Representative Greene of Massachusetts (Republican) has introduced a bill providing for the granting of ship subsidies by congress to encourage the merchant marine.

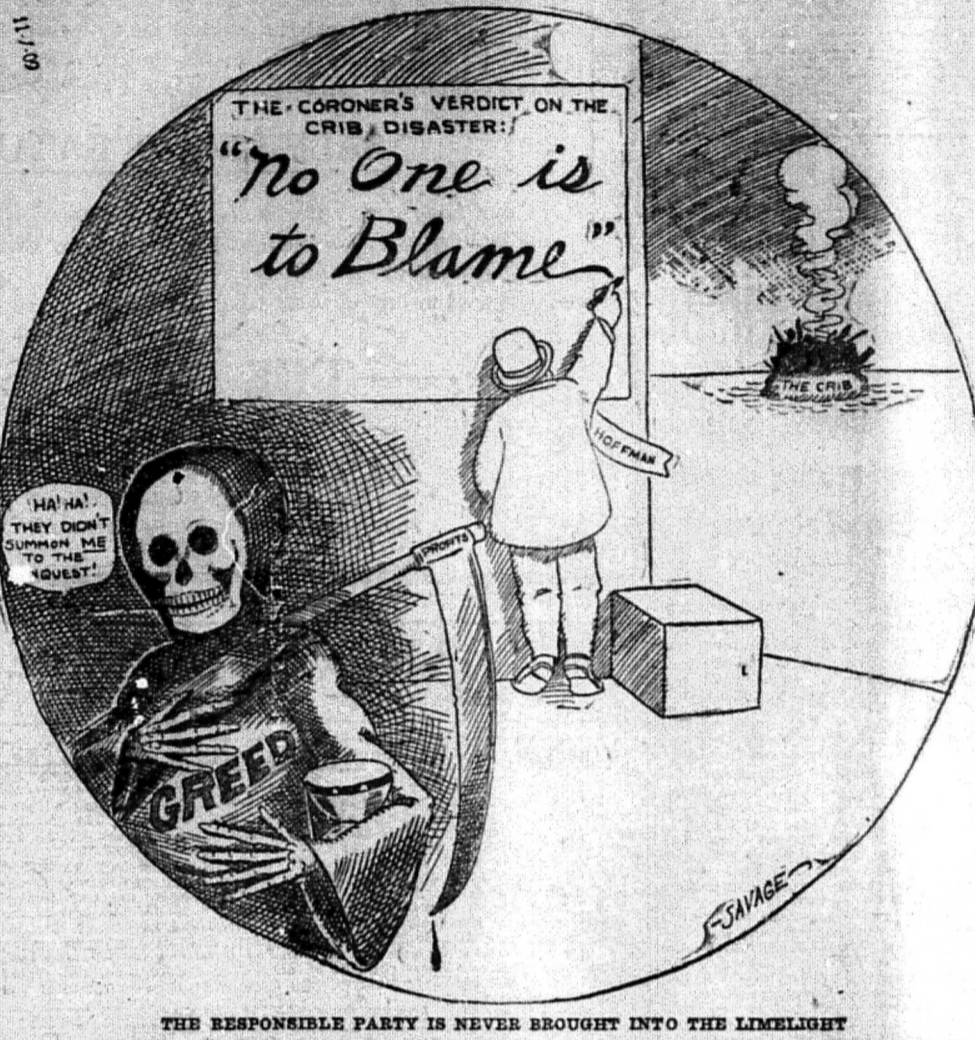

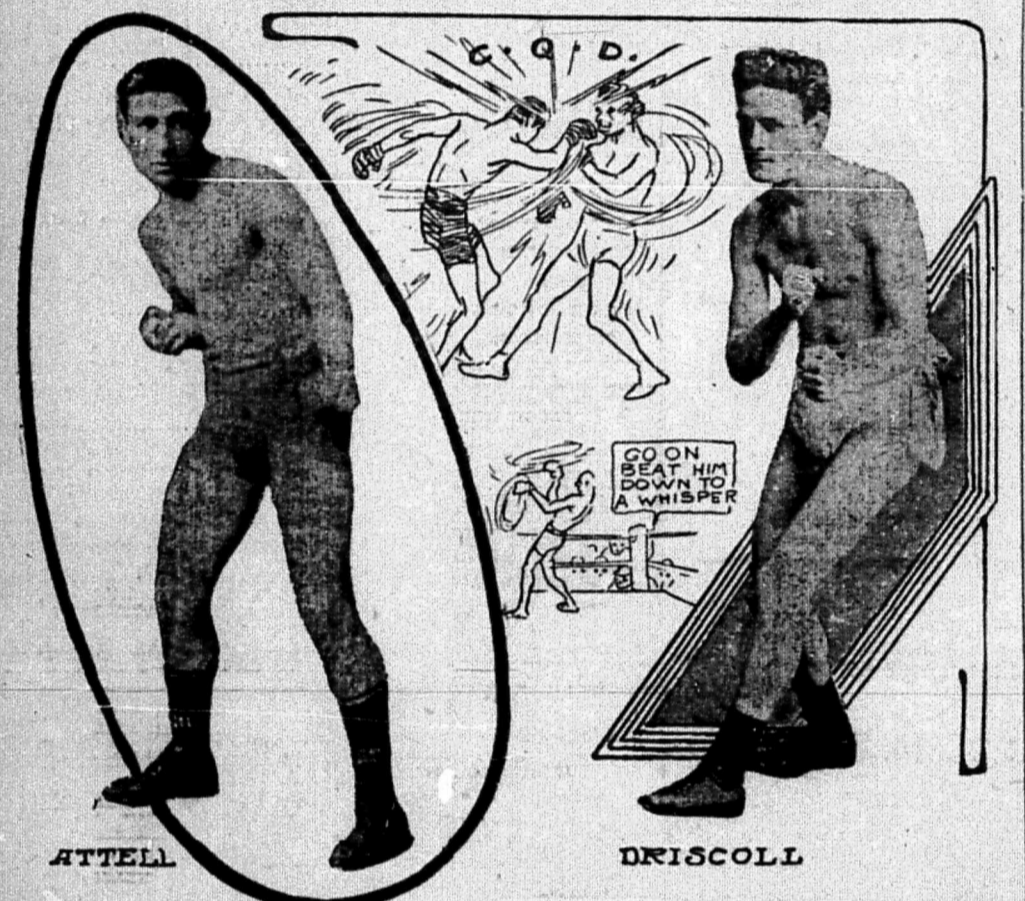

The outfit weighs only three-quarters of a pound, but it is constructed on the gravity principle, and by its use animals up to 300 pounds may be weighed.

BOGUS MONEY FLOODS GOTHAM

New York, Feb. 20.—New York city is flooded with counterfeit quarters and dimes. So much of the small spurious silver is said to be in circulation that many corporations, especially the transportation companies, have issued warnings to cashiers and ticket sellers. Many of the coins have been seized by secret service agents, but so far they have been unable to trace the source of supply, although indications are that they are being coined somewhere in Brooklyn.
