### GRAND JURY TO PROBE WRECK

#### Witness Boyd Missing as Judge Calls on Inquisitors to Meet

(By United Press Association.)  
Fort Wayne, Ind., Sept. 22.—Following the summoning by Judge C. W. White, of the Wells-Blackford circuit court of a special grand jury to convene Monday to investigate the wreck on the Fort Wayne and Wabash Valley traction, Wells county authorities today are searching for John Boyd, the Marion, Ind., traveling man, who was the only passenger to escape unhurt.  
After the wreck, Boyd declared that the collision of the traction cars in which forty persons were killed could have been avoided. He says the motorman of the northbound car lost his head when he saw the other car approaching. Boyd has disappeared.  
The board of directors of the traction company meet here today to discuss the wreck. The blame for the disaster has not yet been fixed by the company.

### PLENTY OF COAL IN ILLINOIS

(SPECIAL TO THE DAILY SOCIALIST.)  
Springfield, Ill., Sept. 22.—Illinois miners need not fear for the loss of a job because of the exhaustion of coal in the state if the figures compiled by Chief Statistician J. D. Roper of the state bureau of labor are correct.  
Statistician Roper calculates that before any mining was begun in the state there were 281,400,000 tons of coal below the surface. Of this amount 723,000,000 tons have been mined, leaving 99.96 per cent of the original supply still to be mined.  
"According to history," said Mr. Roper, "coal was first mined in the state in 1823, but Father Hennepin discovered the mineral a long time before in his trip down the Illinois river, when he stopped off at Ottawa in 1673."

### IMPORTERS ARE INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

(By United Press Association.)  
New York, Sept. 22.—The federal grand jury has voted a batch of indictments against leading importers who are alleged to have bribed weighers to return short weights on cargoes of imports. These indictments are the direct outgrowth of the amazing graft revelations developed during the trial of former chief clerk of the appraiser's office and the assistant weighers jointly indicted with him.  
It is understood that the witnesses who testified against Bedell and the other men on trial went from the courtroom to the grand jury room, where they told all they knew of the alleged graft. It is reported that these men swore that many of the big importers of merchandise from Mediterranean ports had a fixed scale of bribes which they paid weighers. This scale provided for the underweighing of all packages one-third and in return the importer is alleged to have paid the weigher one-half of the amount of duty of which the government was defrauded.  
The grand jury is expected to report its indictments to the court early next week.

### DENY MARRIAGE PLAN OF KAISER

(United Press Cable.)  
Vienna, Sept. 22.—A semi-official denial was issued today of the rumor that the Kaiser's present visit to Emperor Franz Josef had as one of its objects a marriage arrangement between Princess Victoria Louise, the Kaiser's only daughter, and Archduke Karl, son of the late Archduke Otto. It is explained that an official and formal denial is not made, for the reason that it is not wished to dignify the rumor.  
Religious differences between the Princess, who was confirmed in the Lutheran church last year, and the archduke, a Catholic, are considered sufficient to prevent an engagement, even though reasons of state might make such a marriage desirable. The princess is 18 years old and Archduke Karl 22.

### NEW PARTY IS NOT APPROVED

#### Suspender Makers Endorse Labor Action Through Socialist Organization

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 22.—The Suspender Makers' Union, 10,242, of this city, has passed resolutions declaring for political action of labor through the Socialist party.  
The resolutions are as follows:  
"Whereas, The citizens of this city and state will soon be called upon to elect state officers and congressmen; and  
"Whereas, A so-called United Labor party has been formed by certain leaders of the Central Labor union of Philadelphia, and a call issued to all unions requesting them to endorse the candidates nominated on the ticket of the said United Labor party and give them moral and financial support thereto; and  
"Whereas, At all times in the past, so-called labor and reform parties have, in this city and elsewhere, proven to be just as corrupt and inimical to the interests of the great masses of the working people as the republican and democratic parties; and  
"Whereas, The triumph at the polls of the so-called United Labor party will not redound to the benefit of the workers, but to the private, advantage and aggrandizement of unscrupulous politicians; and  
"Whereas, The only political party

that holds out promises of substantial amelioration of the condition of the people in general and that of the workers in particular and makes those promises good after election, is the Socialist party; and  
"Whereas, Our comrades in office in Milwaukee and on the continent of Europe have demonstrated the greatest ability, competence and readiness to serve the people; therefore be it  
Resolved, That we, members of Suspender Makers' Union, No. 10,242, local Philadelphia, at a special meeting held, by unanimous vote record our firm opposition to the so-called United Labor party, and be it further  
Resolved, That this union recommend to our fellow workers throughout this city and state to do all in their power in the way of moral and financial support to the genuine, tried and true political expression of the solidarity of labor, the Socialist party.

### SOCIALISTS NOT IN DEATH PLOT

(United Press Cable.)  
Tokio, Sept. 22.—Indications are that the report of a plot by Socialists to assassinate the mikado are exaggerated. There is no excitement here, in spite of the publication of the reports and they are officially discredited.  
Last spring a score of Socialists were arrested, the government charging that they were preparing bombs in Shinano province. The exact extent of the reported plot is not publicly known, and the authorities assert that the arrests

of last spring were made in order to eradicate Socialism in the empire before it got any serious growth.  
The government continues to take steps to stamp out the Socialistic feeling. The press is being rigidly censored and foreign books classed as "dangerous" may not be sold. Tolstoy's works are so classed by the Japanese government.  
PERUVIAN AVIATOR CROSSES HIGH MOUNTAIN IN ITALY  
(United Press Cable.)  
Brieg, Switzerland, Sept. 22.—George Chavez, the Peruvian aviator, flew in his monoplane over the Simpon Pass today, en route to Milan, Italy, seventy miles away. He passed the Simpon Kulu at 1:48, with the indications that, despite bad weather and adverse winds, he would complete the flight. The pass is 7,000 feet high.



Henry W. Pinkham's Letter of Acceptance of the Socialist Nomination for Governor of Colorado

To the Socialist Party of Colorado, Comrades: I accept your nomination for governor of this state, grateful for the opportunity you have given me as your standard-bearer in the pending campaign.

Our cause is just. We seek to realize the noble ideal of human brotherhood, which is the glory of the modern Social-Democratic movement. Our theory is scientific, based on the laws of social and political evolution.

We are evolutionists. We see that the present has grown from the past and is itself a preparation for a fairer future. As wise and not foolish, we strive to work with the in-dwelling life of society, not vainly to fight against it.

It is true that these two classes overlap and that passage from one to the other is impossible. It is true that between the extremes of society—the few thousands of the very rich and the millions of the poverty-stricken—there is a large middle class.

But that vast mechanism, in which the propertyless individualism must find a place for itself, is owned by a comparatively few and managed for the private gain of the owners. Hence the enormous wealth of the few large owners, the constant anxiety and increasing distress of the small owners, and the wretched poverty of the masses, who do not own but can only work—and that only when the owners give them permission and on the owners' terms.

Competition is inherently wasteful, irrational, unscientific. It has already largely disappeared from numerous fundamental industries, and it can never be restored by law until law has made the wheels of time run backward.

The fact is perfectly evident to every person of open mind and ordinary intelligence that private ownership by the few of land, railroads, beef-packing plants, pipe lines, coal mines and factories, has for its direct result the denial to the many of private property in homes, food, clothing and all the refinements of civilization and culture.

For the most part we have given up the utopian habit of imagining the exact forms which a scientific organization of industry will take when the element of private profit has been relegated to the rear and the common good has superseded private gain as the dominating motive.
