He further announced that he had more than enough evidence to swing Haywood and his associates for the assassination of former Governor Steumenberg, and that before the trial was over he would prove that the Federation leaders' were responsible for a score of other crimes perpetrated in the mining states of the west.

Attorney Borah did the reading. Instead of creating prejudice against the defendant, the articles met with the warmost approval from the audience. Socialists and trade unionists present could not resist the impulse to applaud after the presentation of this portion of the state's evidence. Darrow' declared that he was sorry he ever interposed an objection, and that the reading of the articles really strengthened the position of the defendant and weakened that of the state.

Harry Orchard, the actual murderer of ex-Governor Steunenberg, was taken to Caldwell, Idaho, Monday, for the trial of his case, which was not transferred with that of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone. It was rumored that Orchard would plead guilty for the effect it might have on the trial of William D. Haywood, now in progress at Boise; but this was not done and the case was continued until the September term.

Judge Wood was present and signed the stipulation agreed to by the attorneys for postponement of the Orchard trial. Orchard was accompanied by his usual escort of guards and wore a brand new suit of brown clothes. Judge Harry Orchard, the actual murderer
