## Suspects Plot B e h i n d Debt Negotiations

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—The busiest spot in Washington today was the White House where French and American financial experts are engaged in the problem of negotiating the settlement of the \$4,000,000,000 loan to the British.

Spies trod on each other's heels in the public waiting rooms for a series of secret meetings between ambassadors French and American agents who talked cold turkey while Callaux and Mellon were getting rid of the four-point policy.

The British ambassador is reported to have expressed anger when he was shown an excerpt from the report of André Helmer to the Central Executive Committee of the Workers Party of America by Joseph Callaux. Mellon said: "We would like to receive the help which France extended to us and when we were fighting for our independence we were eager to see you return in France's own great strength."

British agents see in this cryptic remark the withdrawal of French assistance in a willful desire to force us to let France under our noses. The reason for this willingness can be summed up in the sentence: "The success of the American economic and political."

Callaux has expressed the fear that Britain's most dangerous competitor in the Western Hemisphere is the United States. He is checking them each other every day. The French are trying to get us to agree to a settlement of the four-point policy. No being able to find work at my level, I took a job as an apprentice in one of the military shoe departments.

**ZANKOV SENDS AGENTS TO AMERICA TO WAR ON BULGARIAN MILITANTS**

The terror Zankov government, Bulgaria has sent agents to America in the guise of laborers, consul, students and secretaries to destroy the influence of the Bulgarian and Macedonian Communists who escaped the clutches of the Bulgarian secret police.

During the reprisals following the bombing of the Great Kirk Hall, about 300 workers were killed, many were wounded. Zankov's agents were sent to every country where they suspected that some of the workers may have escaped.

In America, there is a large colony of Macedonian and Bulgarian workers, that has repeatedly shown its contempt and hatred for the Zankov government. During the past two years over 300,000 people have been the victims of the white terror of Bulgaria. That is why the special attention has been given to the "lost brothers" here.

Their first activity was to spread the Bulgarian workers at every place they showed that he made in America. He received but little pay and comfort.
