IV. The London Cor.pany.
Before the chartering of the London company proper, by the king of ingland, Sir Walter Raleigh was lingtand, Sir Walter Raleigh was given an individual grant of all America lying between the 33d and 40th parallels of latitude and from sea to sea. However, the charter amounted to little without occupancy, and after spending \$200,000 in a vain endeavor to colonize the servitory Raleigh reto thre winout occupancy, and after spending \$200,000 in a vain endeavor to colonize the territory, Raleigh resigned his claims. On the 10th of April, 1806, James I. of England chartered both the London and the Plymouth companies. The former embraced practically the same territory that had been previously given to Raleigh. Under the leadership of Capt. John Smith, who afterward tried in vain to plant a colony in New England for the Plymouth company, a colony was established at Jamestown, Va., for the London company, in 1607. The story of how the colonists spent their time in seeking gold and in trying to find the Pacific ocean by going up the river until disaster came upon them, is familiar to all students of American history.
