THE CRISIS.

BY LUCIEN BANAIL.

Production of Wealth in 1907.

VII.

NO comprehensive view of the present crisis can be obtained without a preliminary knowledge of the economic condition of this country before the panic.

1. The specifically productive, including agriculture, mining and other sources of crude materials; also, manufacture, through which these materials are converted into finished products.

2. The distributive, including the two distinct services of transportation and commerce, which, to the extent of the "necessary" labor employed therein, contribute to the value of the product.

3. The financial, which actually produces nothing at all, yet becomes more and more, as the capitalistic organism develops, the nerve center from which activity is imparted to or withdrawn from the social body.

Proceeding in that order we shall first take a good look at the pile of wealth produced during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907, and endeavor to trace its money value, step by step, from its preliminary stage of crude materials to its final forms, and from the places of production to the final markets.

Then, looking more closely into the matter, we shall observe the concentration process at work in each branch of the so great departments first mentioned above.

It is not, perhaps, superfluous to say that an inquiry of this character and scope, when undertaken with that sense of responsibility to truth which should always inspire Socialist action and utterance, is by no means an easy task.

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IV—Wholesale Trade. Gross earnings—million dollars. 2,500

Note.—The bulk of this trade is done in the cities, and the bulk of the retail trade is done in the country. The above figure is the result of an extensive study of prices and volumes of wholesale and retail trade as compared with prices at the places of production, and is deemed very low.

V—Retail Trade. Gross earnings—million dollars. 8,000

Note.—Remarks of a similar import apply to this highly important item as have just been made concerning the wholesale trade. For the first time the retail trade has been taken into account, and the actual value of the total production of the United States is now more satisfactorily determined.

VI—Additions to Permanent Wealth. Items. Million Dollars.

Improvement of farms, opening of new lands. 1,250

Additions to manufacturing plants, opening of new mines, etc., by labor in direct employment. 500

Additions to transportation plants by labor in the direct employ of companies. 500

Total. 2,250

Note.—Proper consideration will be given to these items when the conditions of agriculture, manufacture and transportation will be especially reviewed in accordance with the program laid out at the beginning of this article.

In the following statement of production for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1907, explanatory notes are appended to each group of items.

Production of Wealth in 1907. I—Crude Materials. Sources of Product. Million Dollars.

Agriculture—Value on farms. 4,000

Mines and quarries—Val at works. 2,000

Forests and fisheries—Val. at points of shipment. 600

Total. 10,900

Note.—The officially reported product of agriculture for 1906, upon which consumption chiefly depended, is \$10,000,000,000.

II—Manufactures. Value added by labor in manufacturing and hand trade establishments to crude materials. 9,600

Value of independent articles, mechanical, electrical, etc., in the private employ of individuals or families. 150

Total. 9,750

Note.—The last census of manufactures (factory product) was taken for the year 1904, including an official estimate of the 1905 production of manufactures, a total "gross product" of nearly 17,000 millions.

III—Transportation. Freight gross earnings of railroads. 1,800

Freight gross earnings of steamers, sailing vessels, barges, etc., also, of express companies, less postage charges; also, cost of transportation by all kinds of land vehicles. 1,200

Total. 3,000

Note.—Passenger traffic, which earned for the railroads alone \$184,000,000 in the last fiscal year, is omitted here, as not being a part of the production of goods.

Debs' Great Speech 50c Per Hundred.

Debs' great speech, delivered in Girard following his nomination as president, is admitted by everyone to be the best statement of Socialist philosophy ever made. It appears verbatim in No. 651, and in that form can be handed out for one-third what we would have to charge if we put it in pamphlet.

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Sixteen Years Ago.

Sixteen years ago, Congressman Henderson of Iowa in the house, and Delph of Oregon in the senate, introduced a mild postal censorship bill which instantly aroused the opposition of every great daily in America.

Just now while all free America has its eyes on the latest campaign of Germany, it would be well for the people to watch closely the congress of the United States. The nation's attention is attracted to the editor of a Frankfort paper who has dared to criticize the Brandenburg speech, and the American press are making much ado about the censurable patches that prevail in Berlin.

There is a bill before congress which purports to be in the interest of morality and decency. In fact, it would establish a postal censorship which would be most irresponsible, arbitrary and oppressive character.

There is a bill before congress, introduced by Congressman Henderson, of Iowa, which under the guise of providing against the publication of indecent literature, seeks to strip the editorial boards of newspaper publishers of the right to censor the press, with the postmaster general as the supervisor and controller of all the newspapers in the country.

Under the bill the postmaster general might decide the criticism of himself or the administration might be contrary to public morals, and there would be no appeal of his decision. There is such a wide variety of opinion on the proposed law and the principles involved in the constitutionality declaration that it seems improbable that it can ever find a place among the United States statutes.

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
