According to the latest news dispatches, the coal operators are gathering for a war pow wow to smash the Jacksonville pact. ENNISKILLEN, Ireland .- (By Mail) -In the mountainous region of Fshnadarragh, in South Fermanagh, farmers and their families in 27 townlands are in a desperate plight owing to the complete failure of the potato and oat crops, and the want of fuel.

The whole area is famine stricken For the past three weeks, hundred's of people have been enduring the pangs of hunger, and some of them would have died of sheer starvation were it not for the efforts of a local relief committee and the kindness of some shopkeepers, who continue to supply them with food on credit.

In the best of seasons the district is poor and barren, and there is very little employment for agricultural laborers. The farms range from five to al!" the workers howled from the fifteen acres in size, and are, therefore, uneconomic. Most of the land is of the very worst quality-wet, bogsy, and unproductive, and can be worked only with the spade.

Terrible Plight.

In 1923, there was a very poor potato crop, and last year both the potato and oat crops were a total failure. Pig-feeding had to be altogether abandoned owing to the scarcity of feeding stuffs, and many owners were obliged to sell their cattle to procure food for themselves and their fami-



Diplomacy in Overalls Puts Recognition Issue Clearly to Cal's Crowd

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL

TODAY, the Coolidge administration at Washington, bending toward the recognition of Soviet Russia, studies a declaration by C. G. Rakovsky, representative of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics in Great Britain, as follows:

"That under no circumstances, at no price, can we consent that our country, that our Union, which was created by the greatest Revolution the world had ever seen, and at the price of innumerable sacrifices, that this country, which we are determined shall be a Land of Promise for its free tolling masses . . . should ever be transformed into a European China.

"There will be no difficulty in coming to an agreement once the other countries recognize this fact, and are prepared to bargain with with us as equals with equals."

There is no duplicity about this Soviet diplomacy that talks straight from the shoulder. Rakovsky made his declaration in the open,-to the great gathering of the All-Union Congress of Teachers, at Moscow. Rakovsky unveiled before the teachers the duplicitous face of capitalist diplomacy.

Rakovsky showed that the foreign offices of the imperialist nations were continually prating about the payment of the czarist debts and Bolshevik propaganda. He must have had Washington in view, since these issues have been the keystone of the American capitalist attack on Soviet rule. Rakovsky laughs at these two question as being responsible for the timidity, in Washington, and other capitals, to fully recognize the Bolshevik power and open full trade relations with the Soviet Union. Instead Rakovsky says:

"The real reason for this was essentially the unwillingness to recognize the Soviet Union as an equal, independent state, the desire to subject her to the same fate as Germany, to apply to the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics some such scheme as that of the Dawes

There is the issue ably set forth. World imperialism opposed Soviet rule from the start. At first the great imperlalists, busy fighting the kaiser, thought Soviet rule would fall in its first weeks, or months. It didn't fall. Then military intervention was resorted to. Armies were hurled against every Soviet frontier. But they were hurled back in defeat. Now this latest offensive the diplomatic war against Soviet Russia in an effort to Chinafy it by crushing it under the weight of some Morgan-Dawes plan.

The defeating of this offensive was the great achievement for Sovie rule during 1924, when more capitalist nations were forced to recognize the Workers' Republic than in all its previous existence. The greatest victory was the forcing upon the MacDonald labor government, in England, of treaties recognizing the "complete economic and political independence of the U.S.S.R."

That is the basis on which France was brought into line; it is the basis on which negotiations will be resumed with the present Baldwin tory government in England; it is the proposition that the Soviet diplomats put on the top of the table for Morgan's lackey statesmen at Washington to ponder over. This is not only the shirt sleeves diplomacy that Roosevelt liked to talked about It is two-fisted working class diplomacy that has a wallop behind it that makes five-sixths of the world, still under capitalist sway, stagger before the one-sixth under Workers' rule.

Rakovsky explained the basis for further victory this year when he told the Soviet school teachers that:

"If you want us to pursue a right line in international policy make it possible for us to do so by strengthening the internal position of the U. S. S. R. Do what you can to develop the productive forces of the country. Raise the cultural level of our peasantry. Create an irresistible base and rear force for our diplomacy and then it will undoubtedly win further successes in 1925."

Thus Soviet Russia carries the truth about its struggle to its own masses of workers and farmers.

In its attitude against Soviet Russia, the American government has depended for its strength upon the most deliberate, carefully planned and costly propaganda campaign of lies and misrepresentation that the world has yet seen. The truth, supported by the enlightened power of labor,

FIGHT BILL TO **DEPORT ALIENS** BY WHOLESALE

Foreign-Born Workers Subject to Espionage

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.-The American Civil Liberties Union announces a united campaign to defeat the house bill "opening wide the doors to deportation of aliens." Many trade unions, societies and liberal groups are supporting the union in its war on the bill H. R. 11794 which passed the house last week and is coming before the senate immigration com-

Demand Public Hearing

A public hearing is demanded by the union in a formal request and similar demands have been made by the other organizations interested. The bill changes the present deportation law, giving the department of labor power to deport for alleged cause ANY ALIEN "at any time after entering the United States, instead of within three to fire years" as at

"The dangers of this bill are incalculable," says the Liberties Union in a formal statement. "It is not part of a general immigration bill. It does not deal with quotas or other regulations for the admission of aliens. It deals solely and specifically with the expulsion of aliens who are already in this country, no matter how long they may have been here. The bill opens the doors to deportation in many cases for trivial or technical reasons and sujects every alien to espionage and intimidation. None can feel secure with these provisions in

Innocent Workers Convicted

"Any alien convicted of an offense for which he is sentenced to imprisonment for a term of one year or more, is liable to deportation, instead of as at present those convicted of an offense involving moral turpitude committed within five years after entry. The courts frequently convict innocent persons, especially so when they are aliens.

"Aliens frequently get one year sentences for very slight offenses. Two small penalties amounting together to 18 months, also are grounds for deportation. This bill violates the constitutional provision against an expost facto application of a law. It makes deportation retroactive on alians who have been here long before the drafting of the bill."
