Wanted—More Tactful Plunderers. Mr. Taft said: I have already alluded to the hostility which had been manifested by the people in revolt against the Spanish regime, toward the Spanish friars, and the political reasons for their attitude.

In Order to Buy Peace. Mr. Taft said: In compliance with the promise of the vatican, the new apostolic delegate, Archbishop Guidi, a Roman ecclesiastic and a statesman of large experience, was sent to the Philippines in 1902 to conduct the negotiations. They covered a full two years, and finally the price of the lands was agreed upon.

Mr. Taft said: To secure general settlement, it was proposed by the agent of the United States in the vatican that the agricultural lands of the friars should be bought by the United States at a price to be fixed by an arbitrator to be selected by the viceroy of India...

A Corporation Needs Few Industrial Heads. Mr. Taft said: Congress had authorized the purchase of the friar lands, and had inserted in the law giving this authority further authority to condemn the lands, if it was deemed necessary, by the Philippine government.

Public Hospitals Made Catholic Property. Mr. Taft said: The San Jose college case which was pending in the supreme court was never decided by that court. This delay was really at the instance of the parties, because it was found possible to make a compromise with the archbishop of Manila with respect to all the charitable trusts which I have named above.
