Stuttgart, Aug. 1.—The Schwabische Tagwacht publishes an article on a subject which is likely to occupy considerable attention in the party in the near future—namely, the tendency in our ranks in all countries to overestimate the importance of parliamentarism and to ignore the special dangers which this institution, especially when it is overestimated, has for the movement.

NEW TURK WAR CHIEF IS DEAD

Constantinople, Aug. 17.—The new cabinet suffered a great loss yesterday in the sudden death of the war minister, Redjeb Pasha, from heart disease.

The government program has been published. Its salient features include a declaration that all laws and regulations not compatible with the new regime will be amended; that the army, navy and all government departments will be reorganized, and that non-Musselmans will be eligible to military service.

He was released yesterday after serving only one year of the four-year sentence imposed upon him for standing the whole German army on its ears by his practical joke, which incidentally won for him all the funds in the Koepenick town treasury and brought about the imprisonment of all the town officers.

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5,500 SOLDIERS AWE RAGE MOB; ENFORCE LAW

Fever for Blood at Springfield Abated; Quick Action By the Grand Jury

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 17.—With 5,500 national guardsmen patrolling the streets the fever for bloodshed is abated at Springfield, and the city is once more ruled by law and order.

It is not to be understood that the trouble is over. The display of strength made by five regiments of the state's organized militia simply overawed the population which has been responsible for all of the disturbance.

Two names were added yesterday to the death roll of the race riots. They were Frank Delmore, a coal miner, who was shot by a negro in the attack on the "Bad Lands" Friday night, and William Donnegan, the aged negro and friend of Abraham Lincoln who was hung to a tree in front of his home Saturday night.

The list of the known dead: BURTON SCOTT, negro, hanged by mob to 15th and Jefferson streets; hanged by mob to 14th and Tealish and Madison streets.

Horror Sobers Mobbers Doggen was brutally hanged by the mob. He was cut down still alive by the troops. He died in terrible agony at 11:45 o'clock yesterday morning after a desperate struggle for life, breathing through a tube inserted in an aperture in his neck which the ropes had sawed.

Will Summon Special Jury A special jury, called from the county, will be summoned today to appear in Springfield Tuesday morning. Every man who is now being held, or out on bond, or who may be arrested by the troops during their stay in Springfield will be asked in each case by State's Attorney Hatch, where there is a possibility of making a case.

Food Problem Becomes Serious The food problem during the day became serious. The sudden invasion of 4,000 troops drove the provision houses, the bakeries and the meat dealers to the limit. The country and city authorities were searching the city over for food for the refugee negroes, who are thoroughly helpless and afraid to move away from the military patrolled precincts.

The coal miners around Tracy City, Coalwood, etc., have long been non-union despite determined efforts of the W. M. A. W. to organize them.

Many of the farmers in the valley near Tracy City are suffering. Some of them rode horseback or in wagons as much as fifteen or twenty miles to hear the lecture.

On the train to Clinton a young man, J. N. Johnson, who heard me at Knoxville, came to talk with me.

At the Republican county convention in Pineville, Ky., last June many negroes and some white men were present.

At Wallens, near Pineville, the coal company owns everything except the public road. Its deputies drive out unlicensed peddlers, etc.

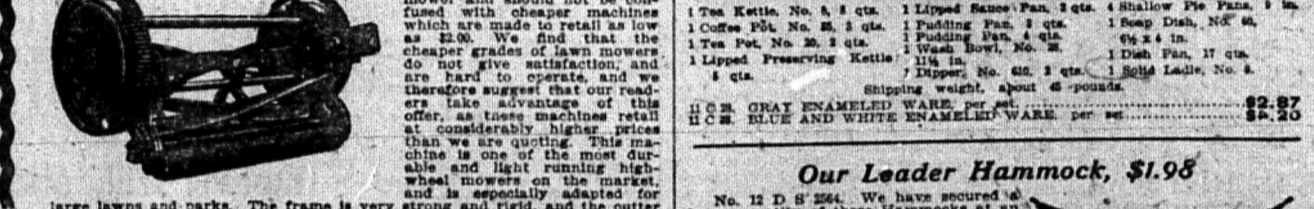

Elliot of Harvard Gives His Views to Cultured Bostonese

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.) Boston, Aug. 13.—President Charles W. Elliot of Harvard has announced that Socialism will never come in America. He has said it to a reporter of the Boston Post and that paper, in dignified Boston style, has accepted the dictum and rejoices. During his interview the noted educator said:

"The American people are opportunists; they will adopt institutions, whether Socialistic or not, so far as they are practical; but they will not adopt an idea beyond the stage when it becomes inefficient. There is a mild suggestion that President Elliot was joking just a little with the Post representative, who, as the basis of the interview, showed him James Creelman's 'transform' about 'American Trouble Makers.' The Post wanted Elliot to be 'frightened,' and, in turn, to give Boston the thrills.

President Elliot has a quiet home in Cambridge. That home overlooks the Harvard Union, an institution which is dedicated to the end that class distinctions shall not form the basis of student life at Harvard. It was given by one Thomas Wentworth Higginson, who is an avowed Socialist sympathizer.

It is not President Elliot's habit to view with alarm. Even the terrible 'menace' which James Creelman depicted Socialism to be failed to force President Elliot to become good news material.
