"This case of Baltrusaitis is a striking injustice, not only because he has gone to prison so long after the war under a law long since suspended, but particularly because his prosecution was wholly inexcusable. The undisputed facts are:

"Interfering With Recruiting "1. He was charged with interfering with the recruiting and enlistment of soldiers in November, 1920, when soldiers were no longer being recruited.

"2. The only charge was handing to a detective who visited him at his place of business some copies of a Communist leaslet entitled "Proletarian Revolution or Wage Slavery."

"3. The leaflet made no reference whatever to the war or military service. It voiced the usual Communist political ideas.

"4. He was sentenced to two years in prison on Oct. 24, 1921, on an indictment brought on May 3, 1921, after the Espionage Act had been suspended. Six Years After Armistice

"5. He went to prison on March 12th last, six years after the Armistice, three years after the suspension of the Espionage Act, and three months after the release of the last


