The June number of the Messenger, hed by the Precious Blood Order, contains a communication from the pen w. Mueller to prove that Jesus and the early church defended the right of property. Like Helter. Sherman, Kress and other consecrated hirelings in service of crime, he pours out torrents of abuse and floods of vomit to feed the diseased imaginations of his ignorant readers. The Rev. member of the Precious Blood Order garbles scripture to maintain his position, quoting only the passages that were interpolated into the New Testament when Christianity was losing its original character by the corruption that followed the conversion of the ruiing class and the consequent domination of ecclesiastical politicians in the organized church. The coronation of Constantine the Great was the apostolic spirit in the young religion, and the baptism of the royal murderer was the birth of a new era in the history of Christianity. Catholicism peri hed on the shores of the Tiber, Catholicism was the religiou of Josus. Romanism is the ecclesiastical policy of designing statesmen who have ever used the church for the aggrandizement of their families and the accomplishment of their nefarious intrigues. The spirit of Romanism is antegonistic to the spirit of Christianity and no honest and intelligent Catholic can identity himself with the policy that originated in the Imperial City, and grew in the Lateran and the Vatican, till it triumphed over the pretensions of Alexandria and Constantinople, forcing kings and emperors to bow in submisson to its throne and blighting the hopes and aspirations of freedom in every land where its supremacy has been recognized. Romanism has been the foe of light and liberty, and is responsible for the ignorance that prevailed throughout the Dark Ages. Its influence on the enlightenment and morality of the world is seen today in Spain, Italy, Austria, Mexico and the South American states. It has spent its energies in condemning every book that revealed the posteries of nature, in forbidding the people to read, in torturing the scholars who dared to proclaim scientific truths, in hunting the sons of freedom and consigning them to the lurid flames, in slaughtering the heretics and infidels because they would not submit to her despotism, in establishing the inquisition and terrifying the cringing multitude with the Auto-da-fe. The history of Romanism is the triumph of ignorance and brutality. There is not an intelligent Catholic on the globe who does not detest Romanism and repudiate its claims. Cathoricism stands for love and mercy. Socialism stands for justice and freedom. Romanism stands for ignorance and crime. Therefore no Catholic and no Socialist can be a Romanist. Do we want our public schools destroyed? Then support the pretension of Romanism. Do we want monarchy enthroned on the ruins of our free institutions? Then rally around the fing of Romanism. France was compelled to expel the emissaries of the Vatican to preserve her liberty. Spain is crying out in her death throes for the expatration of the monks, "Away from Rome" is the shibboleth of the Austrian liberals. The South American republics resist the pretensions of Romanism, and the Catholic Filipinos are determined to banish the friars from their shores. It is not surprising to the student of history, who is tamiliar with the bloody record of Romanism, that this diabolical institution is opposed to the spiration of the toiling hosts in their fight for industrial democracy, There is not a crime in the calendar that Romanism has not glorified, or t virtue that it has not stigmatized, when such perversity would advance the cause of the ecclesiastical politicians. The benefit of the clergy which prevailed throughout the Middle Ages exempted the agents of Romanism from responsibility to civil courts, and the sacred tribunals invariably exonerated the tonsured criminals, and theft, perjury, forgery, murder and assassination were sanctified in the garb of religion. The Order of the Precious Blood is honored with the membership of Father Walser, who was recently arrested for the murder of Agatha Reichlin and Rev. Mueller, who is affiliated with the same religious fraternity, defends the accused priest. If the proofs against the morality of Socialism were as strong as the evidences criminating Father Walser it would long ago have been condemned by the common sense of humanity and would have perished in its infancy before its fair character had ever been tarnished by the foul slime of Romanism. If the ethical code of Socialism were identical with the ethical code of Romanism it would not be tolerated in any civilization on the globe. Rev. 

### Benevolent Methods of - Capitalist Education



The capitalists have always considered themselves the natural superiors and guardians of the working class. If they have not openly claimed the the grace of God, as monarchs and American trust magnates do, every act shown that they accept this doctrine as the only rational one. Quite naturally, therefore, they have felt it to be incumbent upon LOSE BUT YOUR CHAINS. YOU them to care for the education of the working class.

Now you cannot change human nature, as the capitalist apologists say this is true, it means that a capitalist is always anxious to teach the working class everything that will abolish the easy snap of the capitalist! uliarity of capitalist teaching to insist that the whole capitalist sys tem is run exclusively for the benefit of the working class.

The capitalists are so modest that they never tell the workers in public deration for their feelings, what the logical conclusion of the capitalist philosophy is. But in private, among themselves, they freely express the opinion that were it not for the capitalist generosity the working class would not even be in existence. They point to no less a man than Kari Marx to prove this. For does not Marx say that the capitalist mode of production creates the modern working class? And did not the capitalists create the capitalist system? Well, then, since the capitalsts are the creators of the system, they are also the creators of the working class. This is good reasoning, and misses only the insignificant point that there was a working class before there was a capitalist system. But who would take such matters

The capitalists are thoroughly convinced that the working men are very stunid fellows. And so they lose no opportunity to improve the education of the workers by word and deed. Only on a few days in the year do the capitalists deny themselves the pleasure of promoting the welfare of the working That is on Decoration Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, and last, not election day. But all the rest of the time the capitalists take their educational mission very seriously, and proceeding on the principle "Spare the rod and spoil the child" they chastise the working people out of sheer love for them! And as is usual in such cases, the capitalists pretend to feel the pain

The capitalists do not believe that it is good for the working class to have of money, to wear fine clothes, and to live in beautiful homes. They say it would make them lazy and unfit to learn. And so they never give the working people the full product of their toil. The capitalists take good care of the greater part of what the working class produces, and go to a great deal of inconvenience to spend as much of it as possible, so that the workers may not be tempted to endanger the salvation of their souls! Rather than risk the salvation of the working class, the capitalists sacrifice their own salvation by handling as much of the filthy lucre as possible!

It is a sad, but true, fact that the workers do not appreciate the colicitude of the capitalists for them. Very often the workers unite in unions and demand more of that dangerous wealth which they have created. But when they get too obstraperous, the capitalists, tike good parents and guardians, shun no expense to convince the workers of their wrong. First the capitalists try to convince the workers that the blessings of work for as little as possible is absolutely necessary for their own good.
