

Scab Bosses Using Anti-Labor Prosecutor

The sales of the DAILY WORKER around the gates of the Western Electric plant greatly increased yesterday, despite the investigation which assist-ant state's attorney Frank Moutaocik yesterday admitted is be-ing conducted by state's attorney Crowe's office.

The investigation was instituted at the suggestion of A. Borg, Cicero plain clothes man, an eager backer of Western Electric exploitation, who declared he was shocked at the use of the word "semi-prostiuse of the word "semi-prosti-tute" in an issue of the DAILY WORKER The attrict WORKER. The state's attorney's investigation is to decide whether or not the DAILY WORKER has been printing 'scandalous matter."

Frank Moutaocik, assistant state's attorney, told reporters that, "The thing the state is interested in is not the charges against Karl Reeve, but scandalous matter. We want to go over the facts and find out whether or not that charge is true."

"I have sent for every DAILY WORKER which contains an article on the Western Electric, and expect to get them and go over them today." continued the assistant state's attorney. "I am not now in a position to state what definite action will be tak-en toward the DAILY WORKER. CONSPIRACY AGAINST JUNE 17

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 16 .- Worker and farmer delegates, gathered here tonight, stand before an historic decision at the National Farmer-Labor Convention that opens in the St. Paul Municipal Auditorium on the morrow.

"Unity!" is the watchword that passes from lip to lip. 'Unity!" in the face of the most determined efforts to break the solidarity of the most oppressed sections of the city and land workers. And the one thing that can save the "Unity!" of the great gathering is its rank and file character, not at all unlike the make-up of the July 3rd Convention in Chicago, last year.

ATTACKED BY EXPLOITERS.

The June 17th convention that convenes here on the morrow has had, of course, the solid opposition of the yellow press of the landlords, bankers and food gamblers. But in addition it has been subjected to the worst slanders of the whole right wing section of the organized farmer and labor movement, not to mention the so-called "progressive" sections of the old parties of capitalism.







Filippelli, editor of the chief Fascist newspaper, Corriere Italiano, the police took Filippelli from a Florence train at Orte station after a race by auto with the train. Filippelli hired the machine in which the Socialist deputy and bitter opponent of Mussolini, Giocomo Matteoti, was kidnapped. Sig. Filippelli had left Rome, resigning his position, immediately after being questioned by Judge Grossi.

Sig. Matteoti's card as deputy was found on the roadside just outside of Rome. His body has not yet been found, altho the Socialist deputies Baldesi, Musatti, and Ciccotti were dragging Lake Vico all day.

Sig. Dumini, until recently employed in the press bureau of the ministry of the interior, has written Sig. Filippelli a letter charging him with connection in the assassination of Sig. Matteoti. This is not the first charge of violence against the Fascist editor.

This hardly proves the contention of our pious friends, that lack of faith in a dictatorial God, who metes out reward and punishment like an oldfashioned schoolmaster, is the cause of most crimes.

Religionists Aplenty.

In the Cook county jail the report or 1923 shows that the total number of atheists was 307, while the number of religious inmates, ranging from Confucionists and Catholics to Christian Scientists, was 8,362. In other words, the irreligious represented 36-10 per cent of the total; the reigious 96 4-10 per cent.

Undeniably the Catholics are more trongly influenced by their religion han those who profess other creeds. Yet of these prisoners, 4,253, nearly 50 per cent, were Catholics, with the certainty of a future on a diabolical toasting fork to dissuade them from rime.

The so-called "Protestants" could boast of 1,303, 15 per cent of the toal and five times as many as the atheists.



Picketing Not Violation.

In the case brought by a St. Louis firm, the Herkert & Meisel Truck Co., picketed during a strike by the local union of the Leather Workers in that city, Chief Justice Taft announces a decision that the picketing was not in violation of the federal law against nomination of Coolidge and restraint of interstate commerce. Perhaps the same district judge would have decided that the strikers owed damages to all the merchants with whom the profits of the struck shop would ordinarily have been spent; however, no such extension of strikeliability has yet been asserted. Now Taft warns the district judge that he has gone too far.

Lawful to Stop Production. Quoting his decision in the Coronado Coal case of two years ago, the chief justice recalled that he then held that even a conspiracy by the coal miners to prevent shipment of 75 per cent of the output of the mine, which output would have been shipped in interstate commerce, was not a violation of the Sherman law. The strike was aimed at preventing production, and that aim was lawful.




