house, quickly responding, declared that a second had been ordered by unanimous consent, and that the two speakers of the committee had each twenty minutes to introduce the bill. The purpose of these tactics will be understood when it is known that the bill contained a section which was not germane to the militia organization, and that by ordering a second the discussion of the bill was limited to a few minutes, giving the opposition no time to study and amend the bill.

"That for the purpose of providing a reserve force of trained men which shall be ready FOR IMMEDIATE SERVICE whenever called for and organized under authority of congress—(which authority would have been given by the passing of the bill)—the secretary of war is authorized to apportion among the several states and territories and to enroll not exceeding 100,000 men, who shall have served in the regular or volunteer armies of the United States, or in the organized militia. Such reserve force shall be designated as the national volunteer reserve, and WHEN CALLED FORTH BY THE PRESIDENT SHALL SERVE WHEREVER ORDERED WITHIN OR WITHOUT THE TERRITORY OF THE UNITED STATES. SUCH ENROLLMENT SHALL IN EACH CASE CONTINUE FOR A PERIOD OF FIVE YEARS, but in the event they shall be called into the service of the United States, other than for the purpose of drill, inspection and instruction, they shall be entitled to be discharged at the close of the war or after nine months service."

Man. In an article which appeared in the News Record today, the Rev. Father Heiter says, "the better class of citizens are organizing to bring labor and capital together, but all the while Socialists are trying to keep these two forces apart."

Man. "Let us credit Father Heiter with honesty and sincerity, and then, if possible, let us also credit him with a clear understanding of the matter in question."

Man. "According to Father Heiter's view, labor and capital ARE apart; for, does he not say, 'the better class of citizens are organizing to bring labor and capital together.'"

Man. "Now, all authorities worth mentioning unite in the assertion that capital is that portion of labor's product which labor uses in the production of wealth. Therefore labor can only be apart from capital when the laborers refuse to use the capital, or when the capitalists will not permit them to do so."

Man. "But in many instances the capitalists demand so large a portion of labor's product that the laborers refuse to work; and, as a result of this unjust interference, this unrighteous meddling of the capitalists, labor and capital are parted from each other."

Man. "In view of these facts, which prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that the contention is between the laborers, who should have the full product of their toil, and the capitalists, who should not have any portion whatever; in view of the fact that the contention is between the exploited laborers and the exploiting capitalists, how can Father Heiter or any one else be credited with anything better than a very dull comprehension, when he asserts that Socialists, who are simply pointing out this fact, are trying to keep labor and capital apart?"

The opposition to Socialism in Fort Smith is so fierce on the part of the bourgeois democrats, that many Appeal subscribers are taking the paper under assumed names, and the comrades intend to organize secretly into a local Comrade Bohannon is working slowly through the state. The old populists in the country districts are calling for agitators and organizers, and are beginning to manifest a lively interest in the struggle.
