The long train of usurpations by the capitalist courts and the abuses and outrages growing out of their despotic and of practices, of which the working class have always been the victims and the capitalist class the beneficiaries, culminating in the imprisonment of Fred D. Warren for exposing their brutal iniquities, is the prelude to the downfall of the robber system under which these revolting crimes have been perpetrated in the name of law and justice upon the long-suffering

The capitalist courts in failing Warren have sounded the knell of their own doom. They may still flourish and fester for a time, but they will never recover from the poisoned dagger they have plunged into their own vitals.

Even now the people are rising against them and their power for evil is waning and will soon be destroyed. JANUARY 21ST, THE DAY WARREN GOES TO JAIL, MARKS IN RED LETTERS THE RISE OF THE AMER.

ICAN PEOPLE AGAINST JUDICIAL DESPOTISM IN THE UP: 1ED STATES.

On that day begins a series of protest demonstrations that will continue steadily during the six months he lies manacles in Pollock's prison cell, culminating on the day of his release in such a triumphant uprising of the masses as this country has never witnessed in all its history.

The day Warren leaves Girard for Fort Scott to surrender himself to the neriff the APPEAL will close down and its employes, acting as his personal escort, will march with their comrade below to the prison doors. Other comrades from surrounding points, many hundreds, perhaps thousands, will be there to at st their personal loyalty and pledge their fidelity and devotion to the cause.

In the person of Fred Warren in jail we are all in jail and all equally and vitally committed to this revolt of the masses against the tyranny of capitalism imposed upon a patient people by corporation courts through their servile judges.

Warren is but one of the countless victims, but the one, as it happens, whose cause is recognized as the cause of all the liberty-loving citizens of the republic.

Free speech, a free press, and a free people, versus the corrupt courts of a despotic system. That is the issue, and upon that burning issue we will fight!

The people have only to understand, to be aroused and assert themselves, and the victory is won for once and ever.

# Cablegram from Geo. D. Herron

Farenze, Italy, Dec. 17

Among other things the act prohibits the deposit for mailing of all matter, otherwise mailable, upon the envelope or outside cover or wrapper of which is written, printed or othermailing wise impressed any language of a scur-rilous, defamatory or threatening char-acter, or calculated by the terms or manner or style of display and obviously in-tended to reflect injuriously upon the character or conduct of another. The envelope described in the indictment was turns him to Kentucky authorities." The indictment also charged that the words so printed were of a scurrilous, defama-tory and threatening character and were calculated and obviously intended to recalculated and obviously intended to re-flect injuriously upon the character and conduct of William S. Taylor, a former governor of the state of Kentucky. There was a verdict of guilty as charged, and sentence followed. When the case arose in this court the

accused appeared in his own behalf dispensed with coursel who had filed a brief, asserted his right to use the mails in the way described in the indictment, and said the only question he desired considered was whether the printed indorsement on the envelope could make his conduct a public offense. But aside from this concession and examination of the record and briefs discloses no other question that requires considera-tion. 
