Protest Meeting at Girard

On Saturday evening, November 26th, the courthouse in Girard was packed by Warren's neighbors in a meeting of protest against the confirmation of his sentence though many attended from thirty miles. Bands from outside towns combined with the home band to furnish music for the occasion.

J A Wayland, the One Hoss himself, presided. The principal speaker was J. I. Sheppard, of Fort Scott, employed in the Frank Lane case, who told of Warren's persecution climaxing his address by announcing his withdrawal from the democratic party and allegiance in the future to the Socialist party. That an attorney having, per haps, the largest practice of any lawyer in Kansas, a life-long democrat, should desert the party that has just won an apparent victory, when it would appear that there was unusual opportunity ahead for him, is deeply significant. But Sheppard demonstrated that he saw through the sophistry of democratic argument, as well as the futility of its apparent triumph. The announcement of his change of attitude has created a profound sensation throughout political circles in Kansas. There were a number of other speeches by both Socialists and non-Socialists, and strong resolu tions of protest against the decision were adopted by a unanimous rising vote of the vast and enthusiastic audience. A more extended report will appear next week.

WILL THE JUDGES CEASE AT JAILING WARREN

Lawyers Assert That A. P. of L. Leaders Are Now in Serious Danger of Conviction.

(By Pan-American Press.)
Washington, D. C., Nov.—The final decision of the U.S. circuit court of appeals that Fred D. Warren, editor of the APPEAL TO REASON, must go to jail, is believed by Washington lawyers, conversant with the tendencies of the United States supreme court decisions, to presage a series of convictions in labor cases which will, in all probability, include the heads of the American Federation of Labor, Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and John Mitchell.

Warren's conviction practically came grough his defense of Moyer, Hay through his defense of Moyer. Hay-wood and Petribone at the time when they were kidnaped from their homes in Denver and secretly carried on board in Denver and secretly carried on board a special train which took them to Boise. Idaho. To prove whether or not the kidnaping of working men is "legal" and the kidnaping of the rich a crime. Warren published in his paper the offer of a reward for the kidnaping of ex-Governor Taylor, who was then hiding in Indiana, a refugee from his native state of Kentucky, where he was wanted on the charge of murdering Goebel. Warren explained in his paper that he had nothing against Taylor but that case, the supreme court having rushed to the assistance of the Colorado mine owners and declared that the kidnaping of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone was

legal. Warren was arrested May 4, 1907. and his test case has proved, according to the court's decisions, that there is one law for the rich and another for the wage-worker.


