Shall We "Let The Women Do The Work?"

The Appeal gang doesn't know how the balance of the Army feel about this proposition, but we have decided to let the "women do the work" on No. 476. A few weeks ago, when the woman's edition was broached at the staff meeting, Miss Josephine—our Josephine—said she wouldn't have a thing to do with it unless the women were permitted to do all the work on that number. "When the last woman's edition of the Appeal was issued a number of officious individuals of the male gender insisted on taking a hand in the affair and spoiled it all—so there, now!"

The newspapers have made Herr Most say that "all Socialists are anarchists, because all anarchists are Socialists." Our teachings are the same. Most probably never said anything of the kind. If such were true, then the anarchists would be working for Socialism, which they are not. The anarchists believe in no rule of man by man, whether by majority or not. This office has received its most virulent letters of denunciation from anarchists, who assert that Socialists want to perpetuate the slavery by electing more officers. The anarchist refuses to vote, denying the right of the majority to make regulations for society. If capitalists keep on calling Socialists anarchists the name will possibly be taken up, like "black abolitionist," and become a badge of honor instead of opprobrium.

WHEN you want any information about the government you can get it direct by making inquiry of the department of government having such matters in charge. There is no charge for any such information. Ask for any public document you want. Socialists should take advantage of this situation and supply themselves with official data that will confound their unbelieving neighbors, even though compiled by capitalist politicians. With all their cunning they are not able to keep all the real facts hidden. Send a postal card to the United States Labor Commissioner, Washington, D. C., and request that your name be put on the regular mailing list of the *Labor Bulletin*. It contains much information which you can use to advantage.

CONGRESS convened last week in a bower of flowers. But the stench of corruption cannot be smothered. The masters in the saddle will now proceed to levy tribute on the toilers to pay for all the flowers and other things. The working class labor to pay the bills but have no voice in what shall be done with their earnings. What king ever had a softer job than the masters here?

ABROAD AND AT HOME.

All of the world has been wondering over the enormous shipments of wheat that have been coming out of Russia for several months. Week after week they have exceeded all previous records for a corresponding period, and in the past fortnight have reached the enormous total of more than 13,000,000 bushels. Some explanation of these conditions is found in the following extract from a Berlin letter in a New York paper:

The peasants all over Russia are clamoring for food, and the flood of men who return from the cities, to which they had wandered in search of work, to their native villages, has turned hunger into starvation. In East Russia, only two months after the harvest, peasants are eating roots, birchbark and weeds, and a handful of rotten grain mixed with six handfuls of potatoes, Acorns, chopped grass and bark is now Russia's recipe for making bread.

It is apparent from this that these enormous shipments are being made at the expense of the Russian people, who are in actual need of bread themselves. The great portion of Russia's wheat is owned by the nobility, and the serfs who grew it for them are now forced to starve while the rich owners take advantage of the high prices and flood the European markets with supplies which are sadly needed at home.—Portland Oregonian.

FRENZIED FINANCE.

Those who have followed in the daily press the uncovering of the frauds committed by an adventuress, Mrs. Chadwick, will likely be surprised that a pretty woman, with no property or standing, could inveigle bankers out of more than a million of funds with which depositors have trusted them on a game so gauzy that even a common workman would be ashamed to be taken in by it. This shows how men handling great sums for other people do not even take the ordinary care in loaning that a grocer takes in crediting out a pound of coffee. It has been often said that men of great means are the most easily gulled people on earth. They will put millions into a scheme without any further investigation than that some other fellow has put money into it! And this is the banking system which the government has licensed to care for the savings of the people! For the government to provide safe depositories would be paternalistic, so it would! But for it to provide unsafe depositories is its true function! Men will put their money in bank without any other security than a safe and a gilt sign when they would not loan to the most industrious citizen on the best security. And the government is the cause of all the failures and losses to the people by reason of the damnable banking system which has robbed the people of hundreds of millions in the last forty years. The bankers run the government in all matters pertaining to banking and money, and they make such laws as will enable them to make the greatest possible profit, no matter how risky to the people the operation may be. But then the people deserve just that kind of a system, for they are too prejudiced to study matters of government. Hurrah for the best banking system on earth!

Two days before the recent election held in the United States a general election was held in Italy. At the first ballot twenty-six Socialists were elected to the Italian parliament. At the second balloting, it is confidently believed, at least a dozen more will be returned. The vote increased from 162,000 to 301,000. The daily press of the United States published misleading reports of the results, stating that Comrade Ferri had been defeated. The fact is, he was a candidate in three districts and was elected in all of them. He could accept from but one district. At this election the Socialists also disentangled themselves completely from all political alliances with capitalist parties. Heretofore in some districts the Socialists have had the endorsement of some of the radical parties. Political developments in Italy have forced an alliance between practically all of the wings of the anti-Socialist parties.

ALDERMAN SCHWENGER, of Cincinnati, runs a gambling den—one of the vilest in the city. Six other aldermen are notorious gamblers. The Cincinnati Post yells for their removal and calls on the mayor to do his duty. The mayor attends the gambling race course at Latonia, of infamous notoriety! Of course, the mayor is not a gambler! And these are the "eminently respectable" people who hold up their hands in holy horror at the immorality of Socialism! The cities are all run by the worst criminals—worst because they dress well and sail under the deception of good clothes and plenty of money, while honesty and virtue go in rags and hunger—penniless. Great is the social system that puts the vile in power and the good in jail. That is just what happens in Russia.

To show how good and safe the democratic party's management of public affairs is, in Mississippi eight congressmen were elected by a total vote cast of 53,336, or an average of only 6,667 to each congressional district! In Kansas the average is nearly 50,000 votes to each district. Yes, the democratic is a "reform" party—if you call destroying the franchise a reform. In the whole state of Mississippi there were not as many votes permitted to be cast as one Kansas district polled! And this is the party Bryan thinks ought to rule the nation! The Socialist vote in the state was counted as 392, or nearly 7 per cent of the total! This is as large a per cent as was cast in any state.

IN PROPORTION to population there are nine times as many murders in the United States as in France and fifteen times as many as in England! Murders, suicides, paupers and republican majorities increase five times as fast as population.

A MAN-MADE FAMINE.

Dispatches from Ireland tell of awful suffering and starvation of the working people "on account of the failure of the potato crop." And the average reader, trained not to think, will leave a sigh and believe the suffering chargeable to nature. But this is not true. In the same paper I notice that some newspaper man has "unearthed the richest widow in England" in the person of Mrs. Asheton-Smith, who has an income of \$2,000 a day from rents of lands in Ireland. Now do you see it? It is not because the Irish working people have not produced enough to keep themselves in luxury, but because what they have produced has been taken from them in rents, interest and profits to give a few thousand families incomes without work, this "richest widow" being but one of many. It matters not how much they produced, the products would be taken and the really useful people be left on the verge of starvation, while the flippant and criminal idle class would roll in luxury. It is easy for an American to look over there and see how ignorant and foolish the Irish and English masses must be to stand such a condition. And indeed they are. But we have the same condition in this country. English lords and nobles are drawing hundreds of millions in interest, rent and profits from America, and here we have had more evictions for non-payment of rents in one city in one year than Ireland has had in the last five years! But we are not ignorant and foolish. Of course not. We are wise people and would not submit to anything like the tyranny of the English! There is not a law in England that has not its duplicate in this country.

Land is bought and sold there—isn't it the same here? Property is rented there—isn't it the same here? People are hired for wages there—isn't it the same here? Goods are produced for profits and sale there—isn't it the same here? If you knew enough to see America as it really is you would see Ireland in all its horrible poverty, oppression and ignorance.

ANOTHER OLD PARRY GRAFTER.

J. V. Roberts, mayor of Searcy, Ark., and ex-member of the legislature, was convicted of conspiracy, at Little Rock, November 24th, and fined fifty dollars, which should have been a prison offense. The evidence showed that he had bribed a woman of the town to put a watch in the pocket of a man whom he didn't like and then claim that the man had stolen it from her. These are the kind of people who are opposed to Socialism, which would make such crimes impossible. Of such are the law-makers and the police force largely composed. Great is the system of graft.

A lot of poor families were occupying shanties located on lands in the river bottom in St. Louis. Most of them had bought the property from speculators who did not own it. The love of the city for its poor was exemplified last week when these poor people were evicted by the police and their shanties destroyed, leaving most of them without shelter! The Post-Dispatch of November 18th says the spectacle of the evicted poor was pitiable, though they did not resist the police who were destroying their shelter! The city is not going to use the land, but the poor must not be allowed to use it! And this is called a Christian land! Heathens would not do such a thing. Not even savages would do it. It seems that the rulers of the land like to see so much misery they can cause. The land is for the use of the people, and under Socialism it will be for those who do use it. Corporations are using public land everywhere, but they are not evicted! Not on your life. They own the government. They are gods not to be interfered with! Prosperity!

IN THE San Francisco Examiner of November 16th is an account of the use of fire hose to drive away three hundred men who wanted work in unloading a vessel in the harbor! So anxious were the men to get the two or three hours' job that they made a veritable mob and had to be driven off! And this in this great and prosperous country! And yet there are those who are trying to make themselves believe that men would not work if they could receive \$2,000 a year for an eight-hour day under Socialism! If the capitalists can keep the people ignorant of what Socialism is they can rule and rob labor all the time.

ANARCHISTS OF WEALTH.

MERIDIAN, Miss., Sept. 5.—To defeat about 100 employees, who have harassed him for more than a month, Moss Graham, the wealthy owner of Highwood lumber mills, in Jones county, blew up the extensive machinery with dynamite and will retire from business.

The employees struck for higher wages in July and the mill shut down. They were living on Graham's land, and he had the sheriff clear them off, but they have moved across to adjoining land and went into camp.—By Scripps-McKee Press Association.

You see by the above clipping that capitalists stand between the workers and the means of producing wealth and refuse the workers opportunity unless the master can have his own sweet will. The masters will even destroy the machines which the workers have made rather than let them use the tools to make a living. You can howl prosperity, but if this is the kind of prosperity you like you have it in abundance. Under Socialism this mill would belong to the whole people, and the men working in and about it would have control of it. They would get all the products of their labor and would not strike, for they could only strike against themselves, and that would not do. There would be no master to take the greater part of the products so he could live in luxurious idleness, or, perhaps, buy a degenerate scion of nobility for his daughter. This wealthy owner got all of his wealth out of the working class. The workers received that much less than their products. The condition of the mill workers in the south is pitiable beyond description. They live like cattle, or even worse. Yet, rather than give them enough of their products to live like men, this master destroys the mill! And the working class vote to have such a condition! Surely they are as slavish and ignorant as the slaves of old.

D. M. PARRY is making great efforts to circulate his new paper, *The Industrial Independent*, which is published primarily for the purpose of combating Socialism. In a letter to Mr. B. W. Gedney, Lynn, Mass., among other things, he says: "Kindly help us in every way you can and we will be glad to reciprocate in every way in our power. The Appeal to Reason is a rank Socialist sheet published at Girard, Kans. The owner of the paper is making thousands of dollars out of the dupes who believe that a socialist millennium is to be brought about in a few years." Mr. Parry tells the confiding public that Wayland is making thousands of dollars printing a weekly paper of from four to ten pages per issue at 25 cents per year, and yet he guilelessly asks workingmen to pay him 50 cents per year for a monthly sheet one-third of the size of the Appeal! PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has just signed a parcels post treaty with Belgium, whereby that country can send merchandise to any postoffice in the United States for less than American citizens can use their own postal system! And can send more than four pounds in one package, which is denied to any American citizen at any price. How happy the American citizens should be at this feat of the manufacturers to have special privileges in the postal system! Especially foreigners!

FORCED TO CONFESS!

THE Catholic Transcript, Hartford, Conn., says: "There is no denying the fact that the tide is setting in favor of Socialism." It also admits that the Socialists increased their vote in the recent Italian elections from 168,000 to 301,000. Yes, the tide is setting toward Socialism, and increases every hour. The masses are getting tired of producing fabulous wealth and going hungry.

A FELLOW named Wales has sued John Mitchell, of the miners, for \$200,000 for settling the anthracite strike a year ago! And the people elected Roosevelt because they thought he did it! And the miners paid Mitchell to do it! And then to think that the matter isn't settled at all, but that the men are being skinned worse than they were before the strike! This is a great old world we live in, isn't it?

MEMBERS of the Manufacturers' Association of Kansas City attended the city council in a body to urge the passage of an ordinance giving to some of its members valuable franchises last week. For the working class to have asked for an ordinance in its favor would have been high treason. Of course, the masters got the ordinance. They own the public officials the working people foolishly elect. Will the hewers of wood and drawers of water never wake up?

THE justices of the appellate division of the supreme court, sitting in Brooklyn, have decided in their infinite wisdom that the "closed shop" is illegal, and, therefore, must go. The decision was rendered in the case of Morris Cohn & Sons against the United Garment Workers of America. The courts can be depended upon to render the sort of decisions which are in the interest of the employing class. To employ only members of the union was declared to be against public policy. Of course it is—it interferes with the profits of the employers. The employers are the "public."

I am writing as the mother of two children. I am a woman of 28. My husband is a man of 38 years. He was one of those who struck out of sympathy at the stockyards and was not reinstated. Thank God he has now found work elsewhere. But at three different places he was refused work on account of his age.

I should like to put a question to married women, especially to other mothers and Catholics. Why is it that we have to sit in our pews on Sundays and at missions and listen to our priests—and protestant ministers, too—preaching that God never made a month without providing bread for it? I have seen many a hungry baby and a hungry father and mother as well. What consolation is it to raise a family, when the best that a poor man can give his children is a common school education with the bare necessities of life and a few stuffy rooms and a 30 by 60 feet yard and a bit of sidewalk to play on, but never a penny more, and never a look at nature in the years of their youth and innocence? A man is thrown on the dump pile at the age of 35, while some of his children are still too young to earn their daily bread.

If we cannot get work after reaching the age of 35 are we supposed to go out and beg from people who are just as poor as we are ourselves? The rich streets know no beggars. Who will keep us and our large families? Are we supposed to live like the birds of the air?

Isn't it about time for the workingman's wife to send her husband to the ballot box and make him strike there one blow for freedom on election day.
