ROME, Italy, June 17.—The bloody Fascist rule of terror led by Dictator Benito Mussolini is tottering and revolution threat-ens Italy. King Victor Emman-uel has called in his "cousins," the nine members of the Order of Annunciation, all of them his relatives or former prime ministers of Italy, to urge them to form a new government to save the country from the two-years deferred revolution by supplanting the blackshirt iron hand which has lashed and lacerated the kingdom since 1922.

Mussolini, the gore-smirched Fascist dictator of Italy, will not be excluded from the new cabinet, judging from the meagre news which trickles by the censor, but his political enemies in the Order of Annunciation will undoubtedly curtail the premier's control of the govern-

MEXICO WANTS AGENT OUSTED

"Archivist" Cummins Backed by Oil Kings

(Special to the Daily Worker) MEXICO CITY, June 17 .- The Mexican government is firm in its intention to force the withdrawal from the country of Herbert A. Cunard Cummins, archivist in the British legation here, who has made himself persona non grata by his exaggerated and absolutely false statements and written reports on Mexican conditions sent to the British government. Cum mins is blamed by Mexico for the failure of Britain to recognize the republic since the world war, altho his ying stories have not been so powerful an influence against British recog-

nition as the oil profiteers' interests Two years ago Cummins was first asked to leave Mexico. He was not and is not a diplomatic representative of the British government and had no right to make the utterly false statements which he did, then and lately concerning the case of the hacienda of Mrs. Rosalie Evans. Cummins wrote that the property of this former Texas woman, now a British citizen by marriage, had been seized and that the owner had been intimidated by government troops, which had burned and robbed the property.

Mexican Politeness Exhausted Mexico advised the British consul on January 15 that all correspondence by the government with Cummins would be suspended. The consul was politely asked to transmit to London two scurrilous notes which Cummins had sent the Mexican government.

May 3, Mexico again notified Eng land that Cummins was not wanted, but the British authorities replied that the larger cities and industrial they saw no reason to recall their agent. Mexico answered that for the sake of the dignity of the country Britain should at least retract the lying statements Cummins had made; but English authorities again stood by the "archivist."

Mexico then told Cummins to leave within eight days or he would be deported. The British agent then locked himself in the British legation and has refused to come out since, well knowing that the Mexican authorities were waiting for him but would not violate extra-territorial rights of Britain by invading the legation.

LEONID KRASSIN FLAYS GERMAN FOREIGN OFFICE

Charges Complicity with Berlin Police

(By The Federated Press)
BERLIN, June 17.—The bitter attack of Leonid Krassin, soviet minister of trade and commerce, upon the German foreign office for its attitude in the Bozenhardt affair has caused much comment in the German press. The speech was delivered in connec tion with the congress of the Russian communist party in Moscow, and Krassin charged the foreign office

with complicity with the Berlin police. There can be little doubt but that the situation between the two nations has become more strained since the speech. The liberal organs of Germany insist that the government forthwith publish the notes that have been exchanged between the two governments in recent weeks, so that every citizen may judge for himself just what is what.

The government apparently hesitates because it seems to have admitted its wrong in several points. The nationalists, it is believed, will raise a howl when they see black on white that the German foreign office has actually apologized to the hated bolsheviks.



Associated Bosses Have Scientific System

By LELAND OLDS,

(Federated Press Industrial Editor.) Industrial serfdom has been developed mathematically in the cotton mill regions of France. Wage earners receive a bare subsistence for a single individual which is adjusted to changes in the cost of living.

Children are scientifically allowed for by frugally figured supplementary allowances. By this system wage costs are kept down to enable the French cotton industry to undersell the producers of cotton cloth in Great Britain, the United States and other industrial countries.

Mighty Low Wages.

Hourly wages in the Roubaix-Tourcoing region, according to a department of commerce report, amount to 3.975 francs for spinners, 1.976 for cardroom operatives, 1.946 for speed tenders, 2.59 for weavers and 2.05 francs for ordinary labor. With the franc worth less than 6 cents, this means hourly wages ranging from a maximum of 18 cents to a minimum of about 111/2 cents. And this one of the better districts in France.
