SECURITY PACT STRUCK

Germany and France Discussing Boundaries

(Special to The Daily Worker)
 Bern, Switzerland, Oct. 8.—The deadlock between Germany and France continues over the question of a frontier for the eastern frontiers.

Arvids, Berlin, French foreign minister, said a conference with Luthier, the German chancellor at Aachen, a village near here, where they discussed the negotiations for more than two hours. The result of their conversation is not known. That no agreement was reached is evident from the fact that nothing further has been done toward solving the question.

French Tools Arrive.
 The situation is likely to be further complicated by the arrival yesterday of the Czechs and Poles who will henceforth take part in the deliberations. Since these movements are in the hands of France the presence of their representatives here is a result of the German delegation of the German delegation.

German Foreign Minister, Stresemann insisting more strongly than ever upon his demand that nothing be incorporated in the eastern pact which is in any way construed as preventing Germany from seeking recognition of the eastern frontiers from the Czechs and Poles.

British Blows France.
 Nothing is said in the pact that shall deprive the signatories of the right of initiating arbitration treaties between Germany and Poland and Germany and Czechoslovakia. 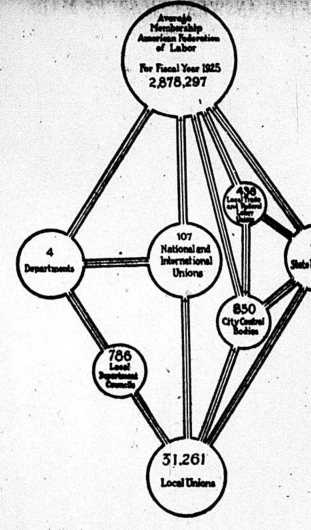

DEATH PENALTY FOR STRIKERS UNDER FASCISM

Crime to Strike; Shop Committees Banned

(Special to The Daily Worker)
 Rome, Oct. 8.—The fascist dictatorship took the most extreme position yesterday when the grand council of the fascist in secret session agreed that the decree establishing compulsory arbitration of industrial disputes should provide that strikes are crimes punishable by death.

This follows the "agreement" between the confederation of fascist unions, supposed to have 400,000 members, and the confederation of industry, which embraces almost all employers of labor in Italy, that no other organization would be recognized as dead or with but the fascist unions.

Other Unions Outlawed.
 This outlawing of the reformist unions is a terrible blow at their social leadership which had tried to conciliate fascism in practice while opposing it abstractly, and had recently fought against the Communist who wanted the unions to wage militant struggle against Mussolini's rule.

The socialist leaders are now forced to surrender completely, factories or adopt the methods proposed by the Communist.

While workers are not forbidden to belong to other than fascist unions, they shall have no legal standing and cannot get a hearing on their demands from the employers. The new decree punishing strikes with death is but the further step to drive all labor into the confederation of fascist unions and to make these unions strike-proof by terrorism.

Abolish Shop Committees.
 The agreement between the fascist unions and the bourgeois industrialists, which shall establish the present shop committees, which hitherto have been elected by secret ballot of all workers in each factory. They are supposed to be abolished completely and their place taken by the fascist unions, which are headed by the fascist union. The workers are to have no voice in choosing their shop committees.

RIFF TROOP REMOVAL ALLOWS ADVANCE OF FRENCH AND SPANISH

Charge Wall Street Is Pro-German

FEZ, French Morocco, Oct. 8.—Abd-El-Krim's maneuver of removing his troops from the eastern section north of Kifana to the positions west of Bizane and toward Tetuan has left the French troops without opposition in marching north to reach a juncture with the Spanish troops from Alzai-Midar.

By this advance the combined imperialist armies will occupy several thousand square miles neither had ever before been able to hold down, and shortens the front to run in a straight line southwest and northeast of Adzir. The advance is quick owing to the unusual advantage of two good roads running north from Kifana.

GERMAN-SOVIET LOAN RILES U. S. MANUFACTURERS

Charge Wall Street Is Pro-German

(Special to The Daily Worker)
 RIGA, Latvia, Oct. 8.—Representatives of several big American manufacturers, busily engaged in negotiations with the representatives of the Soviet Republic's cooperative organization were thrown into a panic yesterday when the Soviet trade delegation suddenly broke off negotiations in orders from Moscow.

Expect More Loans.
 Reports from Stockholm, commissioner of finance of the Soviet Union, had wired such instructions with the information that the German Reichsbank had granted the Soviets 75,000,000 marks (\$12,700,000) for the purchase of American goods.

The American manufacturers are indignant and don't hesitate to tell the world that they place all the blame on New York banks, who refuse to finance trade with Baltic ports, forcing American manufacturers to require cash down in New York and consequently losing all the trade, while the New York banks are loaning money to Germany at high rates, thus allowing Germany to grab all the trade Russia offers by the out American trade with American money.

Manufacturers Sore.
 The manufacturers are laying siege to the consulates in the Baltic region demanding that Washington be told in treated forms of what the manufacturers call the "pro-German" policy of Wall Street.

Unless the United States government calls a halt on the bankers, the manufacturers say America will lose out entirely in the Russian and Baltic markets, and lose mainly to German firms, whose loans from America allow them to keep big stocks of goods in Baltic ports for sale to Soviet Russia.

 A \$300,000,000 coal merger, backed principally by Chicago capital was announced in the purchase by the Hon. Air Force and Iron corporation of the properties of the Tennessee Consolidated Coal company and the Chattanooga Coke and Gas company.

Oppose Registering of Aliens
 STEPHEN EXCHANGE PIER, Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 8.—The "craze" for the protection of foreign-born workers waged since the war by progressive elements in the labor movement here has fruitless today when the A. F. of L. convention was forced to go on record against the so-called law registering of aliens and against deportation laws that would deprive of citizenship alien workers engaged in industrial disputes.

There was no opposition when the recommendation was made by delegate Thomas F. Platten of the Ohio Clerks, reporting for the committee on legislation that the fight against this legislation should be continued in the 69th congress, but meets in December the proposition was passed unanimously.

The proposed legislation affects workers who are alien as grown up. The "open shop" sponsors of the proposed law insist that it is not an attempt to take away the people of the nation not only alien, thus establishing a gigantic spy system, but an attempt to take away the rights of the alien.

This legislation was denounced as "anti-alien" by the committee on breaking and union crushing, establishing the government as a huge detective agency spying over the workers.

Thomas Johanson secretary of the Irish branch and member of the Transport Workers' Union addressed the convention today as fraternal delegate from the Irish workers' movement speaking with "Comrades and Fellow Trade Unionists." This is the first time that the Irish workers had a fraternal delegate at an A. F. of L. convention.

Platten urged that the A. F. of L. send a delegate to Ireland. He carefully avoided all disputed issues, especially the tax on applied for by the how the historic river Shannon was being harnessed to provide light and power.

President Green pleaded the A. F. of L. to help the Irish labor movement by their possible support of the convention voted to uphold its policy of exclusion of Catholics to help the sale tax as an effort to take action of the rich and put it on poor shoulders.

SHIPPING BOARD TAKES SLAP AT PRES. COOLIDGE

another 'Teapot Dome' Scandal Looms

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 8.—The United States shipping board, long in the limelight for its part in the oil scandal, today took a direct slap at the president yesterday by removing Admiral Hugh A. Green, chief of the board, from the emergency fleet corporation. Palmer is personally selected by Coolidge to head the corporation, which is to be organized to build a fleet of 100 ships.

Green, 61, was removed from the fleet corporation, was elected at the same session to take a place of Palmer.

Climax of Long Squabble. This action of the shipping board, the director of the board, after a long struggle against the efforts of a Coolidge administration to centralize the government of the board, under the chairmanship of the labor factor, O'Connor, has taken a position which has been long held by the board, and which Coolidge has steadfastly refused to accept. The board's estimate of its position has been that his action, Palmer, as the agent of the executive of the government had full authority to remove Green.

This attitude of Coolidge caused the shipping board to openly oppose the removal of Green. A crisis was reached on Thursday when a majority of the members of the board made public a resolution which demanded that Coolidge, in an effort to overcome the veto, appointed H. G. Dalton, of Cleveland, Ohio, to investigate the situation and report to him. A conference was held between the president and Admiral Palmer, Admiral Green, a prominent member of the board and Chairman O'Connor, as well as other members of the board. Instead of battling the opposition of the majority of the board, a resolution was introduced which appointed a committee to investigate the charges of impeachment, and his Cleveland appointment completely ignored.

It is an open secret that the administration regards the shipping board as an obnoxious power designated to it and that the Coolidge supporters in the next congress will wish the question of both houses for decisive answers.

The administration has endeavored to carry out certain lines attributed to President Coolidge with respect to the management of the merchant fleet, which represents government property worth \$35,000,000, with many implications in all parts of the world, and it is properly coordinated under the direction of men who will obey the will of the republican machine who wish many soft political jobs for its faithful.

Following the removal of Admiral Green as president of the fleet corporation, the resignation of the co-president, Sidney Henry, in charge of the corporation's finances, has been accepted and members of the board do not conceal the fact that the removal of Green is a move to centralize the management of the fleet under the control of a miniature 'Teapot Dome.'

Palmer, who with Mrs. Coolidge is making back to Washington on a special train will administration officials are expected to be desperately trying to avert a storm.

DOUBLE-CROSSING COMPANY DOCTOR GIVEN SETBACK

Hospital Fees Prevent Him Aiding Bosses

(By Worker Correspondent)

LITTLE ROCK, Arkansas, Oct. 1.—The "company doctor" double-crossed on many an injured worker as the amount to be paid him in the district of the company of Arkansas in the case of a worker who was killed on the Missouri Pacific railroad.

He paid the hospital assessment of \$100 to the Little Rock, Missouri Pacific Hospital Association. When he was injured he agreed with the claim agent of the company to go to St. Louis and be examined as to the extent of his injury by the chief surgeon of the association's hospital there, with a view to agreeing on a sum of money in settlement.

After the examination, however, the worker could not agree with the claim agent of the association's hospital, so he entered suit for damages against the company. Then came the St. Louis hospital association, which was the protest of the worker's attorney, the judge allowed the doctor to testify against the worker.

The argument of the worker's attorney, now upheld by the state supreme court, was that the doctor was bound, under the law which subjects communications made by a patient to his physician, from testifying against the patient—the point being that the doctor was the doctor employed by the worker, not by the railroad company. It being held that the hospital fee collector from all the patients who broke off by the company to the hospital association, made the doctor the personal physician of the "company doctor" paid by Workers.

The court held that it made no difference whether the worker's claim agent was to be examined. The hospital was sustained by contributions from the workers, and all physicians and surgeons under pay by the association were physicians and surgeons to the workers, not to the railroad company.

After his examination, he wished to refuse the terms of settlement offered by the claim agent, that was his right, even though he had also intended to receive treatment by the surgeons. He did not admit the testimony of the "company doctor."
