Forward orders on the books of the corporation on November 30, amounted to 4,031,969 tons, against 3,525,270 on October 31 and 3,473,-780 on September 30, 1924. On November 30 of last year unfilled tonnage amounted to 4,368,584.

Workers By the Millions Must Reply to Attack on Foreign-Born Comrades

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

TODAY, on the crest of the Coolidge triumph, reaction is plotting renewed war against America's foreign-born

It is easily understandable that one of the first moves in congress, providing for an elaborate police system to keep continual watch over the 7,000,000 workers in this country not yet naturalized, should come from a democrat, Representative Aswell, of Louisiana.

The two parties of Wall Street, the republican party of Coolidge and Hughes, and the democratic party of Underwood and Davis, have a common basis for action against the masses of restless foreign-born workers in the United States, exploited to the last drop of their blood in the great basic

Representative Aswell is a product of the state guilty of the worst oppression against workers in the oil fields and lumber camps. His loyalty to the master class was lavishly rewarded. He was raised from a country school teacher to president of the Louisiana State Normal College and then sent on to the congress.

He joins his views of political science, of which he is alleged teacher, with those of Secretary of Labor Davis, the Pittsburgh banker, and comes to the conclusion that an elaborate espionage system must be created to watch over all foreign-born workers.

The aim of Aswell's whole program is clearly stated in his own words, "to help the worthy and facilitate deporting

It is well known who the "worthy" aliens are. They are the ones who patiently bear the burdens of toil, refusing to unite for their own protection, trembling to struggle against their American masters. The metropolis of Louisiana, the city of New Orleans, was one of the great chattel slave markets before the Civil War. On the great cotton and sugar plantations of Louisiana, chattel slavery showed its most diabolical face. It is from this state that a democratic congressman now comes forward pledging aid to the republicans in their well thought out schemes to hang new chains upon the limbs of all foreign-born workers.

"Deport the undesirables!" says Aswell, repeating in altered words the edict of the republican strikebreaker, General Leonard Wood, of "Ship or Shoot!" The undesirables are the workers who protest the brutal exploitation forced upon them, who organize into trade unions, who go out on strike to win their demands; but, most of all, those who accept the leadership of the Workers (Communist) Party and join its ranks.

It is for these especially that the detailed registration system is provided with its certificates of identification that must be ready for presentation to the police on all occasions. The police must be notified of removal from one city to another. All hotel and boarding house keepers must report alien patrons. Heavy penalties are provided for all violations. The foreign-born worker is not only the victim of this adaptation of czarism to the United States, but he must also pay for being victimized. He must pay \$10 for registration on the great American black list, with a fee of \$5 demanded for each subsequent registration.

One of the camouflage arguments advanced in favor of this labor-enslaving plan is that the "undesirable" foreignborn workers are enabled to send "savings" back to the old country. Last year, it is claimed, they send \$400,000,000 to d. All this under the "protection of the American flag." It is urged that this money be held in this country; that is unpatriotic to send it abroad.

It just happens, however, that on the day that Aswell's plan is loosed on the nation, that J. Pierpont Morgan remits \$110,000,000 in gold to the German capitalist republic, every cent of which was taken out of the agony of American labor. Another \$100,000,000 is to go to France to bolster up its tottering capitalist regime. Belgium wants \$75,000,000. These are only the transactions of a few days. American capitalists have put four billion dollars of their surplus capital, taken from labor, into South America. All of which receives no notice from the Louisiana schoolmaster doing the bidding of his capitalist masters in Washington.

Congress is adjourning shortly for the Christmas holidays. But the senators and representatives will soon be back in Washington again. The time before March 4, when the present congress dies, is very short. But it is long enough for the enemies of labor in Washington to put thru the worst legislation attacking the foreign-born workers.

The Workers (Communist) Party calls for a United Front of all workers, native and foreign-born, against this move of the capitalist class. Workers by the millions must rally to the Communist call for a fight against this scheme of American oppression. This is one of the most important struggles of all American labor in this present hour.

MUSIC. By ALFRED V. FRANKENSTEIN

SYLVIA LENT, who is one of the youngest violinists who ever played solo with the Chicago Symphony orchestra, was soloist with that organization on its eighth program of this season. She played the first concerto of Max Bruch. Now the Bruch concerti, to say the least, are a bit overworked hereabouts, and it takes an excellent violinist to put them over so they do not sound bromidic. This Sylvia Lent did. Her tone is remarkably large, fine in quality, and her technic, and style are sure and firm. Hers was a new and charming interpretation of the slow movement, with its idyllic, singing melody.

"A Night on the Bare Mountain," a symphonic poem by Modest Musorgski, opened the concert. Musorgski tells the story in this work of a dance of the demon Chernobog and his followers on the Bald mountain, near Kiev. A church bell rings, and the devils are dispersed. I prefer to think of the work apart from this commonplace program. It is probably the grandest storm in music. For Musorgski, like Wagner, knew that to picture a storm in tone one does not need to pile up all the noise a modern orchestra affords, but one must rather write themes that in themselves have a restless, stormy character.

The ninth or unfinished symphony of Anton Bruckner, Mr. Stock's favorite composer, followed the Musorgski. Even without the finale, the symphony is quite long, and tensely dramatic and affecting. Bruckner is unfortunately n unneard composer in Chicago, and Stock ought to give us more of him.

As a memorial for Gabriel Faure. who died a few weeks ago, a suite by him taken from his incidental music to Maeterlinck's "Pelleas and Melisande" was performed. It is nice, unimportant salon music. It makes one neither enthusiastic in its praise or condemnation. Debussy said all there was to be said in the way of a setting for "Pelleas and Melisande," and beside his creation, the work of the earlier composer is insignificant.

Another feature of the Dawes plan which is not working so well, is the 26 per cent "reparations export tax" on German products. This matter will be further discussed by the allied finance ministers at their meeting in Paris in January, according to Gilbert. Under this plan, Germany is controlled by the American bankers

WORKERS IN ATTACK ON GOMPERS AS THE INSTRUMENT OF YANKEE IMPERIALISM IN LABOR MOVEMENT

The DAILY WORKER prints below a translation of the stirring document which was issued in Mexico City and addressed to the delegates of the Pan-American Federation of Labor:

TO THE DELEGATES:

Gompers is the instrument of Yankee imperialism in the labor move-

He sabotaged the protest of the Third Congress against the occupation of Santo Domingo.

He sanctioned the occupation of Haiti (See the American Federationist for March, 1924.)

He proposed to the United States government that it pay less wages by 25 or 35 per cent, to the Latin-Americans in the Panama Canal zone, than to the workers from the United States.

In spite of the repeated resolutions of the Pan-American Federation, Gompers has done nothing for the Mexican immigrants, inhumanly exploited in the United States.

He opposes any fight whatsoever against Yankee Imperialism, a fight that must be the object of continental solidarity and of the Pan-American-

He opposes socialism, and he says so frankly. He opposes the yearly protest on the First of May, because it is 'revolutionary.'

He breaks strikes declared in solidarity, and in general he breaks them because they endanger capitalism. He sabotages strikes in the great industries (steel, railways, etc.)

He opposes the entrance of the workers of North America into politics a class, not because he is an anarchist, but because he wants them

to remain within the capitalist parties. In the congress, the Mexican delegates, now under his control, as proved by the convention at the city of Juarez, say that Gompers is the friend of the working class of Mexico, by having "helped Calles and Obregon against De La Huerta." Do not be deceived. Always Gompers follows in Mexico the policy of the United States government. He did not help De La Heurta because the National City Bank, Morgan, Rocke-

feller and Hughes (his masters) helped Obregon. Yankee imperialist helped Obregon because British capital helped De La Huerta; because Obregon had conceded the nullification of Article 27 of the constitution by "recognizing" that it was not retroactive, having signed the Lamont-De La Huerta treaty and made other concessions. In Mexico, as in all Latin-America, Gompera does as Morgan dictates. Gompers must not be re-elected president of the Pan-American Fed-

The Pan-American Federation must convert itself into an instrument of struggle against Yankee imperialism.

The workers of Latin-America and those of the United States demand it.
