

STEEL TRUST IS INVULNERABLE

Gary Says Tariff Removal Would Only Disastrously Affect Competitors

Washington, D. C., Dec. 19.—Forty per cent of the iron output of the United States is controlled by the United States Steel corporation, according to its president, Elbert H. Gary, who, testifying before the ways and means committee of congress which is working on the tariff, said: "If you protect our competitors you leave us above protection, and I believe that the United States Steel corporation should make public its affairs and submit to government control."

Steel Trust Invulnerable

Gary inferred in reply to a question that should the tariff on steel be removed the steel trust would last but its competitors would be driven to the wall. The witness also outlined the benefits which the steel trust derives from owning in whole or in part the mines, steamships and railroads needed for its actual business of converting ore into commercial steel and pig iron.

Cost Reaches \$15 a Ton

He said that the general manufacturer could not produce it for less than \$15 a ton. Declaring that the average cost of producing pig iron in all of the plants of the United States Steel corporation is \$15.3 a ton, Mr. Gary gave the figures by which this average was determined. The iron ore used in the production of a ton of iron costs \$8.62, he said. The other items which go to make up the \$15.30, he said, are coke, \$1.15; limestone, 45 cents; scrap, 15 cents; pig iron and scale, 11 cents; labor, materials and operating cost, \$1.25; and depreciation, 40 cents.

Says Employees Earn More

Mr. Gary gave the average earnings per man per day in the United States as \$2.42 in 1907, as against \$2.26 in 1902, and \$2.10 in 1901. The corporation manufactures annually \$6,000,000 to \$10,000,000 worth of pig iron and the same quantity of finished steel, including steel rails, structural steel, steel wire and piano wire, tubes, and tin plate.

THEY TUNNELED WAY OUT

Federal Officials Ask Daily Socialist Not to Print Information in Hand

Starving and half dead from exposure, Charles Verman, 5 North Clark street, limped into Capt. P. D. O'Brien's office this morning and said that he had escaped from Argo in a load of dirt on last Friday after being shot at by the guards. He declares that other prisoners were also shot at but that he knows of no one being killed.

Duplicating the scene of yesterday, almost a score of witnesses came voluntarily to the office of the district attorney this morning and, telling stories of having dug their way out of the Argo stockade and of being clubbed and shoved back from the gate by guards, begged to be taken before the federal grand jury now sitting. The grand jury already has a score or more of witnesses to be heard today, and if the best of the newcomers are subpoenaed and brought before that body there will be little or no hope that the probe into the conditions at Argo will be finished before late Monday, as it is declared that there will be no session of the jury tomorrow.



Government by Spies

It is one of the traditional characteristics of any form of autocracy that it must rest upon spies.

The obverse of this proposition is true. Just as a despotism must maintain a spy system, so the establishment of a spy system in any society is a sign of the coming tyranny.

The growing industrial despotism in America is casting a shadow of espionage before it. Few persons have any realization of the extent to which the spy system has been developed in American life.

Every great industrial combination employs an army of spies. These were at first hired ostensibly to prevent dishonesty among employees.

Now we learn that spies are regularly hired to "work up public sentiment" in favor of franchises and to disrupt organizations formed to oppose such grants.

So far has this new system of espionage gone that today there is a great secret army pervading every phase of American life.

They are responsible to real rulers of the United States, the kings of iron and coal and steel and roads.

ADVISORY EDUCATIONAL COUNCIL

BY MAY WOOD-SIMONS

Chicago's school board is discussing advisory educational councils—of which the teachers are to be a part.

The Tribune announces that the advisory council plan is buried. It is not yet buried, but if the board finally decides on such action it puts itself on record as opposed to democracy in practice, as educationally, reactionally and running counter to the opinions of the foremost educators of the country.

Chicago teachers have for years seen the importance of such councils. The layman may have thought this is a mere matter of detail in school management.

These Mr. Cooley saw clearly would interfere with the autocratic rule that business interests desired him to institute in the public schools.

John Dewey says they are. Albert Bushnell Hart says they are. Cha. Eliot of Harvard admits they are.

There is no place to which the teacher who has suffered through the superintending force can appeal except to the superintendent.

For this heavy injustice there is now no redress for the teacher. If an advisory council existed she could appeal to that and have her case considered.

Yet it is these teachers who are doing the educational work of the city. The superintendent, were he the most excellent, is but one expert and could not know as the teacher does the problems of the school room.

Yet Mr. Cooley, who knows this, has never consulted the several thousand teachers of Chicago on any educational question.

He has never asked the opinion of this body of educational experts. If this were nothing else, it means that the failure to use the knowledge of the teacher is a loss of energy. It is "poor business."

Deprived of any initiative in her work, the teacher is denied the means of growth.

As far back as '97 a teachers' council system existed. It was a voluntary body and was not an integral part of the school system.

It is the proposition that is again being revived and discussed. As to its merits there can be no two opinions.

For the participation of teachers in school organizations there are many positive reasons. In the first place, the community needs their expert advice.

The school council in which the teachers and principals should meet on the same basis for purpose of discussion and deliberation, where each has the right to offer his solution of the various problems and have it accepted or rejected according as it meets the approval or disapproval of the majority is necessary in the school system.

The people of Chicago cannot pass this question over lightly. If they believe in democracy they should see that the school board decides in favor of the educational council.
