Need Rank-and-File Control Over Working Conditions

All workers must demand safe working conditions controlled by a democratically-elected union safety committee. This committee must have safety representatives in every department on every shift. When the company refuses to correct unsafe conditions, the safety representative must have the power to stop production until the hazard is corrected. As well, individual workers must have the right to refuse to do any work which they believe is unsafe.

These are demands which workers across the country are fighting for. Right now, health and safety is a crucial issue in the national coal strike. Miners know unless the rank and file have control over their own health and safety it will mean death sentences for many miners. The same is true at U S Steel, Gary Works.

Workers must organize in every mill to fight for safe working conditions and to throw out all the trade union bureaucrats who make their living off the sweat and blood of steelworkers!

Against Anaconda American Brass

USWA Local 5726 Fights for COLA

Paramount, California — The key issue in the steelworkers' strike against Anaconda American Brass has now come down to the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA). The company claims they cannot afford to continue the COLA. The strikers know they cannot afford to lose it.

The strike of USWA local 5726 is now in its fifth month. The Paramount plant is one of six others nationwide that have been on strike since October 1, 1977.

Throughout the strike, salaried personnel have served as scabs and kept the Buffalo, New York and the Paramount plants open. Police have been called in if there is the slightest delay in trucks crossing the picket line. Strikers are seeing first hand how the courts and police directly serve corporations and big business in conflicts between the capitalists and workers. Anaconda has the entire legal system at their service and it is becoming very clear that the only "law and order" that is preserved is the "law and order" of capitalists.

Trade-Union Bureaucrats Oppose Workers

Here in Paramount strikers see that a strike that doesn't stop production is an ineffective strike. And who's helping to keep production going? The trade union bureaucrats. They are doing the work of the company better than the company itself.

The trade union bureaucrats have personally escorted trucks through the picket line (see UNITE!, Vol 4 no 2) and consistently opposed stopping production and scabs.

This is something all workers should learn from. As long as the trade union bureaucrats control our unions we can only expect more sellouts. Why? Because the capitalists have bought off the labor misleaders. Their fat salaries, huge expense accounts and privileged positions are all directly tied to their ability to pacify and divert the blows of the working class away from the capitalists. The rank and file need communist leadership and organization to oppose the bankrupt union leadership which only leads them down blind alleys.

By refusing to mobilize the union membership to close the plant down, by squashing and diverting the initiative and militancy of the rank and file and by keeping the strikers "peaceful and quiet" the trade-union bureaucrats have prepared the workers for a sellout contract and a sellout will only represent the interests of Anaconda.

It is not only the trade-union bureaucrats at the international level (making salaries of \$100,000 and better) who have an interest in serving the capitalists, but also union local presidents, such as Noah Hite of local 5726. His interests coincide with those of the company because he wants to move up in the union bureaucracy. He knows full well that to be promoted he must demonstrate to international president McBride and the others who presently control the union that he can keep the rank and file in line and conduct a strike in a manner acceptable to the company and big shot misleaders.

The small time bureaucrats like Hite have a choice — they can either serve and defend the interests of the workers or they can fall in line with the international and sell out the workers. Here at the Paramount Anaconda plant the local president has chosen to serve the company in his effort to secure future positions in the international. This treachery has led to the demoralization of the rank and file. From all of this it is clear that workers must have a fighting program and need communist leadership.

Plan of Action

In opposition to the class collaboration of the union big shots the MLOC has advanced a clear program of action. We call on the rank and file to:

- Organize a rank-and-file committee to win the strike.
- Stop the trucks to stop production.
- Oppose the sellout policies of the union leadership.
- Win broad support from family, friends, other workers, unions and community groups.

This program is a fighting program which enables workers to defend and advance the gains they have made over the years and begin to rebuild the union on a class conscious basis. ★

Report from the First Congress of the MLOC

Guide for Trade Union Work

At its historic First Congress, the MLOC adopted a "Resolution on the Trade Unions." This revolutionary position provides the proletariat with an understanding of the causes and manifestations of the reactionary role the trade unions now play under opportunist and reformist leadership. It outlines the tasks of the working class, under the leadership of its vanguard party, to transform the unions into real weapons of revolution.

"Today the trade union apparatus has become an extension of the bourgeois state. Controlled by the labor aristocracy and run by the trade union bureaucrats, it serves to prop up the rule of the bourgeoisie, promote disunity within the ranks of the working class, and sow class peace."

The policies of the bureaucrats keep three quarters of the workers in the US unorganized. Within the unions, the bureaucrats uphold narrow craft divisions. In union after union, they bargain away the right to strike in the name of "common interests" between the workers and the capitalists and in the name of industrial peace.

"The result has been that while the bourgeoisie has sought to place the burden of the general crisis of capitalism on the backs of the workers through soaring

prices, layoffs, unemployment and overtime, the earning power, health and safety, and well-being of the masses continue to worsen."

How can it be that the basic organizations of the working class — the unions, the organizations that ought to serve as the main force of the fighting strength of the class — have been turned into the principal tools of the capitalists to confine and crush the struggles of the workers?

The Resolution explains that "With the rise and development of imperialism, the bourgeoisie was able to use the superprofits gained from the exploitation of oppressed nations and colonies to bribe the upper stratum of the working class movement, the labor aristocrats and the trade union bureaucrats, in order to maintain control of the trade unions."

In order to protect their narrow interests and keep their respectability in the eyes of the capitalists, these class traitors promote national chauvinism and other forms of imperialist bourgeois ideology among the workers. They are active partners in the US imperialist policies of war, aggression and suppression of revolutionary national-liberation and workers' movements. They openly declare that their

aim is to defend and maintain the present system of capitalist exploitation at home and imperialist domination abroad.

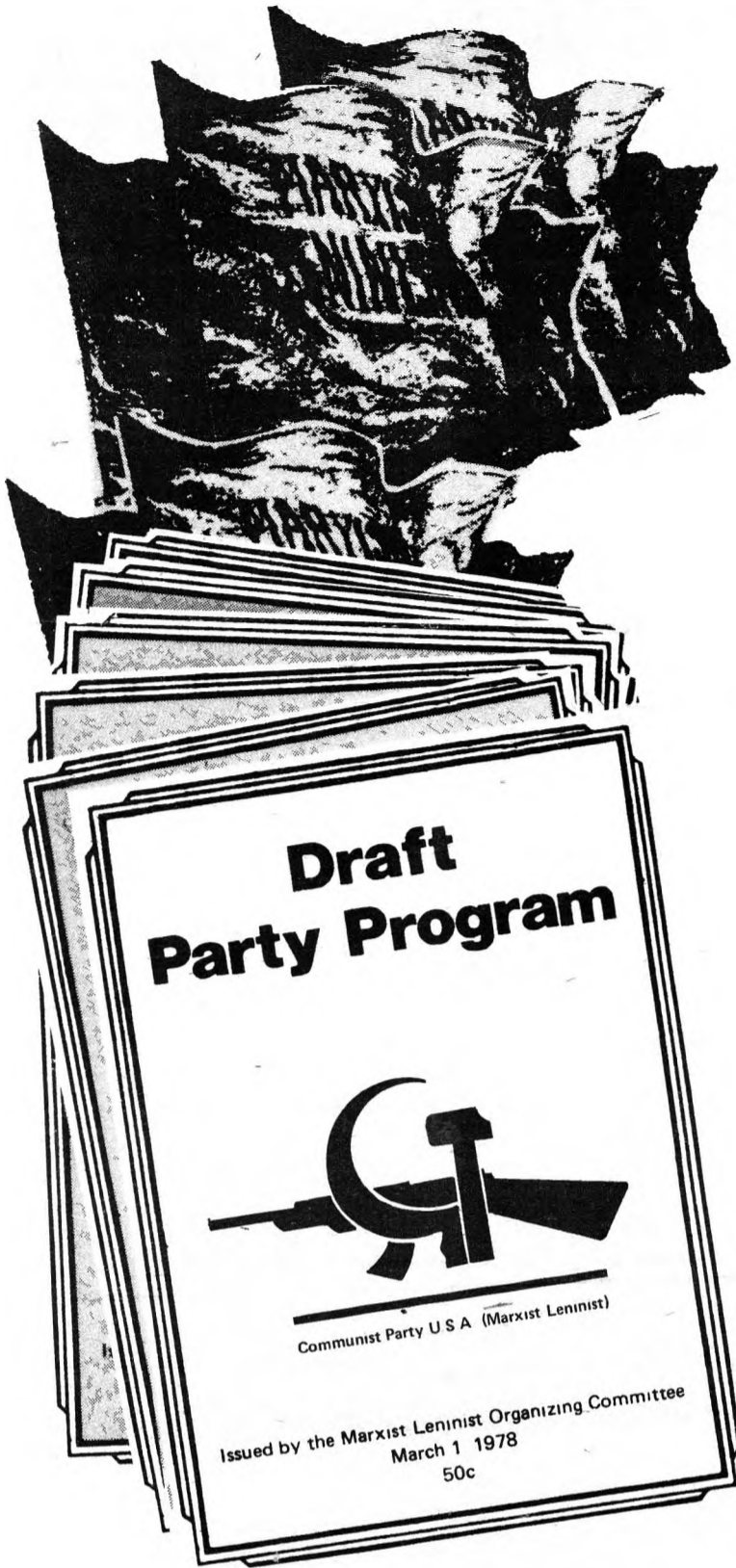
"Our task in the trade unions is to wage the class struggle on all fronts in order to neutralize the influence of the labor aristocracy and kick out the trade union bureaucrats from the union. Through this struggle the working class, under the leadership of its vanguard party, will take control of the trade unions and transform them into revolutionary fighting weapons of the proletariat against the bourgeoisie."

Consolidation of Socialist Relations in Economic Base Reflected in

The Life of an Albanian Coal Miner

What is it like to be a coal miner at the Valias coal mine now under construction just outside of Tirana, the capital of Albania?

Valias is one of the biggest mines in this socialist country. A whole new town is being built at the mine site.

The mine is being designed and built by engineers, technicians and workers. The most modern technology is being used in order to lighten the work load and ensure the health and safety of the miners.

Underground the mine looks like an industrial city. Electric locomotives bring new materials and machinery into place as equipment is installed and ventilation tunnels are dug. Work places at the coal face are well lit and the air is clean. Coal is moved quickly out of the mine during the shift on which it is dug, by electric railway. All equipment in the mine, from heavy machinery to telephones and lighting is flame proof to prevent explosions.

Above ground, the city is near completion. There are new apartment houses, schools, shops, laboratories, an electric power station and railway network. Directly above the mine are bath houses, dining rooms and a health center open around the clock. Underground miners receive regular exams to prevent occupational diseases, free of charge. Clothing and work gear are provided free.

Miners' pay is high. They earn about the same as a government Vice Minister. After ten years of work, at age 50, a miner can retire with a pension at 70% of his wages. Miners receive a paid annual leave twice as long as other workers. If a miner is off work because of illness or injury, he receives 95% of his regular pay while in the hospital or at home.

In socialist Albania it is well understood that miners play a vital role in socialist construction. For that reason, society places a high priority on taking care of its miners.

What a contrast with a miner's life in the US! It is the difference between night and day, between capitalism and socialism.

Building the Economic Base To Ensure Well-Being

How can life be like this? How does a socialist economy work? Once the proletariat seizes political power, how is a capitalist economy transformed into a socialist economy? Workers all around the country are asking us these questions.

The development of a socialist economic base begins with the seizure of major means of production, of the land, mines, mills and resources from the overthrown capitalists by the new class in power, the working class. In Albania, under the leadership of the Party of Labor of Albania (PLA), the people's state is organized to carry out this transfer in a conscious manner. A change in ownership from one class to another leads to a change in the relations of production. Under socialism, the working people are no longer wage slaves. Instead they are the owners and masters of the wealth and resources of their country.

The Valias mine is owned by the entire people of Albania. Production is directed by the state committees in conjunction with the workers themselves. Coal is not extracted to make a profit for the owners. The coal is mined in order to fuel the factories, increase production, strengthen socialist society and increase the well being of the people.

Conscious Planning

The development of socialist construction proceeds by careful

planning. The anarchy of production under capitalism — which shows up in surplus of goods, high prices and unemployment — does not exist in Albania. The building of the Valias mine did not occur as the result of some individual capitalist accumulating enough to invest in a new mine to make even greater profits. The mine was first investigated, and then designed and built as part of an overall plan based on a scientific evaluation of the resources, the needs and priorities of the entire society.

In socialist society, production is for use, to fulfill the needs of the people and to advance socialist construction. Production is not for profit.

The consolidation of the economic base is crucial. All other socialist relations and socialist new things stand on this base. In order to consolidate the economic base, socialist construction must solve two basic problems. First, the relations of production must be transformed. The problem must be solved as to which class owns and leads. And secondly, the industrial, agricultural and technological capabilities of the society must be developed and advanced. In other words, the forces of production must be developed. These two problems are two aspects of the same task, the task of consolidating the economic socialist base.

In mining, for example, the Albanian people faced two problems. First, they had to seize the mines and place them under the control of the proletarian dictatorship. Second, they had to put the mines back into production, build new ones, develop mining technology to both ensure the health and safety of the workers and to increase production and train new miners.

Which Class Will Lead

Understanding the relations of



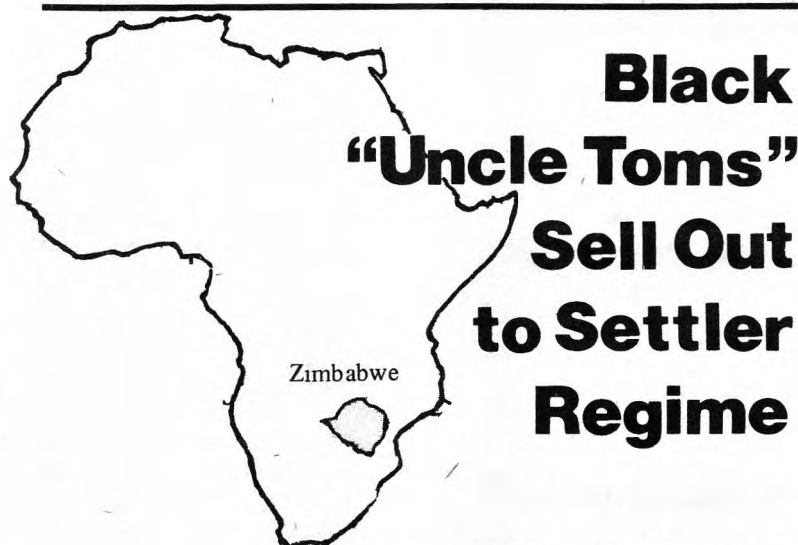
Miners' dining hall at the Valias mine. The state pays 24% of the cost of the meals here.

production and the productive forces is essential to guide the development of socialist economy. The PLA has fought long and hard on this question to maintain a correct line, because it is a question of which class will lead, whether or not socialism will be consolidated and whether or not the proletariat will march forward to the creation of communism.

Failure to follow the correct line on the relationship between the forces of production and the relations of production in the past, in the working class movement, has been the source of opportunism and revisionism. In the once-socialist USSR, this failure led to the restoration of capitalism. Those who revise Marxism-Leninism on this question say that the development of socialist ownership of the means of production, and the development of the productive forces are two independent processes. They also say that if the forces of production are developed and the society is modernized and industrialized, the socialist relations will politely follow. History has proven this to be incorrect. The two processes are inter-

related. Only by consistently improving socialist leadership will the initiative and creativity of the working people be unleashed, and the productive forces of the country be developed.

After 30 years of struggle in Albania, socialist relations have been consolidated through the correct leadership of the Party, through sharp and persistent class struggle and through the dedication and sacrifice of the Albanian working people. The seizure of political power in 1944 was an historic achievement. But it brought with it the even more difficult task of consolidating the dictatorship of the proletariat through development of a socialist economic base. The question of which class will lead, which class will own, has been answered in favor of the proletariat. The conditions of life for the Valias miners today are the direct result of this struggle. The well being of the Valias miners, along with the technologically developed mining process is a clear reflection of the success of socialist construction in Albania today. ★



The latest reports from Zimbabwe indicate that Ian Smith, leader of the minority Rhodesian regime is about to achieve an "internal settlement" with three black leaders — Bishop Abel Muzorewa, Ndabaningi Sithole and Senator Joseph Chirau. This "internal settlement" is a complete betrayal of the aspirations of the 6.8 million black Zimbabweans for majority rule. The announced provisions of the now partially agreed upon "settle-

ment" is that the white minority will continue to rule for at least ten more years through constitutional guarantees that will leave whites in control of the economy, civil service and the army. The black Uncle Toms have agreed to give the whites veto power in a 100 seat parliament. Whites would be given 28 seats, a ratio of four to one, whereas the whites are outnumbered in the country 24 to one.

The major stumbling block to sealing this "settlement" is the

make up of the interim government. Smith insists that he remain executive. The three black leaders, in an attempt to cover their complete sell out, demand that a black head the interim government.

This "internal settlement" is a last desperate effort by the racist Smith regime to salvage white rule. Just one year ago, he was saying that black rule would never come in his life time. But now he is desperately scrambling to hold on to power because his regime is hard pressed by the ever expanding guerrilla warfare under the leadership of the Patriotic Front composed of ZANU (Zimbabwe African National Union) and ZAPU (Zimbabwe African Peoples' Union).

This "settlement" is a ploy to attempt to divide the black population. Smith hopes he can use his sham majority rule as a way of getting blacks to join him in his fight against the guerrillas. He also hopes to ease world condemnation of his continued white minority rule.

This "internal settlement" has been soundly exposed and reject-

ed by the Patriotic Front and the five frontline states surrounding Zimbabwe. Robert Mugabe, President of ZANU and co leader of the Patriotic Front has said, "Zimbabwe must be free now. The people are anxiously awaiting a new and independent state."

The US and British imperialists, recognizing that Smith's days are numbered, are hoping to maintain their influence in Zimbabwe by giving token support to the Patriotic Front. The US and Britain have criticized the "settlement" proposed by Smith because it does not involve the Front. It is not because these imperialists support the liberation forces, but because they realize that the "settlement" can not work. The three traitors have no real mass support, nor do they control any troops, therefore, they could not stop the liberation war.

The US would like to see the war end and a settlement worked out as soon as possible, so that they can shore up their control before the Soviet Union is able to gain the upper hand. The US fears that once the Smith regime

has been ousted, the Soviet Union will openly intervene just as they did in Angola in order to gain control.

The tasks of the supporters of the Zimbabwe liberation struggle are clear. We must denounce the sell out of the three Uncle Toms. We must oppose any forced settlement by the US and British imperialists.

The Zimbabwean liberation fighters do not need the assistance of Soviet Cuban "liberators" who attempt to gain control of a country by coming through the back door under the false flag of "support for national liberation movements" and "socialism." Each superpower plots to pull an independent Zimbabwe into its sphere of influence, this must be opposed.

We must support the Patriotic Front and the vanguard role played by ZANU. The MLOC supports the ZANU stand of "we are our own liberators."

Josip Broz Tito, the 85-year old ruler of Yugoslavia Today we are witnessing an attempt to reverse the verdict leveled on Tito as a traitor to Marxism-Leninism and defender of modern revisionism

This month Josip Broz Tito, the 85 year old ruler of Yugoslavia is headed for the US His visit will culminate an unusual amount of travel and wheeling and dealing over the past six months

In late August and September of 1977, Tito travelled to Moscow, Korea and China In Moscow he was warmly praised for his support of the policy of "detente" This policy, which is one component of the USSR - US collusion has become increasingly ragged as can be seen in the recent Belgrade meetings on the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe

In Peking, very little was said about "detente" There Tito was

presented as a great anti fascist fighter that China could depend upon in the face of a menacing USSR The real extent of Tito's success in China surfaced later with the establishment of full Party-to-Party relations between the Communist Party of China (CPC) and the League of Communists of Yugoslavia As noted earlier in a UNITE! article (Vol 3, No 11, December 1977), this reversal of the long standing condemnation of Tito for his revisionism is a serious attack upon the forces of revolution

In late September and early October, Tito shifted his focus to the West Visits were made to France, Spain and Portugal

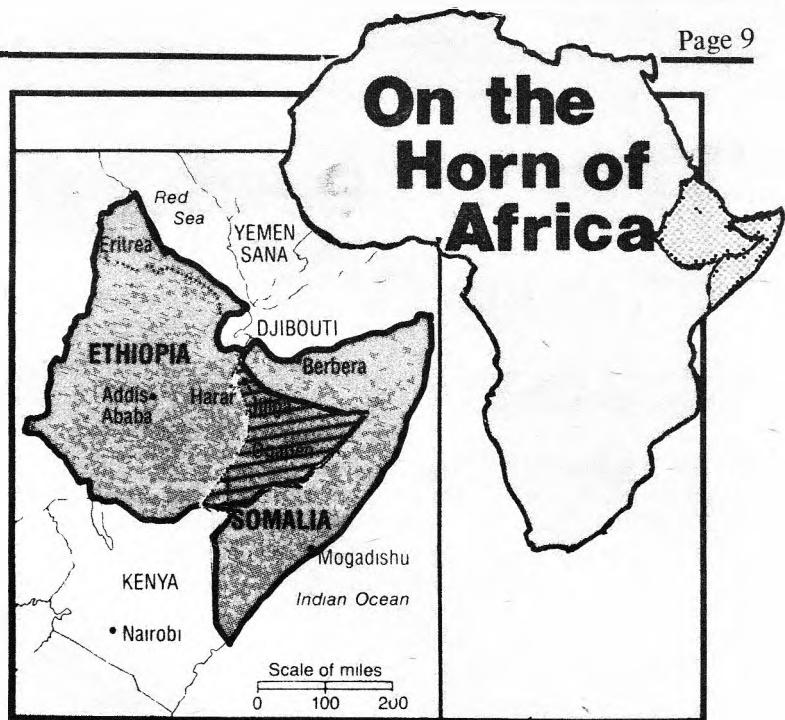
In a Spain still under the heel of the Juan Carlos regime bequeathed by Franco, the Yugoslavs dropped any pretence of supporting socialism and revolution and praised the regime "for the happy and cordial atmosphere denoting mutual rapprochement in peace and freedom" (Yugoslav Life December 1977, p 2)

It was practically at the same time preparations for the U.S. trip were laid E Kardelj, the Yugoslav second in command and chief theoretician of Yugoslav capitalist restoration came to the US and met with Vice-President Mondale and National Security Advisor Brzezinski Both praised Tito for his policy of "non alignment" "Non alignment" like "detente" is a code word for imperialist collusion at the expense of the world's peoples Both mean cooperation with imperialism, non alignment with socialism and revolution

Today the Yugoslav people are paying the price of Tito's treachery The early grants to prop up Tito have long given way to large indebtedness to the International Monetary Fund Over 4,000 foreign firms are represented in Yugoslavia By a recent law, it is no longer necessary for foreign banks and corporations to place a Yugoslav as head of the subsidiary The result is that the Yugoslav economy is completely integrated into the international capitalist system and has been going through the same phases of industrial crisis, inflation and unemployment

When Tito and Carter meet, the problem of the deficit in the balance of payments of Yugoslavia, and the need for further loans will undoubtedly have to be part of the agenda But the main part of the agenda goes far beyond the increased exploitation of the 20 million Yugoslavian people

Tito's role is that of the Diplomat of Imperialist Collusion His task has been to front for both superpowers as a so called leader of the "non-aligned" As the superpowers and the other imperialists move increasingly toward imperialist world war, collusion becomes secondary, contention becomes primary, and the ground will be cut out from under Tito, "detente" and "non-alignment"



Reactionary War Between Ethiopia and Somalia

The latest reports from Ethiopia's Ogaden desert indicate that the Soviet-Cuban backed Ethiopian regime is turning the tide of battle and routing the US backed Somalia forces The US is now crying foul because of the use of Cuban forces and threatening direct involvement if Somalia's territory is invaded

The truth of the matter is that the two superpowers are heightening their contention for control of the strategic Middle East Horn of Africa The valuable prize is the control of the major oil route to Europe To win the prize, each superpower seeks to take advantage of any rift between the other's client state and its master This is clearly evidenced by the switching of masters—in Ethiopia from the US to the Soviets, and in Somalia from the Soviets to the US

The war over the Ogaden between Ethiopia and Somalia is a reactionary war between the military juntas and serves the interests of their imperialist masters It is a war through which the oppressed nationalities of the Ogaden region are being slaughtered and dispersed from their traditional homelands Animosity is being created and intensified between the two countries.

The reactionary regimes of Mengistu in Ethiopia and Said Barre in Somalia, as well as their imperialist sponsors, have a great interest in continuing this war The two superpowers are using this war to escalate their contention by proxy to establish hegemony in the region

The Soviets have signed a 20 year friendship agreement with the Ethiopian regime and poured over \$1 billion in military equipment, along with 4,000 Cuban mercenary troops into Ethiopia to help win the war On the other hand, the US is giving support to Somalia through its reactionary intermediaries in the region — the fascist Shah of Iran, Saudi Arabia and Egypt

The reactionary ruling classes of Ethiopia and Somalia are hardly blameless in this war for it

serves their interests too The Ethiopian regime which claims to be "socialist" is racked by internal dissent among the workers, students and oppressed nationalities This is in addition to fighting an unjust war against the national-liberation struggle of the Eritrean people The fascist Mengistu regime is using the Somalia "invasion" to whip up national fervor and stem these just struggles It hopes to first put down the Somali threat and then turn its Soviet Cuban backed and trained army against the Eritrean and Ethiopian masses This is a futile attempt because the Ethiopian masses, led by their party, the Ethiopian Peoples' Revolutionary Party, are becoming more and more aware of the sham nature of the "socialist" Mengistu regime The Party and people are intensifying struggle against the regime The Eritreans, led by the Eritrean People's Liberation Front, are moving ever closer to complete victory

The reactionary Somalia regime is using this war as a pretext to advance its own expansionist aims to bring about its long pursued objective of a "Greater Somalia" which would include the Ogaden as well as to divert the attention of the oppressed masses of Somalia from waging class struggle

Somalia claims that the war is being pursued solely by the Western Somalia Liberation Front The truth is that Somalia is taking advantage of the oppression of the Ethiopian Somalis and their just struggle against national oppression to pursue their own reactionary aims

The proletariat and oppressed nationalities in Ethiopia and Somalia must forge unity and overthrow the Mengistu and Barre regimes and their imperialist backers and create new democratic societies It is only on this basis that national oppression will cease and these countries will become truly independent

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Attempt to Crush Native Indian Movement

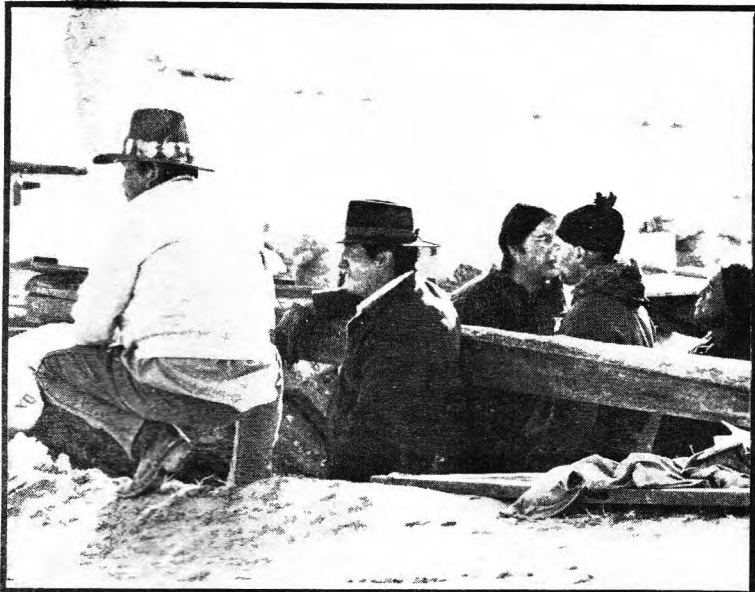
Defense to Argue Case in 9-Month Skyhorse and Mohawk Trial

In 1973 the American Indian Movement (AIM) occupied Wounded Knee, South Dakota, demanding democratic rights and land for Native Indians. Since that time the bourgeois state, through its agents, the FBI, has attacked AIM through intimidation, organized terror, armed violence and murder.

Over 43 AIM members and supporters have been murdered by the FBI and their goons at the site of the Wounded Knee occupation at the Pine Ridge Reservation alone. As part of its attack, the state has framed leaders Russel Means, Dennis Banks, Leonard Peltier, Gladys Bissonette, Sarah Badheart Bull and others.

Continuing its efforts to destroy the resistance of Native Indians, the state has leveled an attack against Richard Mohawk, a Tuscarora Mohawk from upstate New York and Paul Skyhorse, an Anishnabe Chippewa from Minnesota.

In October, 1974 a Los Angeles cab driver was brutally murdered. Three people, Marcie Eaglestaff, Marvin Redshirt and Holly Broussard, were arrested with bloody clothes and shoes, two knives with the driver's blood on them and the driver's possessions. A week later, Skyhorse and Mohawk, AIM organizers, were arrested in Arizona though there was no physical evidence tying them to the case. For their part, Broussard, Redshirt and Eaglestaff were granted immunity in January 1975 in exchange for testimony implicating Skyhorse and Mohawk.

In the early stages, Skyhorse and Mohawk's defense was sabotaged by the FBI informers in AIM. The two have been harassed constantly since their arrest. In February 1977 they were so badly beaten by six deputies in the Ventura County Jail that they required hospitalization. Also, an inmate at the Los Angeles County Jail filed an affidavit testifying that he was offered a deal by the state for a light sentence if he would invent a story that Skyhorse had threatened to "butcher him like a cab driver" unless he submitted to a homosexual rape.

In the course of the trial, now in its ninth month, Judge Dodson has acted in alliance with the prosecution to prop up the state's frame up. In the course of this trial, he ruled that Skyhorse and Mohawk had to sit on the opposite side of the courtroom and not communicate with their attorney. This is no longer in force. While in jail, they participated in a hunger strike protesting the beatings of other prisoners. As a result the Sheriff ordered their rights restricted. In late December 1977, the California Supreme Court ruled that Skyhorse and Mohawk could represent themselves at their trial. The decision stayed Judge Dodson's order revoking such a right. They have also restored their right to telephones, the prison law library and other basic privileges.

The prosecution is now finished presenting its case. Forty-nine prosecution witnesses have completely failed to implicate

Skyhorse and Mohawk in the case. For instance, Allan Ball and Jeff Hawley both testified that they were with the defendants shortly after the murder, and did not see blood on their clothing. Frank Sexton, who initially claimed to have seen blood on Skyhorse's pants, admitted habitual drug usage and continuous treatment for drug-related illness, and that in fact, he remembered hardly anything about October 1974. Marcie Eaglestaff, one of the three originally arrested, was recently

sentenced to a year in jail for aiding and abetting a felony. She has been in jail since October 1977 on contempt charges for refusing to answer defense questions about her actions the night of the murder.

Currently, the defense is presenting its case. This week, FBI undercover agents who had infiltrated AIM will be brought to the stand. Leonard Weinglass, Skyhorse and Mohawk's lawyer, estimates that the trial will go to the jury for a verdict within a month.

Through such frame ups, military occupations, FBI attacks, forced sterilization of Native Indian women and other forms of repression and genocide, US imperialism is trying to crush the struggle of the Native Indian peoples to regain control of their land, resources and destinies. In the face of these attacks, there is a pressing need for the working class to join in solidarity with the struggle of Skyhorse and Mohawk and with the Native Indian struggle for democratic rights. ★

Dawson Five Victory Celebration Held in California

Berkeley, Calif. — A victory celebration for the Dawson Five was held here January 7th. The event was a big success. The donations from over fifty people were sent directly to the families of the Dawson Five. Lively speeches gave the gathering a militant content.

In addition, films were shown depicting conditions in two nations oppressed by imperialism: the Black Nation and Azania. "South Hunger and Health" documents the bare subsistence poverty in the rural South: raw sewage standing in pools, retardation due to malnutrition and more. "Last Grave at Dimbaza" shows the brutal oppression of the Azanian people by the South African fascists. In Dimbaza, graves are dug twenty at a time for the children who will die during the coming week.

The main theme of the presentation by the Dawson Five Defense Committee was the power of the people when we unite to struggle against the imperialists. This is what set the Dawson Five free. The speaker also reviewed the development of the Black Nation and the necessity of fighting for self-determination for the Black Nation and equal rights throughout the country.

Three solidarity statements were made. A MLOC spokesperson pledged continued concrete support to the Black liberation struggle. A speaker for the Graham and Allen Defense Committee focussed on executions of Blacks and other oppressed people by the imperialists. Ernest Graham and Eugene Allen are Black militant inmates of San Quentin framed for the murder of a prison guard and facing death in the gas chamber. A Federation of Iranian Students in the U.S. speaker called for the

overthrow of the fascist Shah's regime which holds over 100,000 political prisoners in its jails. He expressed his wholehearted support for the Black people's struggle against the common enemy, US imperialism.

This event pointed to the victories that can be won and the still greater victories yet to be achieved.

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TV Documentary Denies Role of the Masses

'King' Distorts History, Preaches Non-Violence

During the 1950's and 1960's in the U.S., Black people rose up in a revolutionary movement against the entire system of racist segregation which was the law in the South and universally practiced throughout the rest of the country. This movement spontaneously went beyond racial segregation and national oppression to challenge the entire imperialist system itself, the real cause and promoter of national oppression. Out of this revolutionary movement of the Black people emerged many mass organizations and leaders — the most prominent being Martin Luther King, Jr.

As a leader, King displayed a dual nature. He was both a progressive fighter against inequality and social injustice and a reformist who consciously opposed armed rebellion against the imperialist system and who made many concessions to the imperialist ruling class.

This true assessment of Martin Luther King Jr. was completely and deliberately distorted in KING, the three night "documentary" produced by NBC. The bourgeoisie and its servants always attempt to distort history to make it serve their continued rule.

The basic points made in

KING were that M.L. King Jr. was the leader of the Civil Rights Movement, that non-violence is the way to achieve social change, that the racists and the government conspired to keep Blacks oppressed, and that Coretta King made major contributions to the Civil Rights Movement and should be accepted as a leader today.

While King was the most prominent spokesman for the Civil Rights Movement, he was a product of the struggles of Black people for full democratic rights and not the initiator of the movement. He played a major role in getting the Black church involved in the freedom struggle, and in articulating the demands of the movement. By focussing on King instead of the mass movement, the movie presented the idea that great men, or heroes, are the makers of history, and denied the role of the masses as the true makers of history. Instead of the spontaneous struggle, this program showed a lot of meetings of King and his lieutenants.

The role of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) in the Freedom Rides and the Student Non Violent (later National) Coordinating Committee (SNCC) in the Southern move-

ment were omitted. The fact that SNCC, not King, was the first major Black organization to oppose the Vietnam War was distorted. The whole uproar around "Black Power" was completely left out because it raised challenges to the tactics of non-violence and the goal of integration.

KING also presented non-violence as the best means of social change. This was the heart of this program. But non-violence is not and cannot substitute for Black people aggressively pursuing their rights and defending themselves when attacked by racists and other reactionaries. History has shown time and again that those in a privileged or ruling position will fight to maintain it. The rich Southern landowners and capitalists in collusion with the Northern bourgeoisie incite working class whites to oppose the Black struggle for full democratic rights. They foster white chauvinism to maintain their rule and privileges. When the Black Civil Rights Movement challenged this rule, the capitalists and reformists tried to divert the movement into non-violence, or into attacking white workers.

The movie, in spite of its intentions to sell non-violence, did show that this was not the only tactic seen as viable by Black people. Many Black people and leaders such as Malcolm X, Robert Williams and H. Rap Brown, saw the necessity to meet reactionary violence with revolutionary violence, serving notice to reactionaries that they could not attack Blacks without being counterattacked. The rebellions that occurred in over 40 cities after King's assassination were not even mentioned on the program. This was to maintain the illusion that Black people accepted non-violence.

The movie did expose the role of the liberal Kennedy

brothers, who have been portrayed as friends of Black people. It showed that the Kennedys tried to use King and the movement to further their careers.

The movie attempted to project Coretta King as a major contributor to her husband's thought and the leadership of the freedom struggle. It presents her as a progressive figure who should be accepted as a leader of Black people. She is not Coretta King willingly selling out the interests of Black and working class people as evidenced by her giving a "Freedom Award" to George Meany, the racist head of the AFL-CIO.

King's legacy was that he was beginning to see that the struggle against segregation was no longer the major battle. He was beginning to see as Memphis and the Poor People's March indicate, the necessity of linking the struggle for Civil Rights with the struggle for jobs and better working conditions. He was beginning to see that national oppression was also a question of class oppression. He had even begun to question non-violence. He was not a Marxist-Leninist and thus could not scientifically see the need for the right of self-determination and for linking the Black liberation struggle with the working-class movement against imperialism, but the logic of the struggle was propelling him in that direction.

The working class and oppressed nationalities must combat all attempts by the bourgeoisie to distort our history and channel our struggles toward reformist ends and reformist leadership. The history of the people's struggles against oppression and exploitation are the foundation on which we build for the future. We have to sum up our history and press forward to achieve the victory of the total liberation of Black people and the working class from imperialist domination.

KING showed that J. Edgar Hoover tried to link M.L. King to communists. It would have been a good thing if genuine communist leadership had been given to the Black liberation struggle. But leadership was left to the revisionist CPUSA, which had abandoned the Black people's struggle and the revolutionary

road during the 1940's. No genuine communist leadership was provided. The CPUSA's revisionist views of "peaceful transition" and socialism dovetailed with M.L. King's non-violence and failed to raise the understanding of the movement. The CPUSA denied the existence of the Black Nation and did not guide the spontaneous struggle to fight for self-determination. The Black liberation movement, just as the workers' movement, suffered from this betrayal.

The struggle during the 1950's and 1960's that were shown in the movie KING were a small reflection of the militant resistance of the Black Nation to oppression and imperialist domination. Many democratic rights which were bitterly fought for then are still denied for the majority of the Black masses in the South, because the Black Nation is still oppressed by U.S. imperialism. The wretched exploitation and oppression of the Black Nation will continue until the right of self-determination has been achieved.

The struggle for self-determination will not be won through peaceful, non-violent means despite what the movie KING says. The imperialists who have a stranglehold over the South and their Southern lackeys will not hand over the land, resources or power to the Black masses without a fight. The exercise of the right of self-determination will only be realized through armed struggle and the seizure of state power by the working class of the oppressed Nation and its allies. ★

the Blacks and Chicanos in the U.S.

The South is home for a fairly sizeable number of Chicanos and Mexicanos who constitute national minorities within the Black Nation, whether they perform migrant agricultural or industrial labor. There is also a sizeable Black population in the urban centers of the Southwest. The political rights of these minorities must be guarded by the nationalities on whose territory they reside. We must act to unite Blacks and Chicanos to fight side by side to overthrow U.S. imperialist domina-

tion of their peoples.

Without a doubt the multinational proletariat will succeed in seizing state power and establishing the dictatorship of the proletariat, socialism and communism. Workers' Movement

BRITAIN — Gasoline tank truck drivers continue to ban overtime in their struggle to win a 30% wage increase — much higher than the 10% allowed by the so-called Social Contract. They have also refused deliveries to gas station managers who try to profit from their action.

The government has already indicated its intention to put into operation the emergency measures most recently used in Northern Ireland. British troops, having just finished fighting the strike by firemen, are ready to commandeer tanker trucks and take over gas stations. Had the firemen's strike not been settled, the government had plans to call in troops from its European allies.

INDONESIA — The broad protest movement launched by Indonesian students against the Suharto regime is growing. University students in the capital city of Jakarta, the main center of the protests, have organized a series of rallies and meetings condemning the fascist policies of the Suharto regime.

To stamp out this resistance, the regime has mobilized police, which have responded with violence and the arrest of many students. But the growing student movement shows their determination to carry the struggle forward.

IRAN — Massive anti-government demonstrations broke out in the city of Tabriz, Iran. Angry responding to police violence, the demonstrators set fire to four hotels, and stormed movie theatres and banks. One theatre was burned and many cars were set ablaze. The Iranian Army has now taken over control of the city and over 250 people have been arrested.



MOROCCO — Eighty-five political prisoners are entering the second month of a hunger strike. The prisoners are demanding to be transferred to Casablanca where they can receive family visitors. They are also calling for decent treatment from their jailers. Amnesty International reports prolonged incommunicado detention before trial, extremely bad conditions in prisons and the use of state security laws to suppress political and social opposition.

ITALY — On January 21-24, the Communist Party of Italy (Marxist-Leninist) held its third national Congress in Firenze. The Congress was attended by delegates from throughout the country. The majority of delegates were workers in basic industry, but there were also present agricultural workers, revolutionary intellectuals and students and workers from all sectors of service and industry.

Reports from the Congress included a criticism/self-criticism of the activity of the Central Committee and on the experience of the Party. Another report stressed the fundamental importance of proletarian internationalism and the question of unity of the Marxist-Leninist Parties throughout the world. This report also discussed relations between the PCI(M-L) and other parties. Another report dealt with the immediate struggle facing the working class, especially the rise of neo-fascism, and the importance of following the mass line to reinforce the vanguard role of the PCI(M-L).



National Liberation

ERITREA — The Eritrean People's Liberation Army, in its forward march to completely rid its soil of the Ethiopian aggressors, has recently scored a chain of spectacular victories. Five important towns — Dongolo, Ghinda, Emba Atkala, Mai Haber and Nefasit — on the Asmara-Massawa road, have been liberated. Dongolo is an important naval training center for the Ethiopians where over 3,500 aggressor troops were decimated by the EPLA. Ghinda, an important site of citrus plantations, was liberated on the same day. Also, important garrisons on the road to the capital city of Asmara were overrun.

The fascist junta had attempted to dispatch troop reinforcements from both Asmara and Massawa but failed after its troops were unable to break through EPLA lines and were forced to retreat.

In liberating the five towns, the strategic Asmara-Massawa asphalted road is now under the complete control of the EPLA. This means that the liberation of Asmara and Massawa will be accelerated.

The EPLA is firmly holding its position in Massawa. Although the Ethiopian aggressors have used air raids and shelling by Soviet warships to break the EPLA siege, the EPLA maintains the upper hand and is pushing hard to complete the liberation of the strategic port city.

PHILIPPINES — Telling blows have been dealt to the reactionary Marcos regime by Philippine guerilla forces, especially by Moslem rebels on Mindanao, Sulu and Jolo islands. Enemy troops, though strongly reinforced, suffered defeat in their "mopping up" operations and were forced to withdraw. In the southern part of Basilan Island, a number of police and military installations have also been destroyed.

Popular indignation against the fascist government is increasing and the people are rising in struggle against the anti-popular and pro-imperialist policy it pursues. These uprisings clearly show that the Philippine people do not reconcile themselves to oppression and exploitation and are determined to wage armed struggle to realize their aspirations.

ZIMBABWE — The Zimbabwean people are intensifying their armed struggle against the racist Rhodesian regime. Recently, a unit of Zimbabwean guerilla forces attacked a military base in Nyamrocco, in the northeast part of the country, where numerous Rhodesian forces had been concentrated. The military barracks were set on fire and many vehicles destroyed. Many racist forces were killed or wounded.

Through these victories, the Zimbabwean people have rebuffed the alleged "transition with stages of the power to the majority" being plotted in Washington and London. This scheme aims to liquidate their armed struggle and keep their country tied to U.S. imperialism.



PUERTO RICO — The 6,200 member Electrical, Industry and Irrigation Workers' Union (UTIER) has been on strike for over two months against the Water Resources Authority. The UTIER downed tools after several fruitless months in negotiations with the WRA.

Because the UTIER controls a vital sector of the Puerto Rican economy (electrical power) and is one of the most militant unions in the country, the WRA and the colonial government have waged a vicious media campaign of lies and slanders to discredit the workers. The colonial administration wants to weaken or destroy the UTIER in order to be able more strongly to combat the drive of other public employees for unionization.

In the face of vicious provocations and the refusal of the WRA to

tiate in good faith, as well as a systematic attack against UTIER and other labor leaders in the country, UTIER has been forced to resort to sabotage — cutting wires and poles, dismantling and blowing up towers. The UTIER has broad sympathy among the entire Puerto Rican proletariat.

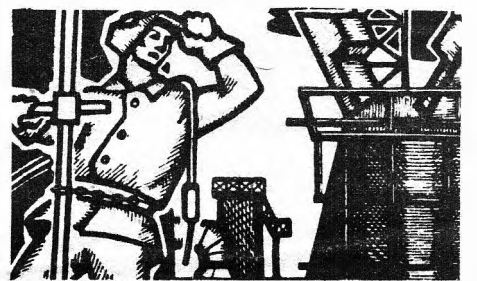
