MASSACHUSETTS TO SEND FIVE DELEGATES TO ST. PAUL MEET


(Special to The Daily Worker)

BOSTON, Mass., June 3.-Thomas F. Conroy, leader of the striking shopmen of Worcester and secretary of Machinists' local union 69, and four others were elected delegates to the St. Paul convention by the newly formed state Farmer-Labor Party. Fifty-eight delegates attended the state convention, representing 16 trade unions and various other workers' and farmers' organizations.

The convention adopted a militant program in response to the fighting spirit shown thruout the meeting by the delegates. The two old parties were severely condemned for their oppression of the workers and for their use of the government as a strike-breaking agency.

The use of the courts for injunc tions and government troops against striking railroad and mine workers was especially condemned. Public ownership and public control of natural resources were demanded.

The repeal of the criminal anarchy law, the abolition of the state constabulary, of citizens' military training camps and of military training in schools were all demanded in the state program.
