"After I was expelled there was an all-London docks strike demanding our re-instatement. Union officials intimated to the men that if I made application to rejoin they were sure no obstacle would be placed in my way. When we returned to work a great number of men were under the impression that I would be immediately readmitted.

"I myself was informed by officials that if my application for re-admittance went through the constitutional channels they had no reason to believe it would be

"In the five years since then I have made many applications through constitutional channels. At this moment I am making fresh application.

"If the constitution works in this way it cannot hold out much prospect for the Hull dockers."



This feeling has been demonstrated by the resolutions passed calling for strike action. Last week-end the important Manchester N.U.R. District Council instructed the N.E.C. to call a strike.

A significant factor is that the official price index has shot forward again after a period of stability, with a rise of three points in two months and now stands at 43 per cent above 1947. There can be no doubt about the connection between the price index and the refusal of the Transport Commission to pay railwaymen decent

The Tory railway management, along with the Churchill Govern-ment, argue that substantial increases in wages can only be met by increasing rail fares and rates generally. Transport being a key industry and its cost entering into the price of all articles, the lifting of railway wages would make inevitable the raising of prices generally to the detriment of the export drive and producing more trouble in the rest of industry. So argues Toryism.

A SOLUTION

Old People Will Sufter

AFTER February, 1955 dreds of London's Old Age Pensioners will be "on the bread line". This has been decreed by the Tory Minister of Food, who has instructed the L.C.C. to close all its civic restaurants—29 in Many London workers who have

to travel considerable distances to their place of employment will no longer be able to get a hot midday meal at a reasonable price, which means they just won't get a hot mid-day meal. They will have to pack bread and whatever they can find to put on it.

"Bun and tea" lunches are already the staple mid-day meal of many London clerks and have frequently been the cause of much comment on the detrimental effects to health which such inadequate meals produce. The closing of the civic restaurants can only add to this problem, but of course Mr. Gwilym Lloyd George is concerned with Food, not Health.

AXE ON POOREST True to the policy of Toryism,

the Food Minister brings down the axe on those who feel it most, and while the workers manage on sandwiches the Minister and his friends will continue to enjoy in comfort their well-prepared lunches in their private clubs with something rather stronger than tea to wash it down.


