Comrade N. A. Richardson was deputed by the National Executive Committee to investigate the situation at San Diego, the center of the struggle for the speech of the people.

On arriving at San Diego on April 17, I learned that the Hon. H. W. Steinbock, the commissioner appointed by Hon. Hiram Johnson.

For the sake of brevity I shall divide this report into two parts—First, the legislative ordinance and the response thereto on the part of the I. W. W., the socialist local and the industrial trusts.

Second, a synopsis of the campaign carried on by the city's police and detective forces in an attempt to suppress the vigilance committee and the message of the city every person who so much as expressed the slightest sympathy for the workers in their contention for the fight of free speech in that locality.

Early in January of 1912 the city council of San Diego passed an ordinance designating some six blocks in that district in which no meetings on the streets was prohibited.

loration by the council that it is a contempt of court to refuse to give up the ordinance. This ordinance has already been determined. That it is not an ever lasting ordinance is known to all persons at all conversant with the law.

(b) The referendum should not be invoked. The ordinance was plainly passed in violation of the constitution of the United States and of the State of California, and hence, not a matter for determination by the voters of any municipality. It was clearly an act of the legislative body and hence null and void.

(c) In the contest for the referendum, the city's police and detective forces were equipped to do legal battle with the vigilance committee and the industrial trusts.

(d) They had nothing but their bodies to offer as a sacrifice in this struggle for their rights. In this fight their opportunity lay in refusal to obey the ordinance, go to jail by hundreds if need be, demand separate jury trials, and thus clog the wheels of government.

There came rumors of hundreds of laboring men advancing upon San Diego from other parts of the country. They were met by the city's police and detective forces, and they were met by the city's police and detective forces.

At the appointed place of execution and bestiality of death of those arrested there is no record of any sort in the city of San Diego. Their names are not on the list of those arrested.

The deported "prisoners" were well treated by the police, they were not taken out for the flagging and whipping by the commissioner. Whatever they had to say must be said in the presence of the city's police.

As soon as the capitalists realized that they were confronted by a coalition as well as a theory and a very expensive condition at that, they opened a series of measures well calculated to crush every form of opposition that the laboring class could mount.

They arrested about everything that was in the way of the strike, but still the speaking went on around its borders. Then they had the city's police and detective forces to make the "move on" ordinance. This made it impossible to speak on the streets.

Most of these were stationed some twenty miles from the city proper, and the distance between the incorporated limits. The chief function of these "prisoners" was to receive "prisoners" from the hands of the police at the border of the city.

After a most terrific beating, these men would usually be placed in a cell, and kept from food and water, when they would be taken out for the flagging and whipping.

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Russian men in that there prevail among the police and detective forces. At the city all unspokenly cruelty was inflicted upon the men by over-crowding of apartments.

Here, we saw a reception waiting for the men who had been arrested. They were taken to the police station and held there.

A meeting was held at the offices of the Builders' Exchange, which shows that the Trades and Workers' Association of this city are perfectly agreeable to permitting the employees to establish wages and conditions of employment. As a mutual admiration society the Trades and Workers' Association are entitled to this ribbon.

CIGARMAKERS GAIN NOTABLE VICTORY
Los Angeles, June 11.—In signing up the "Base Cigar Factory" the union cigarmakers have won a notable victory. The factory originally opened as a union concern, but in April, 1907, it was taken over by the "Base Cigar Factory" and since that time has been a non-union concern. The cigarmakers, however, have kept up an active contest against the non-unionism of the firm, and as a result an adjustment has been secured and the factory will again employ one but union cigarmakers.

WHY JOIN THE SOCIALIST PARTY?

It is true that employers will not hesitate to "bluff" the worker out of voting for class, if he can do it, but when it comes to giving up the rich pickings which come out of a capable, efficient, industrious workman, just to "make good" a bluff, the average employer will hesitate long.

And, as a matter of established fact, the Socialist worker is ordinarily a better workman than the non-socialist. This is not a vainglorious boast, born of egotism; but a demonstrable certainty.

Another objection occasionally raised, is this: "Oh, I'm no talker. Let me and the people who are able to talk organize and run the party." I'll be with you when it comes to voting.

The man who claims to be a Socialist, and who, without just and sufficient cause, fails to join the organized political movement of his class, is exactly as useful to the Socialist movement, as the man who holds off and refuses to join until during a strike.

Exactly. And the union sympathy of the shop who would do anything to keep the workers together to join it helps unionism also.

Don't depend on others to run YOUR political party for you, regardless how true and faithful you may think they are.

Some of you will say: "It's all very well to talk about joining the party; but the party won't do anything for me. Well, joining the party is to a great extent that's true. We of the 900 Socialist party members of Buffalo are sticking together. Do you realize, you Socialists, outside of the party ranks, that YOU are the ones who have made it possible for sneering capitalists to say that the workmen don't stick together?"

Why? Nothing is simpler. They are not your parties. They are the parties of the men who pay the bills. The capitalists willingly pay the bills of the old parties, because they recognize that the old parties are their parties.

Do this today. Don't dangle along waiting for someone to build a fire under you. Come out of your trance TODAY. Get into the ranks of the Socialist Party. Don't don't know, FIND OUT. When you know where you stand, ACT. It's up to you. Not next week or next month or next year, but now—RIGHT NOW—is the time for you to JOIN THE PARTY OF YOUR CLASS.

THE SOCIAL DISEASE AND THE REMEDY

Have you ever noticed how few workmen eat at the small restaurants and step at the fine hotels?

You see, it is this way under the capitalist system: The man that does the least labor gets the most money; he gets the best food to eat and plenty of it.

The man who does the hardest kind of manual labor receives the very smallest wage. He is considered just a common workman. He must either carry his lunch in a bucket or box, eat it when stale, or skirmish around in a half hour's time for a five-cent lunch room or eat a ten or fifteen cent dinner.

Do you really believe you were born to be slaves? Do you really believe that others were born to live as your labor? Do you think you were born to look up to a master class, and have them treat you like so many animals?

But the time is coming, when men must think and work out their own emancipation. The capitalist class is forcing the working class to think.

As soon as the working man begins to think, he becomes class-conscious. He learns the difference between his interest and the capitalists interests.

He commences to understand that industrial and social conditions are in a disturbed and chaotic condition. The whole social order is being overthrown.

But the next thing that the remedy—Ah! there is the rub! Will he be willing to take a hand and administer the remedy?

Socialism is the remedy. It has been painted as an awful dose by those that are profiting by keeping society in a diseased state, but it will cure the ills that are afflicting the people.

No wonder that men become so enthusiastic when they first see the light of Socialism. It gives them something to work for and hope for. It is a new life. It promises real living and freedom, in place of slavery and starvation.

THE ISSUE OF THE WORKING CLASS
