The 14th Young Socialist National Convention commends and upholds the July 5 National Committee decision "acknowledging the split of the Internationalist Tendency from the YSA, and informing members of the Internationalist Tendency that this status places them outside the constitutional provisions for membership in the YSA."

Motion by K. Hill: The national convention rejects the July 4, 1974 NEC expulsion of the Internationalist Tendency, which was accomplished without the provisions of accused YSA members as stated in Article X of the YSA constitution. This article states that accused members shall be furnished with written charges, shall have the right to a trial, and the right to appeal the trial decision.

- 2) The National Convention calls for the immediate readmission of all IT members expelled by the YSA NEC on July 4, 1974
- 3) The National Convention recommends that TT members suspected of indiscipline or disloyalty be afforded their right to establish their innocence. This can best be accomplished by following the mandated procedure contained in Article X of the YSA constitution.
- 4) The National Convention rejects the assertion that any YSA nember or group of members possesses privileges or rights not possessed by the YSA membership as a whole. In particular, the convention rejects the claim that tendencies or factions have the right to publicly present or advocate positions which are at variance with the stated positions of the YSA.
- 5) The National Convention reaffirms that the YSA is entitled to organize its internal discussion and to determine the forms and limits of such discussion. In particular, the National Convention reaffirms the Leninist position that a tendency or faction can circulate its own internal discussion bulletin only on the condition that it receives the prior approval of the YSA and that its bulletin is nade available to the appropriate leadership bodies of the YSA.
- 6) The National Convention reaffirms the Leninist position that tendency or faction finances, while permitted, must be subordinate to the financial needs of the YSA as a whole.

Motion by Graumann:

1) The action taken by the National Executive Committee (confirmed by the National Committee) in expelling the supporters of the Internationalist Tendency from the YSA without prior notification of charges, a formal hearing, opportunity for defense, or provision for appeal is a violation of the YSA constitution.

2) Therefore, the YSA National Convention rescinds the expulsion of the supporters of the Internationalist Tendency and authorizes the full and immediate reintegration at every level of all IT supporters who have appealed for such reintegration.

I. From the Revolutionary Marxist Party, Ceylon (Sri Lanka) Section of the Fourth International

We recall with pleasure the short visit of the present National Chairman of the YSA to Ceylon in July, 1970. Taking the chance of the holding of the Fourteenth National Convention of the Young Socialist Alliance, in which American young revolutionaries and others coming around the world will exchange their experience and will discuss the strategy of the youth movement at the center of imperialism, we want to announce the reestablishment of the Revolutionary Communist Youth.

A Preparatory Committee for reconstructing the Revolutionary Communist Youth (RCY) was formed in November 1974. There was a RCY founded in 1941. It was a Trotskyist youth organization fraternal with the Revolutionary Communist Party (RCP), the Chinese section of the Fourth International. The RCY fused to the RCP in 1954. It has not ever been rebuilt until last November.

Because of years of deepening politico-economic crisis of capitalism, struggles of masses rise throughout the world. Broad layers of the young generation have already nobilized and plunged into various fields of struggles. So as in Hong Kong, the youth radicalization evolved at the beginning of the 1970s. Through their own struggles and experiences, many of the radicalizing young people began grasping the nature of capitalism, and thus the nature of colonialism and imperialism. At the same time, the militancy of these young people always comes into conflict with the conservative, reactionary and treacherous policies of the Maoists. Their challenge to Maoism and their hostility to the colonial rule lead many of these young militants to come near to revolutionary Marxism.

The mobilization and struggle of youth provides the revolutionary party with excellent opportunities to recruit new elements. Nevertheless, the weakness of the youth movement should not be neglected. Because of the lack of a mass revolutionary party, and because of the lack of a mass base of their struggles, many impatient young men are infected with sectarianism and ultraleftism, or even become dispirited and disappear from the political scene. Their intent to "politicize" the mass struggle leads them further away from the real struggles of the masses and has already led many struggles into defeat.

Ideological differentiations among the youth at the same time widen. Anarchists, social denocrats, Maoists and revolutionary Marxists, all win new elements to their own camps.

Thus it is compulsorily necessary to build a centralized youth organization, guided by a revolutionary Marxist program, in order to direct effective interventions in the youth milieu, to lead the ideological struggles and finally to win the best young militants to revolutionary Marxism. To organize, educate and recruit young revolutionaries around the Trotskyist youth organization has become the central task of revolutionary Marxists here.

The Revolutionary Communist Youth wants to express its warmest greetings to this convention. As you know very well the Trotskyist movement came into existence as the nost consistent force defending and struggling for internationalism. We deeply believe that, without international collaboration, national groups could hardly be built or grow. Therefore, we very much regret that we can not send a representative to the convention, which, in the presence of its widely represented participants, is in fact a lively symbol of internationalism.

XI. From the Liga Comunista, Spanish Sympathizing Organization of the Fourth International

The companeros of the Liga Comunista, sympathizing organization of the Fourth International in Spain, sends revolutionary greetings to the 14th National Convention of the YSA.

We regret that we were not able to send somebody to your convention at this time, but our revolutionary tasks and opportunities are very great and the conditions very repressive.

We must work almost completely underground, talking to people individually, taking care that they are not agents of Franco's political police. Even though the conditions are repressive we are able to occupy an important place in the movement in Spain.

We know that we do not have enough strength or influence to lead the class struggle at this time, so we propose to the Communist Party and other left groups a united front, independent of the bourgeoise to confront the attacks of Francoism.

On the contrary, the Communist Party proposes a kind of popular front which they say can secure some democratic rights, just like they said about Chile. We say that only the independent action of the working class and their allies can win and secure real democratic rights.

Our political work involves work in the factories, in the neighborhoods, universities and high schools — where we are the main force. Right now there are strikes of bank workers where our tasks are very important. In the high schools and universities we worked to build solidarity with the last SEAT auto workers strike in Barcelona.

When the leaders of the SEAT strike were jailed, the workers again went out on strike and narched through the city. They were attacked by the police, but they went on anyway and eventually won the release of their leaders.

We presented our program of how to build a solidarity campaign to a mass meeting of students at the University of Barcelona and it was accepted. The university went on strike for four days. At this time, our recruitment has increased very much. The companeros don't have enough time to contact all the people who are asking for information about our group. Many students ask for our paper, Combate, which cannot be sold openly.

Like the rest of the capitalist world, Spain is in an economic crisis. Prices are rising, factories are being shut down, there is increasing unemployment. All these attacks are on the workers and oppressed classes.

At the same time the people are becoming more conscious and more willing to struggle against the attacks of the capitalist dictatorship. As the crisis of capitalism deepens and the consciousness of the people grows, Francoism, seeing its end, trys to stop what cannot be stopped, by increasing repression, breaking strikes, putting workers organizers in jail, attacking demonstrations—which can last for only 5 or 10 minutes—torturing political prisoners, it tries to stop the fight for a better society, for the socialist revolution that we are fighting for—all of us.

At the same time that your organization can serve as a model, you can help us in our struggle against Francoism by continuing your solidarity with the victims of repression, particularly the campaign for the freedom of the political prisoners. This is a concrete example of international solidarity, of internationalism, which is the foundation of our movement and which inspires us to believe that our struggle for world socialist revolution will be victorious.
