

The new head of the Building Trades department, George F. Hedrick, has expressed himself as apprehensive of an effort to cut wages. He quoted a speech made at the convention of the American Association of Bankers in Chicago where the speaker said:

"We are unable to do business with European countries. First, they have no gold. Second, we cannont accept their goods because that would inter fere with the manufacturers of the United States. Third, their securities are worthless. In order to make their securities worth an American dollar it will be necessary to reduce the

wages of men and women of the United States.'

TODAY, "Education Week" is supposed to be on in full

blast. The pursuit of "the reds," under the cry that Communists are a menace to "life, liberty, justice, security and opportunity," and with all the blood hounds of the American Legion hot on the trial, was scheduled to take on enormous proportions.

But there is little evidence of life and activity anywhere in the capitalist camp. . .

There is no beating of tom toms, to arouse the multitudes to a lynch law frenzy, thru the columns of the kept press. At least not yet. There may be before the week is over.

The Communists have taken seriously the challenge issued by the Morgan-Coolidge administration at Washing-ton for "Anti-Red Week." Everywhere thruout the land larger masses than ever before are being reached with the message of Communism. They are being shown the difference between capitalist and Communist education.

Perhaps the capitalist enemy, still drunk with its victory on Nov. 4, in the political arena, feels it unnecessary to put forth any exertion on "Education Week." Perhaps it feels that it is best "to let well enough alone."

There is the big probability that the "Red Baiting Program" issued by the American Legion head of the Bureau of Education in the Department of Commerce, carries the sting that is piercing the hide of those who framed it.

It is dangerous to give birth to a questioning attitude in the minds of children. It is not to be expected that they will swallow, all of them, without thinking, the fraudulent program presented to them.

When the charge is made that, "The Red Flag means death, destruction, poverty, starvation, disease, anarchy and dictatorship," some youngsters among the millions of working class school children may rise and inquire:


Why is it that there is so much dying, needless death, then under the stars and stripes? The children of the coal miners, especially, could inquire, or the children of any worker toiling in the mills and the factories; always facing needless death in the unnecessary hazards of capitalist industry.

What about the poverty under the stars and stripes? Millions of children know that their fathers and mothers must count the pennies lest a single one of them be spent on any but absolute necessities.

What about hunger and starvation under the American flag? A million children go hungry to school every morning. Penny lunches must be served, most often to those without a penny, in the schools to the undernourished children.

What about disease under the American flag? The children will raise that question. They know how disease comes stalking into their homes; disease that could easily be fought, if the doctor could be paid; if father and mother didn't have to work so hard; if the children got better food; "if we could only live in a better home!"

The children won't understand very well what is meant when the American Legion program for "Education Week" says that "The Red Flag stands for destruction, anarchy and dictatorship." But they will begin to question if these are not the things that exist under capitalism; de of all that is worth while in life for the great masses of workers and farmers; chaos in all the relations between the units in the great human family; all under the brutalizing dictatorship of greed.



Buck Is Passed to the Workers and Farmers

Editor's Note:-Here's the latest from the Gompers-LaFollette camp in Washington. We shall have some editorial comment to make in a future issue.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 .--Panic did not merely wipe out half of the popular vote which would have been cast for the LaFollette ticket if the election had taken place in September: it has destroyed the chance of formation of a new party next January when the conference for progressive political action is to meet to discuss the matter. Fear of disturbing and angering the men who own the in-

dustries was sufficient, in November, to elect Coolidge. "Clean" Party Born Dead.

Fear, transmitted by means of the direct threats of closing down factories and mills, and by indirect threats contained in forecasts of 'chaos" and general collapse, drove millions of farmers and wage workers and their wives to abandon their eager resolves to throw in their lot with the progressive movement.

This same fear, reinforced by the fact that the republican and democratic machines remain in the field with ample money at their disposal. is now crushing out the last hope of progressive republicans and democrats that their leaders will create a new 'clean" party.

The Federated Press has questioned spokesmen of every element in the progressive movement in the national capital since the election, except Senator LaFollette, who has been in Wisconsin

It finds that the railroad labor chiefs believe that they must continue to appeal to republican and democratic voters and to the persons whom these voters elect to federal offices, and that instead of creating an independent party they should build up the conference for progressive political action for the purpose of nominating their friends on the tickets of the two old parties. The central idea of the non-partisan league appeals to them as being more practical than the idea of trying at this time to supplant the democratic party. They say bluntly that they are going to "play safe."

Today is called "Patriotism Day" of "Education Week." The New York World, in discussing "Education Week" says the natural reaction is, "Patriotism? Sure! Fine Thing! I'm for it?" But on second thought the question arises, "What kind of patriotism?" And there is where the trouble starts.

The children will begin to question why they owe pa-triotic allegiance to the flag of Morgan, Rockefeller and the government, that permits millions of children to be fed into the factories; there to be destroyed in their youth; unable to enjoy manhood and womanhood if they ever reach it.

They will begin to wonder if they do not owe patriotic allegiance to the struggle that has already brought such happiness, such a bright prospect for the future, to all the children of Soviet Russia, under the Red Flag, that the enemies of the children in the United States condemn so hysterically.

Let American capitalism loose the avalanche of questions from the inquiring mind of the children in school and it will thus help destroy itself and all that it stands for.

They ventured in the recent campaign to denounce the two old parties as being in the hands of the enemies of the people, but they did not declare that the time for launching a new party was at hand. The El Paso convention is scheduled to declare for the old policy of nonpartisan action. Between the C. P. P. A. and the A. F. of L. strategy is this difference-that the C. P. P. A. proposes to establish organizations in the congressional districts to pick out far in advance, the best men to be nominated and elected on one or the other of the old party tickets.

The A. F. of L. has seldom taken an effective part in primary campaigns, but has waited until too late to secure the best representation of labor in congress.

Senator Borah, who with Senator Couzens and Senator Hiram Johnson. will hold a balance of power in the new senate, has declared against any attempt to put Senator LaFollette out of the republican fold. The democrats have intimated to Senator Wheeler that they are ready to welcome him back and to make their program progressive enough to attract his support. Unless LaFollette shall decide to raise the standard of revolt, alone of his party group, the progressive republican and democratic elements are likely soon to sink back into the party ranks from whence they came.

This will leave the socialists and the thin framework of the farmerlabor party as the reliable elements upon which a new party may be based. The farmer-labor group is so nearly akin to the socialists in its political philosophy that its absorption by the socialist party is by no means im possible.

Tries to Straighten Socialists.

The socialists who appear generally disappointed and impatient with th results of the 1924 alliance, will go to the C. P. P. A. convention in January with but one program—the extension of socialist teaching. If the C. P. P. A. rejects the essentials of socialism, then the socialists will stand on their own feet and resume the work of straight propaganda for the socialization of the industries.

Railroad labor, the keystone in the arch on which the new party was to rest, has not fitted in with the socialists. It prefers to disturb the interior structure of orthodox politics while events shall shape it anew.

Every week is "Education Week" in Russia. But the Communist Party of Russia has overthrown the control of the educational system by the capitalists and has put the schools into the hands of the educators and pupils, where they belong.

In Russia, the counter-revolutionary trash used as textbooks prior to the Bolshevik revolution has been burned, and education has been made a stronghold

for teaching the right of the Educational Week working class to rule.

The Soviet commissar of education has rebuilt the entire outlook of the proletarian students on the basis of the new society. All scientific works used during czarist times, which were similar to books now used in the American schools, were filled with propaganda against the working class. Histories, sociological works, books on economics and anthropology were found to be counter revolutionary propaganda against the working class and were destroyed.


Self-Government in Schools.

One of the main functions of the school is to teach the child collective action, we learn in Anna Louise Strong's history of Bolshevik Russia. "The schools are trying to fit the child to build a socialist state," she says. "The schools are the next battle front for Communism. The school is a self governed school community, in which children, teachers, janitors all have equal voice. It decides everything. What shall be done with the school funds, what shall be planted in the school garden, what shall be taught. If the children decide against some necessary subject, it is the teachers' job to show them, thru their play and life together, that the subject is needed."

Self government, self help, self management in common activity are part of the basic policy of the Soviet schools. The fair friendly division of labor is considered the corner stone of education as citizens of a future socialist commonwealth.

days of the congress passed in a futile discussion of bookkeping and control. The congress showed itself to be completely divorced from the life of the working class of this country and failed to touch the vital problems of the movement. Had it not been for a resolution on Russian recognition introduced by the militants which came up on the last day, it would have been difficult to distinguish the congress from any general gathering of liberals and professionals.

Proletarian Note.


The resolution introduced by the militants, calling upon the American government to establish recognition and enter into relations with the Scviet Republic, was the first proletarian note struck at the congress. The resolution committee bringing in its report stated that the committee was divided and left the matter open for lecision to the body. The representatives of co-operatives, coming from proletarian sections such as the Finnish co-operatives of New York, Minnesota, Wisconsin, whose representatives are militants in the labor movement and supported also by the delegates representing other co-operatives having a distinct proletarian membership, came out energetically for the adoption of the resolution. Among the delegates representing co-operatives with a petty bourgeois membership there was consternation when this resolution was reported. These delegates





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This—Or Face Annihilation

It is typical that one of the most important parts of the American Federation of Labor, the Building Trades department, is torn with dissension over jurisdictional disputes. The 350,000 carpenters and joiners, quarreling with the sheet metal workers, withdrew from the department some time ago in order to continue the job war against the sheet metal workers.

The Stone Cutters' Union accuses the Granite Cutters' Union of cutting artificial stone which is "not hard enough" to use granite cutter's tools upon, and therefore belongs, by grace of the "jurisdictional board of awards," to the stone cutters' jurisdiction. The scrap over this made such bad blood that 32 granite cutters were compelled by Evans. their union president to scab on a job at New Haven, struck by the stone cutters.

In California the open shop drive against the building trades threatens to wreck them all, but the head of the Bricklayers' Union questions the munition to fight" the national department.

These are merely mild and typical examples of need and the growing demand for amalgamation of the craft unions into industrial unions. In every strike the glaring impossibility of victory by the scattered segments of labor, which battle huge corporations alone while other crafts calmly not only do their own work, but the struck work of the craft on strike, becomes more evident.

Against such a demoralized condition the Trade Union Educational League has raised the banner of militant struggle by its campaign for amalgamation. "One union for each industry," has been its cry. Great blocks of organized labor have rallied to the call for amalgamation. Only the bureaucracy stands obdurate. It would mean the loss of many fat jobs for officials. Therefore, even tho it is a matter of life and death to the rank and file, the officials will not move.


