CHICAGO SOCIALISTS ADOPT PLATFORM; PANG A THEME

Enthusiastic Mass Convention Starts the City Campaign—Demonstration of the Unemployed Is to Be Arranged

A campaign platform was adopted, great enthusiasm for the conduct of the campaign was expressed and the matter of reversing the great army of unemployed was dealt with when the convention of the Socialist party of Chicago took place Sunday afternoon at 180 Washington street.

Resolution on Unemployed Following is the text of the resolution: In consideration of the fact that there are not less than 150,000 unemployed workers in the city of Chicago at the present time, and that indescribable suffering prevails in the homes of these jobless workers, who have been in no way responsible for the panic, which has resulted from the destructive policies of the capitalist class;

Pledge Support to Daily A rally to the support of the Chicago Daily Socialist formed also an important feature of the convention. Unanimous loyalty to the paper was expressed and those present went to the extent of pledging themselves to do all in their power for its support.

Platform 1. The representatives who the Socialist party sends to the city council will stand for the administration of the affairs of the city of Chicago for the benefit of the worker. One city administration after another has made promises to the workers, but each has failed to carry out its pledges.

2. The Socialist party everywhere uses all political power gained by it for the benefit of the working class. This has been proved by the Socialists of Milwaukee and by the Socialists of German, French and other European cities. With this end in view, Socialists, when placed in power in Chicago, will establish and maintain a system of public works for the purpose of giving employment to the unemployed. It will be their aim not to promote the interests of the wealthy taxpayers, but to protect those who have no means of subsistence but their labor power.

3. Socialist city government will construct sufficient school buildings for the children of Chicago, and provide for the maintenance of the children at the schools by furnishing books, food and other necessities. 4. All contract work will be abolished and all city work will be done by direct employment at union wages.

5. The power of the police will not be used for the protection of employers in time of strikes. 6. The city will undertake the supply at cost of milk, coal, ice and light.

7. The Socialist party stands for the municipal ownership of all street transportation lines and the operation of all so-called public utilities. The hypocrisy of the public parties in their pretense to being able to manage ownership has been shown by their passage of the telephone and street car ordinances, contrary to the will and against the interests of the people.

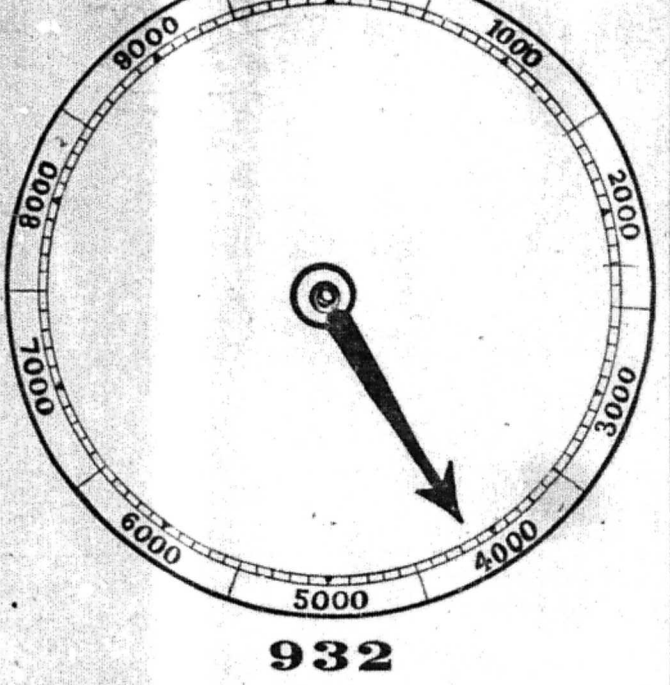

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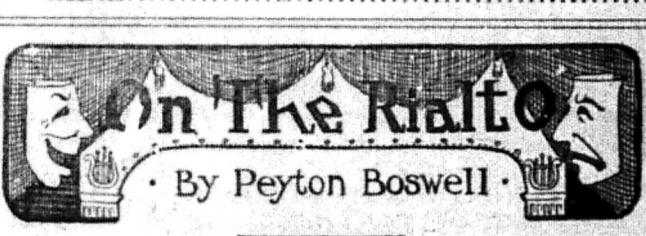
