tou or "cut-out" of the 1908 Burley tobacco crop by the farmers of Kentucky. Fully as significant as this revolutionary act of the tarmers was the conspiracy of silence with which it was treated by the capitalist press. Columns of sensational rot dealing with bloody violence visited upon the "inoffensive" heads of "independents" and "innocent" trust buyers by "Night Riders" were printed in the Louisville and Cinchinnai papers, and from them copied into trust-controlled journals of the companies of the crops to growers who in the control of the crops to growers who in the control of the crops to growers who in t copied into trust-controlled journals elsewhere, but virtually no mention was made of the farmers' strike that brought the trust to time.

Through the formation of the American Society of Equity and the Burley Tobacco Society a majority of the Burley growers were induced to pool their tobacco and hold it for higher prices. Warehouses were erected at suitable places, and in them most of the 1906 and all of the 1907 crops were the 1906 and all of the 1907 crops were stored. January 1, 1908, saw about 175,000,000 pounds of Burley tobacco held in pool, with the selling price fixed at 17 cents a pound over the price to which the trust had reduced tobacco before the farmers organized. With nearly two crops of tobacco on need hand, and with the trust declaring it would not buy pooled tobacco tinder distinguished. would not buy pooled tobacco under

other crops or to make more profitable use of their land than the production of tobacco. It was simply a strike —a cessation of toil. In the beginning all who could be so induced were persuaded to "sign off" the number of acres they would not grow. Upon members of the associations this was made mandatory. 
