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4,000 JOIN IN POLICE PROTEST

Throgs Learn Truth of Outrage from Gotham Socialist Speakers

BY WM. MAILLY. (Mail Correspondence) New York, April 5.—Four thousand people enthusiastically applauded the speakers of the Socialist party in Grand Central Palace when they denounced the arbitrary interference of the city authorities with the right of assembly and free speech. Over 250 policemen were stationed in and about the hall and made a pretense of preserving order, but their presence was at no time needed as any Socialist meeting anywhere. Still, the police took their task very seriously. They stood in a line, their backs to the speakers and their hands on their hips. They were posted along the aisles and around the sides of the big hall and very solemn and dignified they bore themselves. When the speakers and never once turned their heads, but kept their eyes fixed upon the inoffensive and amused audience. It would have been very funny if it had not been a direct insult to the party and the audience. It was only another sign of the mixture of stupidity and unreasonableness that characterizes the police department of this and other cities.

Evening Paper Entertaining. One entertaining evening paper had an extra out before the meeting got under way announcing in big headlines that the police prevented bomb throwing at Socialist meeting. That means that if the police had not tossed bombs at each other and engaged in a general slaughter of one another. Yet some people will believe the police did great work. Besides the police there was an extra large contingent of reporters and magazine writers, who evidently came expecting to get good "copy." There was good "copy," too, but not the kind the capitalist press wants to print. Algeon Lee, editor of the New York Socialist, presided. He was introduced by James G. MAGNATES HEAR SOCIALIST TALK

Captains of Industry Listen to an Address by Hillquit

(Special to the Daily Socialist) New York, April 7.—The Influence of Socialistic Doctrine Upon Industry and Legislation was the topic discussed the other night at the annual dinner of the Economic Club at the Hotel Astor. The grand ballroom was overcrowded, and an adjoining room had to be opened for the overflow of members and guests who desired to hear the discussion of the topic. Morris Hillquit, from the East Side, member of the national executive committee of the Socialist party, was the dominant speaker of the evening. There were many speakers to combat his views and to argue against them. The members and guests were nearly all anti-Socialists. The president of the Economic Club is A. Barton Hepburn, president of the Chase National Bank. In the company at table were scores of captains of industry. Describes Socialism. Hillquit had abundant opportunity to preach Socialism to a gathering which represented wealth and big financial interests. "Socialism," said Hillquit, "does not seek to destroy civilization or to abolish the modern industrial and political system. It merely strives for the nationalization or socialization of all important industries and the collective public ownership of the necessary instruments upon which such industries are based—the land, mines, railroads, factories, and machinery. The Socialists claim that the marvelous growth of productivity of labor within the last generation has enabled mankind, for the first time in history, to produce enough to satisfy the reasonable needs of all human beings, and that there is no necessity or justification for the continuance of that widespread poverty, misery, and privation which mar our present civilization. Calls System Immoral. "The Socialists claim that the system which allows one man, no matter how great or good, to accumulate material wealth enough to last thousands of families through countless generations to come, while innocent babes around him perish for lack of food and air, while sheer privation drives hosts of his fellow men and women into the paths of crime and vice, is inhuman, irrational, and immoral, and the Socialists strive to change that system." There was applause for this statement. Hillquit continued: "The individual capitalist steadily yields his place in the industrial world to the corporation and the trust, and these combine and consolidate the independent managements of numerous individual concerns under one corporate direction, and reorganize industries frequently on a national and even international scale. "The irresistible growth of trusts and monopolies is the central fact of all recent economic development, and it is the death-knell of individual competition. "The Socialists do not combat the trusts, because they recognize the economic necessity of their origin and growth. Socialism Is Growing. "The Socialist tendency is growing, and growing rapidly, in our industrial and legislative systems, and it is growing in all other domains of our social existence. "An ignorant scribe in the editorial chair of an up to date newspaper may try to discuss Socialism in terms of libels and hysterical denunciations; a superficial statesman may attempt to restrict its growth by reactionary legislation; and a brutal policeman may endeavor to destroy it by physical force. "Socialism stands for social progress, social justice, and social reason, and progress, justice and reason cannot be argued, legislated, or clubbed out of existence—they are bound to prevail. Last Saturday were anarchists calling to anarchy. They always such tactics as those used in Union Square and a Silverstein will come along in answer. Always the Socialist fight anarchy, warily on top and bottom. When Taft said recently that he was for individualism against Socialism he was aligning himself with anarchy and one had only to look in the dictionary for a definition of individualism to prove it. "God Knows" Answer. Taft could not answer the unemployed by saying "God knows," but the Socialists know. We are going to tell that we know what is wrong no matter how many police or soldiers are lined up against us. We refuse to allow the capitalists or their lackeys to fasten anarchy upon us, and we will keep on until our fight is won and the working class is free. Thomas J. Lewis followed, suggesting that the Socialists liberate the Bedloe's Island Schmitzberger ought to be placed there with a club in his hand as a sign of the freedom existing in the land of the thieves and the home of the slaves. Speakers Were Militant. Resolutions were introduced and adopted without a single dissenting voice. The speakers were eloquent and militant in their denunciation of city authorities, and the hearty response to the speeches was sufficient evidence that the Socialists of New York are aroused and will break no more with their legal and moral rights from one, whether clothed in brief authority or not.

7 SLAIN AND 100 HURT IN LISBON POLITICAL RIOT

Band of Police Thieves Caught Philadelphia Patrolmen Confess to Robbing Many Stores

Philadelphia, Pa., April 7.—A band of robbers composed of four local policemen have been arrested here. This is said to be only a forerunner to the arrest of over fifty of the Philadelphia police force who are said to be implicated in burglaries which extend throughout the city. Allegations that half the police in the district, which takes in most of the rich warehouse and wholesale section in the center of the city, are thieves were made by one of the policemen, Albert H. Sittens, in his confession. "I and four other policemen assigned to Superintendent Taylor, 'If you arrest every one of your officers in the fourth district who is a robber you will have to 'pinch' half the district. It's the same all over the city. The police take what they can get any way they can get it." Sittens and his three companions, John Kelley, Jr., Clement M. Luckenbill and John Straub, were held without bail by Magistrate Benton. They will be tried Thursday. Sweeping Police Investigation As soon as the police heads of the district were suspended there came the discovery of loot of far greater value than that already recovered and the detective bureau was flooded with many reports of thefts from merchants in the city's wholesale district. The police instituted an investigation of the police department at 6 o'clock which reaches over the whole city. In a secret subcellar of the home of a policeman in the district were discovered plunder aggregating thousands of dollars in value, including rolls of silk and carpet and matting and other household goods. Detectives also discovered clues to similar places of concealment in which they expect to find even a greater quantity of plunder than has already been recovered. Altogether more than \$30,000 worth of loot has been found. "With the four officers arrested, William Frost, who acted as a 'fence' for the police, and William Luckenbill, a 15-year-old boy, who was used by the police to open doors for them. Plans of Robberies It was confessed by the accused and testified to that their method was to gather at a place to be robbed at special times. Luckenbill was kept in the city's wholesale district. Frost would bring the police and a push cart to the place selected. If the police could not open the place themselves they would use the boy. REFUTES GARISH ARMY POSTER

Mcfarland of Flint, Tex., Tells of Enlistment "Promises"

In refutation of the glowing terms in which the United States army is being advertised with all the astuteness of the patent medicine company and the get-rich-quick-scheme promoter W. B. McFarland of Flint, Tex., writes a letter to the Daily Socialist giving his exact experience in army service. McFarland says that on the close of his enlistment, which expired in Manila, he was not given "cents per mile" as the circular states, but was returned in a transport, where as the result of exposure and the lack of proper medical care his health has been impaired for the past nine years. Text of the Letter. His letter concerning the army poster published verbatim by the Daily is as follows: "Editor Daily Socialist: "As a refutation of the United States army poster which is quoted in the Daily April 2, in the third column, and includes an exact duplicate of paragraph 2 of the United States army general orders 180 of 1898, which shows that the ones at the head of the army make new rules whenever and however they please. "To illustrate, the poster says: 'You will be paid on discharge 4 cents per mile from the place of discharge to the place of enlistment.' To carry the illustration further, on Jan. 24, 1898, I enlisted for three years at Dallas, Tex., and the posters used at that time, as well as the information given me by the recruiting sergeant, informed me that I should on the date of my discharge receive 'one day's pay and one day's allowance for every twenty miles traveled between the point of discharge and enlistment.' Had to Accept Transport. "That sounded all right, but when the three years expired and I was honorably discharged at Manila, P. I., I was forced by general order 180 to accept transport service from the islands to Frisco before I was permitted to leave the army. As a result of the exposure to which I was subjected on that trip and the lack of proper medical assistance on the transport I am still suffering from the ill effects which the trip had on my health and have suffered continually for nine years. Yet I can get no pension or other relief. "In other words, general order 180 put me off from the \$400 transportation money, a paying position with an English line and ruined my health. "What they did for the enlisted man of 1898 they will do for the enlisted man of 1908 after they have him in the service, if the same opportunity presents itself. If you can use this you are at liberty to do so. "Very truly yours, "W. B. McFARLAND."
