THE EMPLOYERS' ASSOCIATION JOINS HANDS WITH GOMPERS

American Federation of Labor to Assist Citizens' Alliance in War Against American Labor Union and Affiliated Bodies--Want A. F. of L. to Contest the West--Gompers Lauded by President of Citizens' Alliance.

The following Chicago dispatch which appeared in the Kansas City Times of October 1st is of a most startling character, revealing as it does the manifold dangers which threaten organized labor from both within and without.

The Chicago special to the Kansas City Times is as follows: Will Try To Disrupt.

"Complete disruption of the American Labor Union and the Western Federation of Miners is one of the tasks to be undertaken by the National Employers' Association, which was launched in Chicago Tuesday night by D. M. Parry, F. W. Job, E. F. DeBrul and other prominent leaders in the movement to organize manufacturers, which is spreading over the country.

Repeated Blows To Be Struck. "Blows at the western labor organizations are to be struck repeatedly and the American Federation of Labor is to be invited by the employers to step into the western field and reorganize the movement.

Dangerous to Community. "The American Labor Union and the Western Federation of Miners must go. Both organizations have reached the point where they are dangerous to the community at large.

Manufacturers Will Join Hands. "The manufacturers who will join in this movement of employers will assist in clarifying the dangerous western situation and I believe that the time is not far away when the American Labor Union and the Western Federation of Miners will be wiped out of existence."

THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTION REVIEWED BY CLARENCE SMITH

August 13 commenced a series of weekly contributions by the secretary-treasurer, reviewing the newly proposed constitution, which will be voted upon by referendum of the membership of the American Labor Union in December, 1903.

ARTICLE VI.

In the American Labor Union the Vice-Presidency is an office of considerable importance. In addition to the Vice-Presidency itself, the office carries with it membership on the General Executive Board and a regular compensation when employed in an organizing capacity.

Article 6 treats of the Vice-President, how nominated and elected, duties, powers and compensation. Section 1 reads:

"Section 1. The General Vice-President shall be nominated and elected as provided in this constitution and shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified and installed."

The above section refers to Article 11, which covers completely the nomination and election of all general officers and members of the General Executive Board under the initiative and referendum system.

Section 2 is so simple and clear that no further explanation or discussion is required than the reading of the section itself. The section is as follows:

"Sec. 2. He shall assist the General President in the discharge of his duties as presiding officer at all sessions of the General Convention, and during the temporary absence of the General President he shall be presiding officer of the General Convention."

Following is section 3:

"Sec. 3. When required by the General Executive Board, he shall devote his entire time under the instruction of the General President to the interests of the American Labor Union and shall perform such duties as the General President may direct."

The above section authorizes the General Executive Board to keep the Vice-President in the field part or all of the time, under the direction of the President.

Section 4 is authority for the Vice-President to succeed to the Presidency in the event of the death, resignation or removal of the President. The section reads:

"Sec. 4. In case of the death, resignation or removal of the General President, he shall discharge the duties and assume the responsibilities of the office of General President until his successor is duly installed."

Section 5 fixes the compensation of the General Vice-President, and as follows:

"Sec. 5. When devoting his entire time to the interests of the American Labor Union, he shall receive as compensation for his services one hundred and twenty-five dollars per month, payable monthly, and when absent from his headquarters in the interests of the American Labor Union, he shall receive reasonable traveling and living expenses, payable only upon the submission of the regular expense account form adopted by the American Labor Union."

This ends Article 6. Article 7 treats of the Secretary-Treasurership, and will be treated in a discussion next week. The article is lengthy and important, and will probably require two issues of the Journal to cover satisfactorily. Fraternal yours,

Let us get our definitions on straight. A non-union man is simply an unorganized worker and frequently contains the very best union timber. A scab is a man who injures his fellows by breaking or attempting to break a strike. His motives may be various. He may be rendered reckless by long idleness, by hunger or he may have a grievance, real or fancied, against the union on strike or again he may be a miserably "sucker" who hopes to get a pension by standing by the boss. A workman who joins the Citizens' Alliance has not yet been labeled for the reason that no word in the vocabulary would do justice to him. It would be a gross injustice to the gods to call him by that name. Everything that is low, treacherous, contemptible and vile, that the workingman member of the Citizens' Alliance is—and more. The "pregnant hinges of his knee" are in a well-oiled condition, and "fawning for favor" is his long suit. It is fashionable to drag in Benedict Arnold and Judas to parallel an infamy, but neither of these much-used men would clasp hands with this modern traitor to, and assassin of his class. Arnold was a brave man and smarted under a sense of injustice and unappreciation. Judas acted on the spur of the moment and bitterly regretted his deed, but so excuse, no palliation, no apologies can be offered for him who coldly and deliberately engages in a movement which has for its purpose the destruction of those organizations which have thus far prevented the United States from becoming an industrial China.

In the Ladies' Home Journal for September, nine "famous" women tell what they would do if they, each of them, had a million dollars. The uses to which so great an amount of money would be put are stated variously, from the relief of needy clergymen and widows to establishing drinking fountains for dogs. The pathetic thing about it all is that a full page of a journal with a million circulation is wasted with such nonsense, when it could have been used to go good advantage in a sane, sensible discussion of how to displace a

system that creates all the terrible situations sought to be relieved by these "famous" women with a system of society which, by guaranteeing equal opportunities to create wealth to all humanity, and to every person the full social product of his or her labor, would abolish the very things these women would temporarily relieve. Can't these "famous" women see that their reforms would be at best only a temporary patch-work upon a system that is rotten to the core?

Now that Carnegie's toes are hanging over the edge of the unknown and the time not far distant when he must make the acquaintance of his God, he takes to heart the Scriptural injunction about the rich man's difficulty in reaching the New Jerusalem, and attempts to divest himself of his capital like a thief sure of capture throwing away his ill-gotten plunder in the hope of lessening the evidence against him. Judged by human standards, all his so-called charities will never wipe out the blood spatter on his wealth. Indications are that Andrew is "up against it."

Captain H. M. Burge, senior commander of the United States navy, a veteran who served under Farragut, has donated \$500 to the defense fund of the Cripple Creek strike, and says there is more where it came from. His sympathy was awakened by learning the miners were actuated by a devotion to principle. The trade of a human butcher does not seem able to corrupt a real man. It is only the bully, the worthless scamp who becomes heartless and blood-mad when protected by a uniform.

It is stated that Postmaster General Payne contemplates making every passenger train a mail train. The object is frankly stated to be to obviate the possibility of interference with interstate commerce and passenger traffic by strikers, as in time past. Now, workingmen, what are you going to do about it? You know a railroad strike involves the stoppage of passenger traffic if it is to win. Will you pass some more

resolutions? Or will you ask the administration to bounce Mr. Payne, and make place for some one else who would act as Payne acted. Are you not forced into politics to retain your place on the planet?

When a union of employers professes to be friendly to a labor organization it usually means that they have nothing to fear from the union. fare.

"Organization, education and agitation" presupposes something to work on. When material is absent either of the three is impossible.
