# A.E.U. and the Left

HAT game is the Executive Council of the A.E.U. playing? At Margate last year its delegation proposed the Confederation's plan for engineering. This was bitterly opposed by the Right Wing trade union leaders and their pet politicians in the Labour Party.

trade unions and members of the Party who have been classified under Right Wing terminology as "Bevanites" and this is as it should be. because the plan represented

an important step forward for the movement.

Now along come the nominations for the post of treasurer of the Labour Party. Once again the same people who defeated the A.E.U.-proposed plan for engineering rally round and present Mr. Gaitskell. The Left adopt Mr. Bevan as their candidate.

You would imagine that the E.C. of the A.E.U. would support a nominee representing the people who support union policy—but they do nothing of the sort. On the contrary, they support Mr. Gaitskell. Does this make sense?

Of course it doesn't, but it is understandable. A major problem in the trade union movement today is the utilisation of important positions by individuals who do not represent the opinions of the rank and file. If the E.C. of the A.E.U. were to consult its membership right now, we are absolutely convinced they would be forced to reconsider their position on Mr. Gaitskell.

However, we must face the facts. The decision has dealt a serious blow to all who fight for a socialist policy in the Labour Party and trade unions. For Labour's Left the lesson is painfully obvious.

We cannot institute decisive changes in the leadership of the Labour Party until we succeed in building up a solid foundation for such a change inside the trade unions. It is not enough to concentrate on the L.P. by itself. The battle has been won on this terrain.

We must now concentrate on work in trade unions to bring about changes in personnel and policy commensurate with developments in the Labour Party. There is absolutely no time to be lost in implementing this policy. That is the lesson from the A.E.U.

# Civil Defence

ONGRATULATIONS to Coventry City Council for reaffirming its decision to disband its Civil Defence committe and deciding to send no more delegates to Civil Defence conferences.

Other Labour Councils would assist the fight against war by taking similar action.

# Rights of Asylum

THE rights of political asylum are being discussed in Britain and in Mexico. In Britain the Tory government refuses to grant asylum to the young American lecturer, Dr. Cort, threatened with persecution if he returns to his own country. Contrast that with the stand of the Mexican government who have granted asylum to those Guatemalan citizens who have fled from the Armas terror.

The Mexican government has resisted all pressure to hand over those who have sought refuge in their embassy. These refugees, like Dr. Cort, are being accused of civil crimes.

"The basic principle on which Mexico will stand" said the "New York Times" Mexican correspondent on July 7, "is that the receiving country alone has the right to determine who should be given asylum." The Mexican government stands by the principles of political asylum; the Tory government tramples those principles and acts as a tool of McCarthy.

In last Sunday's "Observer", two columns of letters attacked the decision of the British government. These letters were evidence of a wide-spread alarm far beyond Labour's ranks. All the more reason why the British Labour Movement should bend every effort to prevent the expulsion of Dr.

# United Nations Organisation A Story of Deception

N April 25, 1945, the United Nations Organisation came into being at a conference in San Francisco. It was greeted with universal enthusiasm, equally by American Republicans and Moscow Communists. Tories, Liberals and Labour joined in the hosannahs of praise.

This was going to be the beginning of a new era in international relations. The aim of the new organisation was to be, according to its Charter "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war."

Indeed a noble aim!

Only the voices of a few leftsocialists were raised in warning. They pointed out that the majority of the countries forming the United Nations were capitalist countries. Their behaviour in combination would reflect their capitalist nature no less their behaviour as individual Wolves hunting in packs were just as much wolves as those prowling alone. Thieves and murderers do not cease to be murderers and thieves because they combine in gangs, indeed, they become more dangerous to the community.

## ARMED TO THE TEETH

Of course, the ink was hardly dry on the paper before all the signatories got down to the job of arming themselves with all the most modern weapons for waging That is how much faith they really had in all the fine words.

Today, less than a decade after that historic gathering in San Francisco, only a handful of Right Wing Labour leaders and a few liberals have any illusions left about U.N.O. Events have shattered the hopes of the rest of man-kind. And it could not have been
