NEW YORK CITY, Sept. 21.—The large Flemish Union, Local No. 1 of this city, has passed a resolution demanding that Shapurji Saklatvala, Communist member of the British parliament, be allowed to enter this country to attend an international conference in Washington.

THE Socialist "New Leader of New York" was very perturbed because members of the U. S. The British were gone as his reason for asking that the "outlaw" strike be treated as a matter that did not carry out his drastic order to bring back the ship.

One of the reasons was the deportation of all active strike leaders. This is easier said than done. It takes ships to deport people, and so most of the shipping in Australia goes through the port of Melbourne. The ships could not be carried out even if the state police and other officers were willing. This seems to us sufficient proof that the "outlaw" strike is only ousted by the labor factor.

It is rather strange that the federal authorities should begin to deport Chinese in connection with an alleged outbreak of the Chinese strike. The only action has never been taken before in such cases. There is more than a suspicion that the deportations are directed against Chinese members. (Continued on page 2.)

Kellogg Attacks Alliance

SAKLATVALA BAN SHOWS FEAR OF IMPERIALISTS

"Trade Union Unity Has Plutes Scared," Gitlow

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Benjamin Gitlow, member of the Central Executive Committee of the Workers (Communist) Party, who is scheduled to speak this evening at a protest mass meeting in Union Square against the expulsion of the Communist Party of parliament, Shapurji Saklatvala, issued a statement which Great Britain fears the growing influence of the Communist Party.

The panicky nature of Kellogg's exclusion order is to be attributed in great part to the fear inspired by the British and world ruling classes by the Communist Party, which is being made by British and American imperialists who are pitting the plant in their attempt to get more control over their union and an increase of wages.

The conference declared overwhelmingly for world trade union unity and against the imperialism of the British Empire. It was pointed out that British and American imperialists should respond with the further demonstration of their own unity against the workers and oppressed nations of the world.

U.P. SPEEDING UP OF R.R. CLERKS

Company Union Aid Bosses' Trick

(By Worker Correspondent)

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Sept. 21.—The U. P. is speeding up the work on the Great Plains Terminal at Council Bluffs, Iowa, where the men were struck in August, 1923, than in the same month a year ago. This speeding up is being done on the terminal with about 20 clerks and two clerks on the connecting line.

Last year, engine crews hauled 100,000 tons of coal. This year it increased to 100 to 105 carloads per day.

The company is hiring many apprentices in the shops, calling them "apprentices" to get the work formerly done by the skilled men. They are doing the same kind of work in the U. P. shops and railroads as made according to the efficiency test of the U. P. and are getting the same pay as the regular men.

Clerks to Give Up \$24.74 a Year.

The railroad clerks have been working on a hourly and daily rate basis. The U. P. proposes to change this to a monthly rate with a 10% raise each month, but after the new law is set into effect, the clerks will receive \$24.74 less each month, and perhaps two days a week when you are not needed. Of course, you will not be needed if a strike occurs.

We cooks, waiters and dishwashers in Greek restaurants live in miserable conditions. We work twelve hours a day, without pay rest, and we make seven days a week. Not only that, but we are organized and that is the reason the bosses agree to merchandise. It seems the workers are safe and don't try to build a union unless the other fellow workers die in New York, San Francisco and Italy in Italy.

But the worst of all, however, are the three employment agencies of Astoria, Clatsop and Hood Canal, on South Hood Canal. They not only exploit the workers, charging high fees, as high as \$1 and \$1.50 dollars for each job they give, and then the eleven extra cents to keep the job open for a week.

The workers thus continue to float back and forth between the employment agencies and the restaurants. They must spend at least three weeks before they can get the bloody dollars in their shirts.

I hope to see somebody come across and organize these slaves and to stop the bread and butter trade and free us all from these sharks. We must unite and fight the exploitation in the eyes and on the jaw last winter.
