The high temperature of the mills combined with an abnormal humidity of the air produced by steaming as done by manufacturers makes had material weave easier and tends to diminish the workers' power of resisting disease. The humid atmosphere promotes prespiration, but makes evaporation from the akin more difficult; and in this condition the operator, when he leaves the mill, has to face a much reduced temperature which produces serious chest affections. There is no overproduction under the present system. What appears to be an overproduction and is commonly so called is in reality an under consumption. There is never too much of anything made when at the same time there are those who need it.

The rights of a state or of the United States are identical with the power they exercise. Governments derive their powers, or rights, from the consent of the government as set forth in the Declaration of Independence.

Do not confuse this kind of rights or rightful power with the ethical idea of right which is quite another thing. The rightness and wrongness of acts measured by the rules of ethics is distinct and separate from the rights or power conferred upon a government by the consent of the governed.

Whatever the majority of a state grants its government the power to do, that government has the political right to execute. This government exercised its right to protect chattel slavery so long as it derived the power to do so from a majority of pro-slavery votes. When the pro-slavery element lost political power through the triumph of an anti-slavery majority the government lost its political right to do what it had before done rightfully from a political standpoint. And nothwithstanding this, thatfel slavery was ethically wrong even when it was politically in power.

The right by which a state or United States might assume to regulate freight rates would be derived from the expressed desire of its citizens for such a regulation. The rightness or wrongness, goodness or badness, of such a measure does not enter into the question.
