Crisis Sparks Upsurge

The words "the great depression" are on everyones lips. And these three words hold the anger, the frustration, and the fear that confronts almost every worker, every member of a working class family in the USNA today. The tens of millions who have been denied the right to ever have a job. The millions of unemployed and the millions who wonder when it is going to happen to them.

The apologists for capitalism assured everyone, including Karl Marx himself, that the "great depression" had been a fluke, that they had it all under control, that it "couldn't happen here". But it is happening. More and more families are going without, going hungry, losing the possessions they bought with the promises of the future.

Their resistance is widespread, it is deep and strong. It is a hatred and an anger building below the surface of the whole society. Here and there it breaks out - in the voices of the 10,000 who marched for jobs in D.C. in February. In the anger that booed the bourgeois politicians from the April 26 podium and kept them from

preaching the promises that had formerly bought silence. In the union halls, the strike votes, in the wildcats, on the picket lines; Pennsylvania state employees, railroad workers, postal employees, longshore workers, N.Y. City employees - all and more have been rising in struggle in the last few weeks.

The anger is demanding answers! Ford vetoes every job bill before him. The Democratic Party offers nothing but vague promises of "concern". And all the while they try to hide the mushroom cloud of war that is the only solution their party has ever had for

unemployment.

The fascists from the Klan to George Wallace are even promising jobs ...but how and for whom, they don't say. For the fascist solution is slaughter and increased exploitation and murder and terror to control working class outrage.

Workers are rejecting these solutions, which are no solutions at all. This was the message of the February and April rallies in Washington. These are the sentiments behind the Longshore workers who are rejecting a paltry bribe to a few, to fight for jobs and equality of work opportunity in

Frame-up-Klan, Police, Mine Owners Conspiracy

to Crush Miners Struggle

The story of Harlan County, Kentucky - "Bloody Harlan" - is the story of Appalachia. It is the story of the oppression, the exploitation, the murder of the working class. And it is the story of the heroic struggle of the workers against their lot under capitalism.

This week another dispicable chapter has been added to that story by the mine owners, and their servants in the state apparatus and in the foul Ku Klux Klan. The Klan and the police teamed up to arrest, beat up and file false charges against Bessie Lou Cornett. Bessie Lou Cornett is a leading fighter of the working class of Harlan County. She stands in the ranks of other working class heroes, like

Mother Jones and Harry Simms, who arose paper in the county that is not conin the struggles of the miners of Appalachia and are examples to workers everywhere.

Last year the miners of Harlan County struck for union recognition. During this strike a miner from the Highsplint mine was gunned down in cold blood by a company goon. Carrying on in their tradition of bravery, the miners fought back and finally won the right to unionize. Their victory was in large part due to the support for the strike organized by the women of Harlan. Bessie Lou Cornett headed up the formation of the Brookside Women's Club which was the focus of this support. Bessie Lou also helped to found the Harlan Labor News, the only newstrolled by the mine owners.

Everyone in Harlan recognizes Bessie Lou Cornett as an Anglo-American who is a fighter for the equality of and defense of the Negro workers. She has been active in support of the Save Georgetown Committee. This Committee was organized to save the homes of many Negro workers in Harlan, which the City Council is threatening to tear down.

Such a fighter for our class was bound to be the object of hatred and revenge for the mine owners. The Ku Klux Klan, representing the mine owners and doing their dirty work, threatened to "get" Bessie Lou, who had al-

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other interested parties, to take a stand and to organize against the new contract.

Over six years ago ILWU Local
13 in Los Angeles opened its ranks
to 600 new members.... The 600 were
brought into the Union under the newly
created classification of Terminal
Warehousemen. Previously the Union had
been divided into only two major classifications: "A-men" and "B-men."...
The "B" status refers to workers

The "B" status refers to workers who had achieved only limited registration or recognition by the PMA. B-men are guaranteed elevation to "A" status upon fulfillment of certain terms and conditions. To some extent the B-men are second class citizens within the Union because they do not share fully in all the benefits, rights and privileges that A men are entitled to. But the B-men are at Least officially on their way to full registration.

With the institution of the TW program, a third class of citizenship was created within the Union. TW's, who were and still are duespaying members of the ILWU, share in practically none of the benefits, rights and privileges that are enjoyed by A-men and, to some degree, by B-men..

Although it must be noted that 5 years ago the Union did manage to secure the registration of 400 TW's our of the original 600, this only made matters worse for the remaining At the union hiring hall TW's can be dispatched to jobs only after all the A- and B-men have had their choice of jobs. When 400 TW's were suddenly elevated to "B" status, the consequence was a severe scarcity of job opportunities for the remaining TW's. This has resulted in a situation of extreme inequality of job opportunities for men within the same union within the same port. Today the average TW works from 2 to 3 days per week while registered men work from 5 to 7 days per week.

Over the years the TW situation seemed to degenerate from bad to worse. The Container Freight Station jobs which the Union used to reserve exclusively for TW's were handed over to A- and B-men. During the last strike TW's were denied unemployment benefits due to a legal technicality. TW's were deprived of the right to accept "comebacks" on jobs This meant that if a TW caught a job on a ship that was expected to work for several days, he would have to return to the dispatch hall after only

one day, whereas if a registered man had picked up the same job, he could stay on the job for as many days as the ship was working.

The TW situation seemed to hav turned so bleak that we were all blinded with rage, frustration, alienation and dispair. The suddenly, within the last year, a few glimmers of hope began to shine. A new contract was to be negotiated. Perhaps with the right organization, with pressure exerted in the right places, the TW's could effectively demand recognition within the new contract. In order to accomplish this objective,

the TW's formed a committee which

started reasing funds with a raffle and a big dance.

Uniting with a group of B-men from Port Hueneme, the TW committee drafted a proposal for the joint registration of TW's and the transfer of B-men from Port Hueneme to Local 13. In Port Hueneme work is scarce and around 55 B-men are anxious to transfer to L.A. where there is work. Since their problem is quite similar to the problem of the TW's, we decided to join the two issues into one proposal.

Subsequently, the Committee sent representatives up to the Union Caucuses and the contract negotiations in San Francisco in order to push for the adoption of our proposal. While these have resulted in some effort unofficial "gentlemen's agreements", nothing concerning the TW issue has as yet been committed to paper. Indeed, many of us feel that these agreements are merely appeasements designed to keep us quiet while the PMA and the Union leadership ramrod a rotten contract down the throats of the rank and file membership. This new contract, which we had hopes of being the solution to our problem, actually threatens the dissolution of our

The new contract which ILWU President Harry Bridges is attempting to sell to the Union, actually represents a capitalist instrument of working class oppression. Essentially it is no different from the contract that the rank and file turned down in March. It guarantees money to the few while sacrificing jobs. It represents a vicious attack upon the hiring hall, one of the fundamental concepts upon which our union was founded. The contract does nothing about the unequal work opportunities created by the employers' increased hiring of steady men. Furthermore, the new contract incorporates some additionally oppressive conditions.

It empowers the Area Arbitrator with dictatorial controls over the Union through the administration of the Pay Guarantee Plan. Under the

pretense of avoiding unwarranted PGP payments, the Area Arbitrator has final say over such matters as the abolition of so-called "obsolete boards," the assignment of men in a port to day shifts versus night shifts, and the determination of the number of identified regular gangs in a port.

In addition the contract requires that all registered men shall be disqualified from PGP payments in a port where a work stoppage occurs by reason of Union policy, local or international. In other words, the new contract engages in extortion in order to discourage longshoremen from respecting boycotts and picket lines.

Finally, according to something known as the 9.2 provision of the new contract, men from low work opportunity ports could be forced to transfer to other ports where greater work opportunity exists, and the locals involved would be forced to accept such transfers.

This 9.2 provision is especially disturbing to the TW's. If literally interpreted the 9.2 provision could have allowed PMA to forcibly require the transfer of men from other ports to Local 13 before the TW issue could be resolved. Such a move would have effectively crushed the TW's. Although the TW Committee has managed to obtain assurances that the TW issue would be resolved before the 9.2 provision would ever be implemented in the Port of Los Angeles, we must not allow such concessions to blind us to the basic injustices embodied in the 9.2 provision and in the contract as a whole.

Many of us feel that the concessions, the assurances, the appeasements and gentlemens' agreements will not hold up once the new contract is ratified. We, as TW's, have decided to not permit ourselves to be bribed into remaining silent on the issue of the new contract. This contract is an abridgement (no pun intended) of all the rights and principles that our Union ever stood for.

Therefore, a dedicated group of TW's has determined to organize to take a stand in rejecting the new contract. We are printing bulletins dealing with contract issues. We are using our own funds to reprint copies of the contract to be distributed to the rank and file. We have been in touch with some of our fellow workers up and down the coast. And we are planning decisive, unified action.

It is our fervent hope that more and more union members follow our example in working to reject the contract.

Bessie Lou was arrested for "kidnapping" a woman and two children. The
supposed victims of this trumped up
kidnapping are the wife and two children of one of the leading Klansmen in
Harlan County. It is no coincidence
that when deputies arrested Bessie Lou,
the brother of the klansman whose wife
says she was kidnapped, was present.
The police beat Bessie up and have
threatened her life.

When she was released from jail pending trial, 6 thugs were sent to try to provoke an incident. The city attorney let it be known that they were still out to "get" her and that

it is not safe for her in Harlan County. The Klan is planning rallies in Padoucah and Harlan, Ky., on the 19th of July. Their goal is to use this incident to terrorize the whole working class.

Already the Kentucky NAACP is beginning investigation of the incident and Michigan Representative John Conyers is contacting other Congressmen to check into it. But this alone is not enough. We must all come to the defense of Bessie Lou Cornett. The attack against her is in every sense an attack on every worker. It is an attempt to stop the miners' struggle. It is an attempt to destroy the Harlan Labor News. It is an attempt to frustrate the strivings of the Negro workers for equality and to prevent their unity with Anglo-American workers.

Workers! Progressive people! Only working class.
