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Get tough with Caterpillar bosses, and all bosses!

Caterpillar bosses say that they are going to hire scabs if Caterpillar workers don't go back to work and work for whatever Caterpillar bosses are willing to pay them.

Kroger bosses are saying the same thing to Kroger workers. Private gunmen are suddenly putting ads in Detroit want ads, asking for "strike security personnel." They are obviously looking for, and ready to pay, professional strikebreakers.

Coleman Young says that Detroit city workers must take pay cuts, or he is going to lay-off thousands. "If the city's 16,000 union employees reject the offer, Young warned, he'll make sure they regret it ..." (Detroit Free Press, April 10, page 1).

Some may say that Young has no alternative. This is not true. If he were really concerned about the Black people, and the white working people in the Detroit area, he could use his position to mobilize the people to force the privileged classes to come up with the funds necessary to finance services. Instead he uses his position to try to force working people, Black and white, to pull in their belts, while rich white corporate executives and politicians get fatter and fatter.

All these things show that it is high time for workers and their unions to get tough with the basses

We need a nationwide UAW strike, with mass-picketing aimed at stopping every single scab now!

If Kroger workers walk out, we should be prepared to support them with mass-picketing, a boycott of Kroger stores, and a citywide strike, if necessary. The same goes for city workers.

The top union leaderships continue to drag their feet, fight with one hand tied behind their backs. Caterpillar workers have already been out for five months! Should we leave them out there another five months, all by themselves? If everyone in the UAW would go out for one day, Caterpillar bosses would suddenly see things a little differently.

Victory would not be guaranteed. But the workers would have a fighting chance.

This is why we say: Get tough with Caterpillar bosses and all bosses now! For a national UAW strike now!

There are lots of things that you can do to push things in this direction.

Ask you union representatives and your union locals to support Caterpillar workers, collect funds for them, send delegations to support them, organize meetings and demonstrations in solidarity with them, circulate petitions, adopt resolutions, calling for a national UAW strike now ...

If Kroger workers strike ...

As we are completing this issue of *Truth*, it is not yet clear whether Kroger workers are going to strike or not. If they do strike, we urge all working people in the Detroit area to support this strike. Don't shop at Krogers. Join striking Kroger workers on their picket lines. Help them stop scabs from taking their jobs. Write and distribute literature as widely as possible in solidarity with striking Kroger workers.

Why should young people be socialists?

What does the present system, capitalism, have to offer young people today? Low wage jobs, expensive education; war; racism. We believe all of these (and more) are the result of a system organized for profit, not people; for the interests of the rich, not for the interests of the working and

What do the elite who run things today want us to believe? They want us to believe the politicians will solve our problems; that we can't really change anything ourselves; that capitalism is the best system to live and grow under; that this is a democracy; that the American Dream is alive and well.

And the social force, the working class, exists to take that productive power from the rich and to put it into the hands of the world.

We think that such a world, a socialist world. is the only world worth fighting for. And we think the young people of the United States, and the young people of South Africa, South America, Southeast Asia . . . young people everywhere will play an absolutely vital role in winning that world.

And how will we young people win? We will be smart. We will know our enemy: the rich capitalists who live off our blood and sweat. We will know our enemy's tricks

The break up of the USSR.

Many old socialists and communists are shedding tears over the break up of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR) and the growth of various nationalist movements. They don't realize that the USSR was not founded on the working class, revolutionary, and socialist basis that the workers, and revolutionaries like Lenin and Trotsky, fought for. It was founded on the Great Russian chauvinist and nationalist basis that Stalin sought; thus, it was bound to come apart, sooner or later, Instead of shedding tears, revolutionaries should be in the front ranks of struggles for the right to self-determination, for the total destruction of the Stalinist bureaucracy, for a new workers revolution in which workers establish their own governments and direct, workers control of the planned economies. Here is part of what Trotsky had to say about the question of independence for the Ilkraine.

. Do the broad masses of the Ukrainian people wish to separate from the USSR? It might at first sight appear difficult to answer this question, inasmuch as the Ukrainian people, like all other people in the USSR, are deprived of any opportunity to express their will. But the very genesis of the totalitarian regime and its ever more brutal intensification, especially in the Ukraine, are proof that the real will of the Ukrainian masses irreconcilably hostile to the bureaucracy. There is no lack of evidence that one of the primary sources of this hostility is the suppression of Ukrainian independence. The nationalist tendencies in the Ukraine erupted violently in 1917-19. The *Borotha* party expressed these tendencies in the left wing. The most important indication of the success of the Leninist policy in the Ukraine was the fusion of the Ukrainian Bolshevik Party with the organization of the Borothists.

In the course of the next decade, however, an actual break occurred with the Borotha group, whose leaders were subjected to persecution. The old Bolshevik, Skrypnik, a pure-blooded Stalinist, was driven to suicide in 1933 for his allegedly excessive patronage of nationalist ten-dencies. The actual "organizer" of this suicide was the Stalinist emissary, Postyshev, who thereupon remained in the Ukraine as the representative of the centralist policy. Presently, however, Postyshev himself fell into disgrace. These facts are profoundly symptomatic, for they reveal how much force there is behind the pressure of the nationalist opposition on the bureaucracy. Nowhere did the purges and repressions assume such a savage and mass character as they did in the Ukraine.

Significant Attitudes of Ukrainians Abroad

Of enormous political importance is the sharp turn away from the Soviet Union of Ukrainian democratic elements outside the Soviet Union. When the Ukrainian problem became aggravated at all; but the voices of the Ukrainian clericals and National-Socialists were loud enough. This means that the proletarian vanguard has let the Ukrainian national movement slip out of its hands and that this movement has progressed far on the road of separatism. Lastly, very indicative also are the moods among the Ukrainian emigres in the North American continent. In Canada, for instance, where the Ukrainians compose the bulk of the Communist Party, there began in 1933, as I am informed by a prominent participant in the movement, a marked exodus of Ukrainian workers and farmers from communism, falling either into passivity or nationalism of various hues. In their totality, these symptoms and facts incontestably testify to the growing strength of separatist tendencies among the Ukrainian mas-

This is the basic fact underlying the whole problem. It shows that despite the giant step forward taken by the October Revolution in the domain of national relations, the isolated proletarian revolution proved incapable of solving the national question, especially the Ukrainian question, which is, in its very essence, international in character. The Thermidorian reaction, crowned by the Bonapartist bureaucracy, has thrown the toiling masses far back in the national sphere as well. The great masses of the Ukrainian people are dissatisfied with their national fate and wish to change it drastically. It is this fact that the revolutionary politician must, in contrast to the bureaucrat and the sectarian, take as his point of departure...(Leon Trotsky, Writings 1939-40) ■

Kate Kaku, Socialist Workers Party Candidate for U.S. Senate in Illinois, and Mary Zins, were arrested during the Caterpillar workers' rally in Peoria, Illinois, on March 22, and charged with criminal trespassing. UAW officials and Peoria police told all the working class and socialist groups distributing literature at the rally to keep their distance, or they would be arrested. The Socialist Workers Party members, and everyone less including Tank distributors, protested but we had else, including Truth distributors, protested, but we had no alternative but to follow their orders, since we didn't have the forces to confront them. UAW officials should get tough with Caterpillar bosses, not with working class and socialist groups that support the workers!

Truth distributed 20 copies of the last issue of Truth at a meatpacking plant and an autoplant. We talked to a number of workers about defending women's right to abortion. We found no small number of workers who were against abortion, but they were convinced that a woman should have the right to decide this question herself, without interference from the government, or anyone else. The demonstration for the right to abortion in Washington, D.C. on April 5, was one of the largest in over 20 years.

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
