## Analysis of the Vote

A. M. Simons in Coming Nation

Socialists may well rejoice in the result of the election just passed. They can rejoice because of the great increase in the Socialist vote polled in the midst of a clamor for radical votes such as this country has never seen before. They can rejoice in having entered the national congress and taken their place along side the So-ciallst parties of the world.

It is too early to give exact figures as to the national vote. The Chicago Tribune, however, which no one can accuse of exaggerating the Socialist strength, publishes the following comparative table:
