Its further sessions will be at Liberty Hall, 120 West 138th St. It is announced that Negroes from all parts of the world will participate in forming a Negro political union on an international scale, which might play an important role in opposing imperialist rule over colonial peo-

Plan Negro Political Union The purposes of the proposed union, as announced, are:

"This union will consolidate the political forces of the Negro thru which the race will express it political opinion in America, in the islands of the seas and in all communities where the Negro forms a

The Political Union shall represent the political hopes and aspirations of the fifteen million Negroes of the United States of America on American questions, domestic to America, and shall represent the interests of the millions of Negroes of the West Indies in their different and respective islands affecting domestic political questions, and so also in the scattered communities of Africa. The union shall have a sympathetic relationship politically, with Negroes all over the world, but each country or community will have its domestic program for the betterment of the race, in that country or community.

World Solidarity Is Aim

But the strength of the union shall be given to any community or country to politically assist it in putting over its political program. As, for instance, if the Negroes of America were politically agitating or working for the passage of any special measure for the benefit of the race, the entire strength of the union would be placed at the disposal of the American section. If the Negroes of Trinidad desired to carry out any political measure for the benefit of that community, the union would use its strength in assisting them, and so with any community where the Negroes live throughout the world.

"No longer, therefore, will individual politicians represent the interests of the Negroes, but the Negroes (Continued on next page.)

(Staff Correspondent of The Daily Worker) MORRIS, III., July 31.—The name Leopold has always had a sinister meaning here, long before the perverted scion of the Leopold family ran amuck. The Morris Paper Mills company of which Nathan Leopold, senior, father of the slayer of the Franks boy is president and controlling stockholder, shapes the lives of many of the youth of the town and has just broken a strike of its workers.

Five hundred citizens of Morris, mostly sons and daughters of retired farmers now residing in the countyseat of Morris county, are employed in the Leopold paper box mills. Few of these workers do not know that the money ground out of them by the sweat shop piece-work system employed in the plant is

SLAYERS WIN COURT'S EAR COffee Up 10 Cents; BADLY BEATEN BREAKING MEE MORRIS MAYOR Judge Ignores State's Revolution in Brazil But Anti-Fascisti Get Arrested for Speech

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

TODAY, the price of coffee has increased ten cents per pound. The house-wife, when she goes to the grocery store, if she is given any reason for this boost in price, will be told that it is because there is a revolution going on in Sao Paulo, a province of Brazil.

Three-fourths of the world's supply of coffee comes from Brazil, there is trouble down there, and there you are, says the trust. The house-wife will probably wend her way homeward, blaming some "Bolshevik" of her imagination, and picturing in her mind the borders of Brazil touching those of Soviet Russia.

In Chicago the city council committee on the high cost of living gets busy and calls for the usual silly "BOYCOTT" to keep prices down. The committee's secretary announces that Chicago uses 83,333 pounds of coffee per day, which means an added \$265,000 dropped into the pockets of the coffee trust, from this city alone.

We turn to the pages of the July 30th issue of the New York Commercial. This is a house organ of the big corporations that profit in food. The house-wife doesn't read it. She gets no further than the comics, perhaps to the woman's page, and the account of the Loeb-Leopold murder trial.

Here are a few headlines in the New York Commercial on the "coffee situation": "Rebellion Has Not Influenced Coffee Prices;" "Coffee Declines on Brazilian News;" "Market Closed 27 to 37 Points Lower."

But the coffee trust is deaf, dumb and blind to all this news. The coffee trust, like any other trust, is only awake to opportunities to increase the price of the commodity it deals in. The revolution in the Brazilian province of Sao Paulo had hardly gotten under way before the subsidized press began carrying propaganda predicting boosts in the price of coffee. The hand of the hungry profiteer could easily be discerned in this. This propaganda was soon followed by the 10 cent price boost.

There is nothing new about these repeated highway robberies of the big business bandits. It is all a part of the profiteering game.

The only exception that we know of is that no announcement has yet been made of a change in the price of toothpicks because of the forest fires in the West. But perhaps this has slipped us past.

There was a time when no coffee came from Brazil. But the profiteers had other excuses for increasing prices then. Arabia formerly supplied the world, later the West Indies, and then Java, way off in the Orient. But now these fields of coffee production have been supplanted by Brazil, in South America, many thousands of miles from Soviet Russia, and no coffee trust agents have as yet charged that the Sao Paulo revolution, that is dropping millions of dollars into their laps, is being engineered from Moscow.

In fact, the Sao Paulo revolution is an uprising against the centralized authority in Rio Janeiro. And Sao Paulo is only one of the four big coffee producing provinces of Brazil, no trouble being reported from the other three.

There is no reason, therefore, for the boost in price of coffee, except the rapacity of the coffee profiteers. The coffee trust, like all the other trusts, international in its scope. A sandstorm on the Arabian deserts would just as quickly become the basis for an increase in the cost of "Mocha," while a slight disturbance in the waters of the Indian Ocean might be used as an excuse for increasing the cost of "Java."

As a matter of fact, "The Chicago Journal of Commerce," July 31, in a New York dispatch, declares that, "The stock of 824,000 bags of coffee at Santos (Sao Paulo) is said to be largely low grade coffee and not suitable for the U. S. Trade."

Some day the workers and farmers will become as international as the big trusts. They will discover the "con" game that is being put over on them.

The workers in the coffee fields, of Brazil, will feel an identity of interest with the workers and farmers of the United States, who consume about one-half of all the coffee exported by the producing countries of the world.

The coup d'etat of the coffee trust in boosting the price of this household necessity ten cents per pound should be a little study in internationalism for the workers and farmers. Thus it will do some good. When the workers of the world decide to completely unite they will be in a position to get rid of the profiteers of the world.

Bordiga Tells of Italian Workers' Struggle

(Special to the DAILY WORKER) MOSCOW, July 9 (By Mail).-The twenty-third session of the Fifth Congress of the Comintern listened to reports on Fascism. One was delivered by Bordiga of Italy and the other by Freimuth of Germany. They showed that international Fascism, while presenting national differences, is still one of the most valuable struggle to beat back the rising revoby which Fascism can be met and overcome.

Bordiga said:

I presented to the Fourth Congress a report on the question of Fascism dealing with a very decisive period of the history of Fascism in Italy; that is to say, with the conquest of power by Mussolini. I must deal now with another phase of Fascist development which is connected, as you know, with the Matteotti affair.

Mentions Matteotti.

At this juncture it is of particular and political phenomenon.

Fascism From Farms.

Fascism began in the agricultural district. This is a characteristic fact. The attack on the positions of the red proletariat began in Italy in the agricultural districts. But if it is true that Fascism began its actions in the nonindustrial districts, we must not imagine that it is purely a movement in the Interests of the agrarian bourgeoisie and of the big land owners. On the contrary, it is a movement of the big industrial, financial and veterans, of bourgeois intellectuals

with a new program. It merely brings compromise instead of it. political and military.

Anti-Proletarian.

What are the relations between Fascism and the proletariat?

Its name alone shows that it is an anti-socialist and therefore an antiproletarian movement. From begin ning to end it appears as the destroyer of even the smallest conquests of the working class.
