Democrats and Republicans Are Shown as Corruptionists in Legislature

(By United Press Associations.) Springfield, Ill., May 31.—The absence of State's Attorney Burke from the city today will not delay the investigation of legislative bribery and corruption nor detract from the spectacular features it has already developed.

Looks Over Law Points The judge spent Memorial day looking up citations made by counsel for and against the defendant. It is believed he will not rule to quash the indictment against Brown.

Senator John Broderick, indicted on a charge of paying \$2,500 to Senator Holstlaw to vote for William Lorimer, has filled up part of the space under the "spot light" yesterday.

State's Attorney Burke left for the sick bed of Senator Holstlaw to work out some of the details of the senator's confession to greater length.

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ARBEITER ZEITUNG BECOMES DAILY SOCIALIST NEWSPAPER

German Trade Unionists Take Over Former Anarchist Organ

After a long and stormy history the Arbeiter Zeitung of Chicago, the only anarchist daily in the world, has ceased to support that philosophy and will henceforth be a Socialist paper.

Gradually the influence of anarchist sentiment in the unions controlling the paper has died away. For many years this anarchism consisted in little more than abstention from voting.

Then began a struggle that has continued for years between those who advised, and those who opposed, political action to gain control of the paper.

This will make four daily papers in Chicago supporting the Socialist party, as the Bohemian, Polish and English Socialists already have their own daily organs.

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CYCLONE WIPES OUT BIG TOWN

Hundreds Reported Killed and Homes Swept Away by Wind Storm

Lisbon, May 31.—A terrific cyclone swept over Mozambique, on the east coast of Africa, yesterday, killing hundreds and destroying practically the entire city, according to dispatches published today in the Diario Noticias.

A coastwise steamer carrying 400 natives was caught in the cyclone off the harbor of Mozambique and overturned, drowning all on board.

Mozambique was formerly the metropolis of the Portuguese possessions in Africa. Its harbor is world famous.

Roosevelt Tells England How to Rule Egypt; Be Firm or Get Out, He Says

Ex-President Uses the Big Stick on His Hosts in Old London

London, May 31.—England today felt the swish of the "big stick." In famous Guild Hall, the picturesque headquarters of London's civic authorities, Col. Roosevelt, in response to the speech making him an honorary freeman of this city, assailed England's administration in Egypt and virtually declared that England should rule with a stronger hand or get out of that country and leave its government to a more fearless nation.

Keep Order, or Get Out "If you feel that you ought not to be in Egypt and have no desire to keep order there, by all means get out. If you feel that it is your duty to civilization to stay, then show yourselves ready to meet the responsibility of your position."

Audience Lukewarm Although Roosevelt was frequently applauded during his speech, there was no real enthusiasm in his reception, the audience evidently being more or less perplexed by the unexpected situation that the speech developed.

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TEXTILE STRIKERS HOLD RANKS FIRM IN GREAT STRUGGLE WITH BOSSES

South Bend Workers Are Making Brave Fight Against Big Odds

BY P. E. TOMLINSON (SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.) South Bend, Ind., May 31.—We are now pulling through the seventh week of one of the longest strikes that ever occurred in South Bend.

The textile woolen mill here of the South Bend Woolen Co., seven weeks ago last Tuesday, saw its workers walk out to the last man and woman. Every attempt on the part of the company to break the strike has resulted in a dismal failure.

Demand 10 Per Cent Raise The strikers demand a ten per cent increase in wages and an adjustment to a firing system they have had, also a recognition of the union.

When the workers first walked out there was no organization among them. They are all organized now. The central federation of labor is back of them and recognizes them as the greatest lot of workers that ever walked out of a mill in South Bend.

Out of a total of over 100 workers there probably is not more than three or four that have broken the ranks to return to work.

INDIA CALLED GREAT PROBLEM

Independent Labor Party Calls Condition of Workers There Important

At a meeting of the annual conference of the Independent Labor Party held in London a few weeks ago the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

That in the opinion of this conference, the economic and administrative problems of India are among the most urgent of Imperial questions. It believes that before any effective address is secured it will be necessary to build up an organization in India having the same objects as the Labor movement in this country.

Urged by Keir Hardie The resolution was moved amid cheers by Mr. Keir Hardie, who urged that the new press law made it impossible for any newspaper to be carried on in India unless it humbled itself in the dust.

The advocates of the new form had for their slogan the cry: "We will save you eleven hundred and forty dollars." The opponents had for their motto: "More power in the hands of the people and not less."

Suppression of Associations

The bureaucracy, we fear, does not always understand its own interests. If it did, it would realize the very grave mistake it has committed by taking power to itself to suppress associations and by actually suppressing some important Societies, by placing public meetings at the mercy of the executive and the police.

COLLEGE HEARS PARTY SPEAKER

Slous City, Ia., May 31.—John W. Bennett, a member of the local Socialist party, delivered a lecture at the Morningside college of this city. His subject was "Materialism."

The lecture was given to the class of social philosophy, but these were students from all departments. Many questions were hurled at the speaker after the lecture, the ready answers to which brought forth rounds of applause.

Mr. Bennett spoke at the invitation of Prof. F. E. Haynes, who is in charge of the department of political economy. Prof. Haynes invited Mr. Bennett to deliver a second lecture in the near future.

ROADS ASK MEN TO STOP FOES

Rail Magnates Ask Hard Driven Employees to Play Politics for Bosses

Washington, D. C., May 31.—Representatives of the Illinois Manufacturers' association, flanked by representatives of shippers of Wisconsin, Nebraska, Minnesota, Kansas and Iowa, appeared before Attorney General Wickersham yesterday with specific charges against the trunk lines of conspiracy and violation of the anti-trust law.

Protest Rate Boost The "kick" is raised against the increase of western freight rates to go into effect June 1. Also the Western Trunk Line association is charged with being an illegal combination.

Protecting Labor's Liberties

The Chicago Railways company is the latest guardian of the liberties of the American laborer.

But now it is seized with a sudden spasm of virtue. It is lending active aid and assistance to preserve the right of its employes to WORK IN A SCAB SHOP.

With becoming modesty the Chicago Railways company does not enter this fight in its own name. So far as the court records show the suit is brought by eight poor, oppressed workingmen.

Nothing so very oppressive about that? These benefits were shared by all who worked for the company. They were secured entirely by those who went into the union and fought for improved conditions.

So the men declared that they would not work with those who were not willing to share in the fight as well as the benefits. That is an old rule of warfare.

Then these eight men who had refused to belong to the union suddenly developed a great interest in the question of an "open shop."

Apparently this should have ended the case. Perish the thought. These down-trodden employes were fighting for a principle.

Even then these high principled workers were not satisfied. Taking a few thousand dollars more from the barrels into which they had carelessly tossed the surplus cash left from their magnificent earnings, after supporting their families, they carried the case to the Supreme court of Illinois.

The Supreme court of Illinois is asked to believe that these employes, who long ago settled the case with the union, and who probably have not money enough to pay the attorneys' fees in such a case for a single day are appealing to the highest judicial tribunal of this state to secure relief from the tyranny of a union that has secured them all the possibilities of decent human existence that they possess.

To anyone not gifted with that mental monstrosity known as a "legal mind" such a case is a fraud upon its face and any court with a remnant of self respect would be justified in punishing all those concerned for a cheap deception.

In a deeper sense still, the case is a fraud. It is brought in the name of liberty. Its object is to insure the enslavement of those it pretends to defend. Without the union the street car worker was a helpless slave to the company.

These are plain, simple facts. The judges know these facts "as men," and in their decision upon the ten hour law they said they "could not be blind as judges to what they know as men."

All the strikes ever conducted in Chicago are not responsible for as many dead and injured as the operation of the street cars and automobiles (to say nothing of the police) during the last year.

If Lorimer had only dared to tell ALL that he knows about Illinois politics he would not need to walk alone, even though his path should lead to the doors of the penitentiary.

With Cairo and Chicago boasting of the comparative cheapness and docility of their labor, Illinois has a close imitation of a public slave market.
