HOWAT WINS VICTORY AT PEORIA MEET

Miners Endorse Fight For Progressives

(Special to The Daily Worker) PEORIA, III., May 20.-Alex

Howat receiving the most rousing reception so far accorded anyone who has addressed the Illinois Mine Workers' convention, crushed the cheap insinuations by which Farrington at-tempted to stampede the convention away from Howat, and made a stirring defense of the Progressive Miners' Conference of the United Mine Workers of America. The convention ordered the speech printed in pamphlet form and distributed to the mine workers.

President Farrington admitted in his attempted excuse of his desertion of Howat, following the latters speech, that "there is no law in the constitution of the miners' union that would sustain Lewis in doing what he did to Howat and the Kansas miners.

"If the time ever comes," declared Howat, "when I have to crucify a member of the miners' union in order to keep in with the international officials and to keep on the payroll, then I hope some one will blow my head

A Coal Digger Again. "I am again a member of the United Mine Workers of America," Howat announced amid great applause. "I joined a union in Kansas, and have a job mining coal. But I am going to continue to fight for reinstatement with my full rights and privileges as an old member."

"Farrington made a good fight for the Kansas miners when we were in for not keeping on with the fight, I don't think he gave sufficient reason for quitting the fight. I'll admit I was disappointed to hear from Farrington that he couldn't go along with (Continued on page 3)



Davis to speak from a labor platform, the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America -at the convention just ended-made the following declaration against the finger-printing and strike-breaking conspiracies now being carried thru are to be investigated by an expert under the guise of "selective immigra-

> Whereas, America has been traditionally an asylum for the oppressed and persecuted in their countries:

Whereas, the immigrant workers in this country have helped make America what it is and have, thru their great labor organizations, raised the standards of living for the workers in this country;

Registration of Workers. Whereas, there is proposed legislation, providing for the registration, photographing and fingerprinting of non-citizens, which violates every cherished ideal upon

which this government was founded. Whereas, such proposed legislation, if enacted into law, will impose upon this country a system more disgraceful than the Prussia of the Hohenzollerns ever knew, and will compel non-citizen-workers to act as strike-breakers against citizen-workers, be it

Emphatic Protest.

Resolved, that the Sixth Biennial Convention of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, representing 150,000 workers, protests emphatically against all immigration restriction legislation and denounces the attempt to place the non-citizen workers in a status of criminals as a denial of the elementary principles of decency and justice, an insult to the intelligence of the American people, and a menace to the welfare of American labor, and be it further

Resolved, that we authorize the General Executive Board to cooperate in all efforts to liberalize the immigration laws and prevent the shameful alien registration legislation from being inflicted upon this country.

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
