Waiting Until After Election

ANOTHER monetary plot is on. The Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill has never been used to its full capacity for evil.

A steel-ribbed, indestructible, five-story vault, sunk into the earth beneath the United States sub treasury in New York, capable of holding TWO BILLION DOLLARS IN GOLD, is planned by the treasury department.

There is in the United States a total amount of money of all kinds only about \$2,700,000,000. It will be seen that preparations are under way to LOCK UP TWO BILLIONS OF THIS and issue instead the mere notes of banks, based on United States bonds or other securities.

The panic will not come immediately, but it will come as soon as the retirement of these notes begins. There never has been such a tremendous steal, such a money trust proposed, if the American people are wise they will vote for the Socialist ticket in order to secure absolute monopoly of money and banking.

MATERIALISTIC CONCEPTION.

A correspondent asks for a concise definition of the materialistic conception of history. The best definition is that given in the statement of the conception by the authors, Karl Marx and Frederick Engels, which is as follows:

In every historical epoch the prevailing mode of economic production and exchange, and the social organization necessarily following from it form the basis upon which the superstructure of the political and intellectual history of that epoch.

This is clear enough to be understood. There is something about it, though, that is worthy of consideration. It says a great deal that says that it does not. It does not declare in favor of materialism or against intellectual or spiritual development.

In the nature of the statement itself there is a new historical epoch and a new mode of economic production coming. There will follow change in the material aspect of things; the change, resulting in more material good for all, will necessarily lead to higher spiritual development and to a greater diffusion of knowledge. The materialistic conception of history, therefore, is not a declaration of materialism but a declaration of the higher idealism.

"LAYING BY."

The Mail and Breeze, a farmer's journal, very foolishly declares that under Socialism all private property rights would cease, "for privately owned property means accumulation, and the APPEAL editor says that the people will soon learn, under Socialism, that it is unnecessary to lay by anything."

Private property does not mean accumulation in the sense of laying by for a rainy day or hoarding for investment. It means having all the private property which can be used for the exploitation of other people. The laying by of anything for this purpose will necessarily cease under Socialism, after people learn that it is an inheritance from an unorganized form of society. The accumulation of property for the purpose of making the home comfortable and dressing one's self as he or she may desire will come, but that will be a matter of every day work.

Property in the true sense does not consist in something that can be used for the purpose of making profit but in something that can be used for personal benefit. If used it is not laid by.

EXCUSING THE CRIME.

It is astonishing that many good people, instead of trying to accomplish justice and end the robbery of the workers are doing everything in their power to continue it through an ameliorative. All charity, all schemes of profit-sharing, all works of social betterment, all colony ideas, mean nothing more than efforts to continue the capitalist system that is keeping this world in poverty and misery.

It is time for earnest men and women everywhere to arouse to a realization of of the situation.

Why Women Should be Interested in Socialism

WOMEN should be as much or more interested in the triumph of Socialism as the men of this country—especially the women of the working class—because Socialism offers to all women more than the present capitalist system can give the select few, inasmuch as it offers security from poverty and an opportunity vastly greater than any woman can ever hope to have under prevailing conditions.

In six states of our union women are now privileged to vote, but everywhere women may study the vital questions of the day, exercising their influence upon the result of elections so far as legally permitted. Every woman is beginning to understand that she is an important factor in this government, that she is affected by the same forces that affect her husband, brother and son, and that she should be even more interested in a change of system because under the existing form she is the one which is more securely bound, the one most deeply wronged and cruelly robbed.

If you belong to the large army of working women you know from painful experience that prices have mounted higher and higher, year by year, and your income, if at all increased, has been but little. You know that many of the plans you felt certain of carrying to a happy climax have all been buried by the wayside because of the high cost of living.

If you are the wife of a workingman, you know that in spite of all your skillful management and striving to make ends meet you are often forced to give up in despair. Even though you contrive to make the scanty income of your honest, hard-working husband feed and clothe the family your heart aches for the many other things your children are compelled to go without.

YOU would like to see your children enjoying splendid educational advantages; like to have them know something of music, or art and of travel. You had intended that they should have had these opportunities, but as the prices of the necessities crept upward, as your husband's salary remained unchanged, or if he possibly lost a position or two and was out of work for some time, gradually all these pet fancies fled and you now count the days until your boys and girls may be old enough to take their places in some wealth producing concern where they will get in return for their labor and the sacrifice of a hopeful future, enough money to

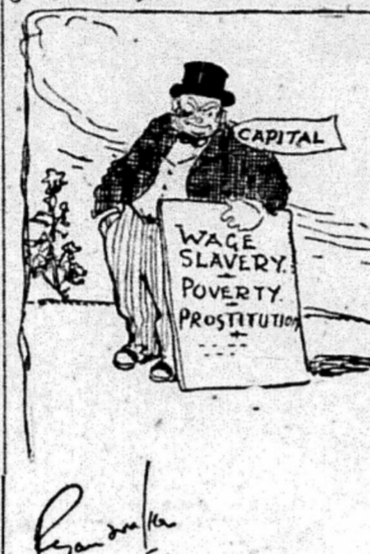

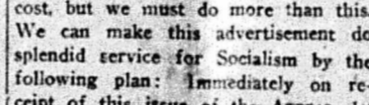

It was the liquor interests that defeated woman suffrage in Ohio. They were afraid it might interfere with their machine and their profits.

A REPORT comes from Washington of a tremendous steal that nearly went through in the interest of Taft's candidacy. A panic was nearly precipitated on the New York stock exchange due to concerted action on the part of the big interests. The idea was to force a release of from fifteen to twenty million dollars of government money, now held in the general funds of the treasury, so that this would be deposited in private banks. It is precisely what was worked under the Roosevelt administration, just prior to the panic of 1907. If it had not been exposed before the money would have been invested where it would have made a tremendous profit, and it is reported they had offered to pay the government 2 per cent interest and the republican campaign fund 4 per cent more for the use of this government money. It would have been granted, except for the premature exposure, under the plea that it was necessary for the movement of crops in the country.

country you are anxious to vote for the best interests of yourself and class. You want to vote for the party that will give you the greatest good. If you are a working woman the Socialist ticket is the only one you can conscientiously vote. Because it is the ticket of your class. THIS local union of mine workers, without suggestion from this office, has done what you would naturally expect others to do. John Wittman is a miner, and the accident that crippled him for life is not an uncommon one in the mines.

Moreover, the practice of unscrupulous lawyers, in defrauding the injured miners out of damages which even the capitalist laws direct shall be paid, is also a common one.

Here is a case, when tried and won, will expose the whole brutal practice of the capitalist operators, and their attorneys. Our readers will be kept posted in the details, and as practically every mining camp on the continent has some subscribers to the APPEAL, the miners are going to be put wise to a great many things that will be helpful in the future.

Our legal department, through the correspondence law school, is building a great federated law department that

in time will be a power that the capitalist nation must reckon with. It will not be long till we can take up and fight the battles of the working class throughout the nation: We will not only be able to do this far more effectively than it has ever before been done, but with a fraction of the expense now poured out on capitalist lawyers.

Will you lend a hand, comrade? Will you take this up in your local union, and interest your brother unionists? A lift to fight John Wittman's case may be a stroke for yourself. Your turn may come next.

Yesterday John Wittman was a poor helpless cripple, over whose shack had settled the grim clouds of despair. SICK SOILS.

The railroads of the country, having almost absorbed the property of the farmers, and are beginning to advise the farmers what to do.

B. F. Yoakum declares that the average farm in this country has a mortgage debt of \$500 and a current debt of about the same amount outstanding against it. This makes a total indebtedness amounting to ten billion dollars. The rate of interest paid on this tremendous amount of borrowed capital is between 8 and 9 per cent per annum. The annual interest bill paid, therefore, by the farmers is about \$510,000,000. This is almost equal to the total wheat crop of the country. It would be hard to get figures which would show the slavery to which the farmers have been subjected by the plots of the masters than these brought forward by Mr. Yoakum.

That isn't the entire result. Jim Hill of the Northern Pacific also is alarmed at the farming situation. He says: "Soils that once produced from twenty-five to forty bushels of wheat to the acre now give from ten to twenty. England and Germany, once as reckless of impoverished soil as we, raised an average yield this year of more than twice ours under less favorable circumstances. He speaks of the 'sick soil' of America. It is the land grabbing that has produced tenant farming on the one side and compels the tenant farmer to exhaust the soil in order to live and on the other side has robbed the farmer to such an extent that he has been absolutely unable to keep the farm up to its proper standard that has produced this capitalism is not only guilty of subjugating the farmers of America but it is also guilty of robbing the soil to such a degree that future generations may actually experience a famine such as now prevails in India, unless socialized farming can bring an end to it.

About Socialism

Please explain the meaning of the short ballot. A short ballot provides for the election of a governor and two assistants only. The other state officers are to be appointed and constitute what might be called the governor's cabinet.

Can a man be a Socialist and a Catholic at the same time? He can. Thousands of men are. The wise Catholic, in spite of the denunciation of a few self-seekers in the church, is rapidly coming to the point where he sees Socialism as his only salvation from the robbery of profits that have kept him and his ancestors poor.

What is the difference between the Socialist party and the Socialist labor party? The difference lies in the fact that the Socialist party is attending to its knitting, making Socialists and working for socialization, while the Socialist labor party is devoting its time chiefly to fighting the Socialist party. As a result of this difference in tactics the Socialist party had two years ago a vote of over half a million while the Socialist labor party has something like 50,000.

Under Socialism when the husband is sick and unable to work will the wife have to go out to work as my wife has to do now? No. Sicknes is more often due to social conditions than to the individual's fault. Society should bear the burden of it. The man's income should continue to him while he is ill and the department of health should give him free service. In doing this it is rendering a benefit to society because sickness is not only sometimes dangerous to a community but it is also a money loss to society at large.

I am interested in knowing what position the Socialist party takes in regard to the liquor traffic. Socialism has no special statement for the liquor traffic. It does declare, however, for collective ownership of all the means of production and distribution. This necessarily includes the liquor traffic. It means that the government would take charge of the production and distribution of liquor. Liquor would be sold under careful restrictions where people wanted to be as represented. Inasmuch as Socialism also provides for industrial democracy it follows that a community that did not want any liquor sold could vote it out of its community, while those that wanted it could have it without the effort that now exists to increase the sale and without the enormous profit that goes with it at present.

Woman and Socialism

WOMAN'S relation to Socialism is somewhat different from man's. Women as a class have never had political or economic freedom. No part has woman in making the laws that govern the industries in which she toils. Not a word of political protest can she utter against the power that tears her babes from her breast to grind them to death in the factories and the sweat shops.

The female is affected by industrial conditions more than is the male member of society because she is doubly dependent, she is dependent on the same conditions that the male is and further she is also dependent on the male. Besides being affected in her own right she feels the blow when her supporter is affected. Women who are interested enough in the emancipation of their sex to search for the means to bring freedom—those who can use reason and logic to light their way—are attracted to Socialism.

In it they recognize their hope for a free race, free mothers and free children, which things can never be until the whole race is emancipated. This can never be until the class rule is at an end forever and woman's dependence on man has ceased and she has become an economically free member of society. This means she will have a full voice in the affairs of industry. Only under such conditions can the human race reach its fullest development. The sooner women relate themselves actively to the Socialist movement the sooner they will have the welfare of the human race as a whole to consider.

The working women are beginning to realize that the Socialist women are not merely fighting for equal rights with the wage slaves, but are fighting against the system that makes them producers and earners who receive only one-fifth of what they earn.

The Brainy Kick

WHEN a person is born with a natural endowment, it is because nature intended to advance our social interests through that person.

A woman is born with a wonderful voice. Society, by gathering together in groups called audiences, finds out her natural talent as a singer. The people are musically benefited and to the same extent she wins their applause, which means appreciation.

A man is born with a natural ability to paint pictures and when he produces a great painting he advances our artistic interests thereby. We socially recognize his artistic ability to the degree that he has benefited us socially.

Another man is born with an unusually noble character and loving nature. We come to him for kind words and sympathy, for encouragement and good cheer. We pass the word on to our friends and neighbors and as he strengthens our spirit and imbues us with hope we socially admire him. He wins our loyal support and we become his followers.

Thomas Edison was born with a natural inventive genius, therefore, all his efforts should have been directed for his own selfish interests, even to the detriment of the people. But that is not the case. Primarily he invents for the social benefit of the people and in so far as they are benefited, he is rewarded in his conscience and in his best self, even were he not to get one dollar for his work, so far as financial returns are concerned. In addition to the joy of having done social service, he attracts our interest and wins our favor. And that is the greatest reward after all within the gift of the people.

Now if all the great and noble men and women used their natural endowments for self-interest, there would have been no social advancement. John D. Rockefeller, no doubt is gifted with financial or industrial genius. Since it was given him to possess that genius, society should receive the advantages to the same degree comparatively, as it received of Socrates' wisdom, of Christ's sweetness and gentleness, of Shakespeare's psychological powers, of Columbus' explorations, and of Lincoln's statesmanship. But John D. uses his "brains" to rob, to cheat, to swindle, to exploit, and to betray the people for the benefit of John.

Then some of the wiseacres insist that if a man has the brains to make money, he is entitled to all he can make. Sheer prattle. Not John D., but all the people, are entitled to the benefit of his natural endowment, financial or industrial genius. And if it were a matter of John having more "brains" than others, he would have had to rent a cold storage especially to hold the increased amount of brain that accumulates with his fortune.

Records give him nearly a billion dollars, made within 25 1/2 years. The assistant college professor earns from \$1,400 to \$1,800 per year. The professor from \$1,800 to \$2,100 per year. The dean of a university receives a salary of from \$2,000 to \$2,500 per year. If we allow them \$2,500 a year on an average, then John takes 160 times as much pay per year as any one of the university deans or \$400,000 every year for 25 1/2 years, with a raise of at least \$100,000 annually because of increased capital.

Accepting the theory that it is a matter of brains, then, according to salary Rockefeller has 160 times as much or as good a quality of brain as any university dean. Since his salary is considered the only source of income the professor has, he consumes it for living expenses. As Rockefeller is unable to consume his income, he makes capital out of it. Accordingly then, he has a billion times as much wealth as any college dean or professor, and therefore a billion times as much brains. Seems logical, doesn't it?

With all the poverty and suffering in this country, it would be deemed the greatest good to all of us if he were to found a college where he personally went to teach us how to develop our brains to get rich. We might not become exactly as rich as he is, but we could surely be worth at least \$1,000,000 each and no one would have to starve, freeze, or beg.

The people of the United States are under the impression that they elect a pretty wise and brainy man to the presidency. The salary we pay our president (and he surely is better paid than most of us) is now \$75,000 a year. By dividing Sunday School John's present wealth by Taft's present wealth we find that John would have 12,233 times as much brains as the supposedly wisest (?) man in the United States, Taft, has. In which case the next president of our country ought to be John D. Rockefeller because he is nearly the brainiest man in the world, being nearly the wealthiest. The only danger would be that he would grant a permanent franchise on the United States to John D. Rockefeller & Co.

Where Socialists May Win.

News That Means Something

Economic determinism again. Directors in the neighborhood of Santa Rosa, Cal., to quote from reports, are ready to close schools in order that the children may assist in the hop and prune harvest.

Fargo, N. D., with a population of 20,000, owns its water plant and other public utilities. This year these utilities have paid so much that a six and one-half per cent dividend will be returned to the city, to be applied as rebate on taxes. The total amount saved is \$10,000.

A judge of Lambertville, N. J., the state in which schoolmaster Wilson lives, recently declared that school was a luxury for a working girl and that she ought to be at work helping her father make a living. School is a luxury that the working people provide for those who do not work.

Since marshal law has been declared in West Virginia the mine guards are using every means to create trouble. A number of fires of an incendiary origin have occurred. They are trying to lay them on to the miners, but it is clear that the mine guards themselves are to blame.

Attention has been called to the fact that the Walworth's five and ten-cent chain stores are rapidly spreading all over the country. It has just been discovered that they are financed by the Standard Oil company which has gobbled the rest of the country. The masters are going to take to retailing.

The progressive candidate for vice president has been building a machine in California composed of old line bosses, including Finn, Roughouse McDonald, Eddy Bryant, Jimmy Ryan and others. To provide jobs for them the Johnson Harbor commission has boosted the pay roll from \$31,000 in May, 1911, to \$85,000 in May, 1912.

Mrs. Joanna Berin, Hartford, Conn., lays the death of her young son to the boy scout movement. Her son had joined the boy scouts. His head and his hands were flourishing a weapon when it exploded, killing young Berin. Yet there are good Christian people who still insist in forwarding this iniquitous movement.

The APPEAL has no means of knowing the status of a man who writes to it. Some time ago a certain man wrote a brief endorsement of Socialism which was published in the APPEAL. He was a candidate for office on a democratic ticket and no doubt used this for the purpose of boosting himself with Socialists. It didn't work. The Socialists were on to it and he was defeated.

A board investigating the Los Angeles aqueduct has reported that the Owens river project has been a subject of tremendous graft. Those having charge of the matter have kept 8,000 heads of cattle and 1,900 calves of their own on the land without paying for it, and the water furnished the city is subjected to contamination.

One of the beneficiaries is the delectable Harrison Gray Otis of the Los Angeles Times. The Southern Pacific railroad is connected with the project, having been paid excessive freight rates.

Ready for Socialism in the South.
Working people are ready for revolt; conditions are becoming intolerable. In all the industries employes who wish to get away from the present state of affairs pay 25 cents out of every dollar they draw for to have their time check cashed at the bank.

Report has it that the steel company at Ensley has 1,000 rifles with plenty of ammunition in a store room there; some of them bought by the striking miners two years ago. These are being kept for "emergencies." At Wyam the by-products mill of the steel plant employs 250 men; men kill on an average a man per week, mostly foremen.

When you consider that wages are very low, similar to the Pittsburgh district, you can readily perceive the graft in their readiness to pay employes in time checks. The conservative estimate placed on the value of one plant (Republic Iron & Steel Co.) puts it at \$500 per week. It seems that the only step left for these industries in exploitation is to follow the plan of the Jackson Lumber Co. of Chilton county, Alabama, who force their employes to pay \$1 per month doctor fee, and \$1 for health insurance fee. When sick they get half pay and free medical attention. The company carries \$1,000 insurance on the lives of all the workers and as the employe about 500 men and an average of one per week is killed by accident or in his work they rake off a nice little sum.

Everywhere I go I find the workers sore and desperate; pity the militia in this district. The militia are being trained. These spindle shanked rats, the militia men, won't walk over the workers as they did a few years ago in the west. Any mention of industrial unionism is received with enthusiastic cheers. Education and organization should be the battle cry.

The United Press is sending out a statement to the effect that the Interstate Commerce commission is flooded with inquiries concerning the operation of railroads under private and government ownership. "These come," says the report, "from people who are interested in opposing the advocacy of the Socialist party campaigners of government ownership of the railroads and their claim that state and government owned railroads in other countries are operated at lesser expense and greater profit than the privately owned railroads of this country." This is followed by a statement that the privately owned railroads are operated more economically and yet pay better wages and charge less for passenger and freight traffic and are infinitely faster and more comfortable than the publicly owned railroads.

The inference is that the Interstate Commerce commission has given out this report. It is a trick of the press. That statement is editorial, and is absolutely false. The United Press has simply been bought to send out a lie in the interest of the exploiting railroads of America.

If proportional representation was in vogue, as it should be, the republicans in the last congress would have had 181 members instead of 162, the democrats 184 instead of 228, and the Socialists 18 instead of one. The prohibition party would have had eight representatives. Proportional representation is rational, actual democracy and should be the rule.

Warren Meetings.

Comrade Fred D. Warren has returned from a trip to Ohio and Indiana, where he addressed several large meetings held under the auspices of Socialist organizations. Reports go to show that at each point the meeting was a great success in point of numbers and enthusiasm. The following account of the Marion, Ind., meeting is taken from the Daily Chronicle of that city.

"Fred D. Warren, 'fighting editor' of the blood red APPEAL TO REASON, was the 'run' the Socialists have to fire off and the crowd that might be called a Hiram S. Maxim automatic. The Wittman Case

been killed, and at any time there is likely to be bloodshed.

Yet in face of these conditions even now they tell you there is no class struggle, and that this is a time of great prosperity. It means that it is the best capitalism can offer, which ever of the three candidates of the capitalist parties is elected.

It is time you were considering a method of ending the suffering, the robbery, the struggle that threatens civil war at any time. If you can discover any way of doing this except through Socialism you owe it to the cause of humanity to make the plan known at once.

New "Monroe" Doctrine

The state department has addressed a notice to the minister of Nicaragua which is expected to create a profound sensation in Latin America. It outlines the future policy of the United States relative to Central American republics and is likely to become the basis of a future war. The instrument reads in part as follows:

"Under the Washington conventions United States has a moral mandate to exert its influence for the preservation of the general peace of Central America, and to this end in the strict enforcement of the Washington conventions and loyal support of their aims and purposes, all the Central American republics will find means of available co-operation."

This means that the United States has determined on a practical protectorate over all these Central American countries. It includes Mexico. It is a doctrine that this means nothing less than final annexation. It is precisely what the Morgan interests have been trying to force Taft to do for the last four years. He has wabbled so he has lost their support, which has now turned to Roosevelt, but in the hope of regaining it he has nerved himself to promulgate a doctrine like this. Depend on it, something big is in the air.

Indications are that Roosevelt has been losing during the past few weeks. His manner has been so arrogant that he has repelled where he sought to win. At the same time he has been losing. Socialism has been gaining tremendously. The interest in the Socialist campaign has increased remarkably in the past fortnight. The fact that Roosevelt has not aroused the enthusiasm he was expected to do among the Socialists in paralyzing those who hoped to kill the real movement for emancipation by putting Teddy in the field.

CAPITALISTS ARE DESPERATE

Indications are that Roosevelt has been losing during the past few weeks. His manner has been so arrogant that he has repelled where he sought to win. At the same time he has been losing. Socialism has been gaining tremendously. The interest in the Socialist campaign has increased remarkably in the past fortnight. The fact that Roosevelt has not aroused the enthusiasm he was expected to do among the Socialists in paralyzing those who hoped to kill the real movement for emancipation by putting Teddy in the field.

This does not mean that the Roosevelt campaign is ended. It merely means that something sensational will have to be sprung in order to give it new life. Keep your eye on Mexico. The seizure of the Tiger mine owned by Americans in that country, the holding of eighty Americans for ransom, the alleged massacre of numbers of Americans, is likely to be followed by something so tremendously sensational as to throw the people off their guard and lead to war. So far Taft was wabbled in his policy relative to Mexico. Neither the interests nor the American people would trust him in case of war. Wilson is a man who belongs in the study and he would not be trusted. Roosevelt's one hope—the hope of capitalism—is making war certain so that the people will turn to Teddy before election. Keep your eyes open. Don't be thrown off your guard but expect something tremendous.

THE CLASS WAR IS ON.

Protest meetings are being held all over the east against the further imprisonment of Ettore and Giovanni in the Lawrence, Mass. jail. The matter is being taken up also in Italy and is likely to lead to international complications. An international general strike has been threatened to take place the close of September. So alarmed are the conspirators (some of whom who confessed aiding in placing dynamite to discredit the workers, that they have ordered the arrest of William D. Haywood on an old charge of embezzling money.

Sixty-four prisoners now in jail at Lake Charles, La., are to be tried in October on a charge of conspiracy. One of the prisoners is A. L. Emerson, president of the Timber Workers' Union. General Manager Sheffield Bridge-water, of the Industrial Lumber Company, is reported to have said: "I would give \$200,000 to see Emerson hanged." The association has deposited more than \$100,000 to finance the conviction of Emerson and his imprisoned fellow workers. Three of the workers have already died as a result of the massacre at Grabov. In a massacre in which the timber workers were weaponless and in which the armed guards of the association did all the shooting. The timber lands of Louisiana and elsewhere have been stolen by a band of pirates who are so determined to beat down labor and enforce their will upon the people that they are willing to resort to murder in order to maintain their hold on the south.

West Virginia is under military rule because of a strike of the miners in an effort to get decent wages and fair living conditions. Several have already

Real Issues, Clear Cut

BY EUGENE V. DEBS.

THE spirit of our time is revolutionary and growing more so every day. A new social order is struggling into existence. The old economic foundation of society is breaking up and the social structure is beginning to totter. The capitalist system is doomed. The signs of change confront us upon every hand.

Social changes are preceded by popular agitation and unrest. We are today in the midst of the transition period between decaying capitalism and growing Socialism. The old system is being shaken to its foundations by the forces underlying it and its passing is but a question of time. The new system that is to succeed the old is developing within the old and its outline is clearly revealed in its spirit of mutualism and its co-operative basis.

For countless ages the world has been a vast battlefield and the struggle for existence a perpetual battle. Primitive people were compelled to fight nature to extort the means of livelihood. Since the forces of nature have been conquered and nations have become civilized, the struggle of men is no longer to overcome nature but with one another for existence.

In this struggle, which appealed to the basest and not to the best in man, the cunning few have triumphed and now have the masses at their mercy. These few are closely allied in their economic matters as they are also in their control of the political machinery. Their money and their mercenarities controlled the republican convention at Chicago, wrote its platform and dictated its nominee, and the same is true of the democratic convention at Baltimore.

As for the so-called progressive convention it is sufficient to say that there is no attempt to conceal the fact that it was financed and controlled by three conspicuous representatives of the plutocracy, which largely owns and wholly rules the land.

There were no workmen and no working women at the republican convention, the democratic convention, or the progressive convention. These were clearly not working class conventions. Ladies and gentlemen of leisure were in evidence at them all. Wage slaves would not have been tolerated in their company. They represented the wealth and culture and refinement of society and they were there to applaud and smile approval upon the professional politicians and patriots who were doing their work.

But there was a fourth convention held this year which did not attract the wealthy and leisure classes. It was a convention great in purpose though not big in numbers. This convention was held at Indianapolis and represented the working class. The delegates who composed this convention were chosen by the workers and paid by the workers to represent the class interests of the workers and to clear the way for the workers in the present campaign.

The Socialist convention was the only democratic convention and the only progressive convention held this year; the only convention that represented a dues-paying party membership and whose acts before becoming effective must be ratified by a referendum vote of the party.

The Socialist party is the only party in this campaign that stands against the present system and for the rule of the people; the only party that boldly avows itself the party of the working class and its purpose the overthrow of wage slavery.

So long as the present system of capitalism prevails and the few are allowed to own the nation's industries, the toiling masses will be struggling in the heat of poverty as they are today. To tell them that juggling with the tariff will change this beastly and disgraceful condition is to insult their intelligence. The professional politicians who have been harping upon this string since infant industries have become giant monopolies know better. Their stock in trade is the credulity of the masses.

The exploited wage slaves of free trade England and of the highly protected United States are the victims of the same capitalism; in England the politicians tell them they are suffering because they have no protective tariff and in the United States they tell them that the tariff is the cause of their poverty.

The Socialist party is absolutely the only party which faces conditions as they are and declares unhesitatingly that it has a definite and concrete plan and program for dealing with them. The Socialist party as the party of the exploited workmen in the mills and mines, on the railways and on the farm; the workers of both sexes and all races and colors, the working class in a word, constituting a great majority of the people and in fact the people.

demands that the nation's industries shall be taken over by the nation and that the nation's workers shall operate them for the benefit of the whole people.

Private ownership and competition have had their day. The Socialist party stands for social ownership and co-operation. The one is industrialism; the other Socialism; the one is industrial despotism, the other industrial democracy.

The republican, democratic and progressive parties all stand for private ownership and competition. The Socialist party alone stands for social ownership and co-operation.

The republican, democratic and progressive parties believe in regulating the trusts; the Socialist party believes in owning them so that all the people may get the benefit of them instead of a few being made plutocrats and the masses impoverished.

The working class is in politics this year. It has always been in politics for its master; this year it is in politics for itself.

The most promising fact in the world today is that labor is organizing its power; its economic power and its political power.

The workers who have made the world and who support the world are preparing to take possession of the world. This is the meaning of Socialism and is what the Socialist party stands for in this campaign.

We demand the machinery of production in the name of the workers and the control of society in the name of the people. We demand the abolition of capitalism and wage slavery and the surrender of the capitalist class. We demand the complete enfranchisement of women and the equal rights of all the people regardless of race, color, creed or nationality. We demand that child labor cease once forever and that all children born into the world shall have equal opportunity to grow up, to be educated, to have healthy bodies and trained minds and to develop and freely express the best there is in them in mental, moral and physical achievement.

We demand complete control of industry by the workers; we demand all the wealth they produce for their own enjoyment, and we demand the earth for all the people.
