FINNISH BUREAU UNANIMOUSLY ELECTED: FOR BOLSHEVIZATION

The conference of the Finnish section of the Workers (Communist) Party opened last Sunday and closed its work on Thursday night with the unanimous election of a bureau of 13 members and an appeal to the membership of the Finnish section for loyal and energetic support of the bolshevization of the party thru reorganization.

The convention, which had on Tuesday unanimously accepted the unity resolution of the Central Executive Committee, discussed the various problems of the Finnish section in relation to the work of reorganization during the intervening days. Resolutions were adopted for the guidance of the branches of the Finnish section in relation to the membership coming into the shop nuclei and street nuclei and the work of the workers' clubs. The latter is an important problem for

the Finnish section, in view of the fact that most of the branches maintain large headquarters, halls, which are the center of social, dramatic and athletic activities for the membership. The problems in connection with these phases of the activi-ty of the organization have been solved in such a way as to lay the foundation in building even a stronger movement among the Finnish workers and at the same time drawing the membership into the work of the party thru the shop nuclei and street nuclei.

NUMBER CAUGHT BY RAGING FIRE MAY REACH 60; RESCUE SQUADS FEAR ALL DEAD FROM BLACK DAMP

(Special to The Daily Worker)

BOULDER, Colo., Dec. 4.—Twenty-five miners are entombed in the Cardinal mine, 18 miles south of here with little hope entertained of their being rescued alive, according to a report reaching here at noon today.

The men were trapped when fire caused by defective wiring blocked the exits.

A later report states that the number now believed caught in the mine was between forty and sixty. The danger to the entombed men lies in the fact that

the fire is raging in the tunnel, which is a mile and half long may draw out all the air, causing fatal "black damp."

It is thru this entrance that rescue if rescue is possible, must be made and little hope is expressed that an entrance can be gained until late tonight.

Rescue Crews Arrive.

The fire starting between 8 and 8:30 this morning was soon beyond control of the men working at the mouth of the mine and alarms were sent to Nederland and Boulder for assitance. Superior, Colo., another mining town responded to appeals for help, rushing a mine rescue car stationed at that point to Boulder where they will be rushed by high powered automobiles to the scene of the disaster.

Fire Chief Healy of Denver im mediately rushed a crew equipped with gas masks and fire fighting equipment to the stricken mine. More than 300 miners from adjoining camps have been organized into rescue squads.

All Shut Off.

The compressor and fan houses, the latter supplying fresh air for the tunnel was completely destroyed at a loss estimated between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

The working crew of the Cardinal tunnel, which is a gold and silver mine, is composed of sixty men, ac cording to information received from Nederland. Whether all of these men were in the mine at the time of the fire could not be learned.

William Bryant, a miner who was at the mouth of the tunnel when the blaze started was badly burned.

So far as can be learned there has peen no explosion in the tunned and officials are holding out hope that the men possibly are still alive.



GUILTY UNDER SEDITION LAW

Prosecutor Plays on Jury's Prejudices

BY ELLA REEVE BLOOR. (I. L. D. Press Service.)

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 4 .- The jury in the case of Edward Horacek, active member of Machinist's Union here charged with a violation of the Pennsylvania state sedition law, found Horacek guilty on counts seven and eight of the indictment, charging him with the distribution of literature, etc., and of membership in a party tending to teach sedition etc., after it had been "deading" one and a half hours. He was found not guilty on all other counts: Bail has been renewed for Horacek and the case will be appealed to a higher court.

Fight to Higher Court.

The case of the other eight who are also charged with wiolation fo the same law will not come up until the Horacek case has been fought in the highest court of the country.

The jury which tried Horacek was composed of a number of aged women, a foreman, and business men. The personnel of the jury was published in an earlier issue of The DAILY WORK-

Plays on Prejudices.

The prosecutor in the trial of Edward Horacek, accused of a violation of the state sedition act, made a most inflamatory speech before the jury denouncing the "reds", Bolsheviks, the Russian revolution and Lenin, playing on the prejudices of the jury to return a verdict of guilty. Thruout his entire speech he made a grand stand play to the jury on their 100 per cent

In referring to Horacek, he launched on a tirade, declaring that if he did not like America, he could go back to Bohemia where he had dome from and that Horacek would never receive the enormous salary in Bohemia that he was now receiving.

Workers Party on Trial.

Following the display of ignorance by the prosecutor, Judge Prather in his instruction to the jury, said that the burden of the proof lays on the programs of the Workers Party as to whether admitted membership in the Workers Party means advocacy of sedition. He also instructed the jury to examine what the Communist International was and the relation of the Workers Party to the Communist International. In his instructions the judge actually placed in the hands of the jury the question of deciding whether or not the Workers Party is illegal or not. It is not so much a trial of Horacek as it is of the Work-

TODAY, American capitalism again demonstrates to its rival, British capitalism, that it is by far the stronger of the two. This voracious beast that travels the world over, to satiate its profit hunger, snaps its challenge to the lean lion in London, that no nation must dare oppose America.

When Great Britain reached an agreement to pay its war debt to the United States and then, with a great show of courage, returned to the gold standard, that was a challenge to new struggles in the world's commercial rivalry.

But the bold front of the British suffers another setback. London has been compelled to increase its rediscount rate, at one jump, from four to five per cent, in order to stop "the empire" being bled of its gold. The increase iin the bank rate was made absolutely necessary by the heavy drains on anemic British capitalism. The outflow has aggregated more than \$933,000,000 since the Bank of England reduced its rate to four per cent last October, while its gold reserve is \$48,500,000 lower than when England returned to the gold standard last April. The British must therefore close their gates against the exit of this precious basis for their currency. But that only weakens British imperialism in its fight for foreign markets, in its attempted "conquests of peace" over other nations, that are now compelled to turn their exclusive attention once more to the United States as the sole creditor nation.

As if to taunt the British lion, Wall Sreet refuses to advance its rediscount rate by even a fraction. It is indicated that the order to make no change, altho this could easily be done and had in fact been announced, came directly from Secretary of the Treasury "Andy" Mellon, chief spokesman of the American dollar in Coolidge's cabinet. The American bank rate remains at 31/2 per cent, a full 11/2 per cent below the British.

Thus England, altho she may parade as the chief instigator of Locarno "security" pacts against Soviet Rule, is nevertheless the helpless puppet of American capitalism.

The weekly report of the federal reserve system for the

New York district shows that in spite of the wild wave of speculation and the giant loans made, yet the total loans of the New York bank have declined \$4,924,000. Reserves and deposits at New York increased \$3,565,000 and \$14,236,000, respectively during the past week.

This is the power that the possession of one-half of the world's gold supply—\$4,500,000,000 out of \$9,000,000,000 gives to American finance. It was necessary to force the Locarno compact upon the capitalist nations of Europe, so that the American gold surplus would not only find a safe and "peaceful" spot for investment, but also an opportunity to collect the interest on the investments made. Of course, this ncessitates the enforcement of "industrial peace", within the various nations, resulting in an alliance between the American dollar and the different national governments to keep the workers in servile submission to the bitter exploitation forced upon them in order that the demands of the American shylocks may be satisfied.

Thus British capitalism, with the various national ca-

pitalisms upon the continent, may be helpless in the grip of Wall Street rule. But beyond lies the as yet slumbering power of the discontented and revolutionary workers, who are developing strength to tear down not only the dreams of Britain's Lombard Street, of the French Bourse and the financial districts of the European capitals, but of New center of finance as well. And back of these battling revolutionary workers stands the power of the workers and peasants of the Soviet Union, the bulwark of the world revo-

At this writing the United States may furnish the world with its dominant imperialism. But the awakening of the oppressed everywhere will result in the creation of a power against which even the American dollar cannot stand, but before which its rule must collapse and fall.

the first step toward bolshevization in relation to the reorganization of the party and make the large Finnish membership a loyal part of the bolshevized party. This manifesto is a ringing declaration against the tendencies in some quarters of the Finnish section, expressed particularly in the Minneapolis resolution, which took a position against reorganization. The Minneapolis resolution and those responsible for it, Severi Alanne, Vilho Bowman, and others, were unanimously condemned.

Co-operate With C. E. C.

The seventeen delegates, together with the editors and business managers of the Finnish papers, who constituted the convention, worked in close co-operation with the representatives of the Central Executive Committee, Comrades Ruthenberg, Cannon and Lovestone, during the whole period of the convention. All the delegates expressed the belief that the results of the convention will be closer co-operation in all phases of the party work by the Finnish member-

Comrade Ruthenberg addressed the convention just before adjournment, summarizing the work of the five-days session as follows:

We will work together in building up a powerful Communist Party in the United States which, in the days to come, will be able to meet the capitalist enemies in open battle and win the struggle for the Soviet Republic in the United States."

world capitalism. The complete defeat of the European proletariat and the colonial peoples would then inevitably follow. The German bourgeoisie had sold itself to the highest bidder.

W. (France) declared that America had played a decisive role in the preparation of the Locarno pact. America is interested in a pacification of Europe in order to secure its loans, she is also interested in securing Germany against the offensive of French imperialism. England is striving to make an end of the French ascendancy upon the continent and Locarno represents a success for her in this policy. The French bourgeoisie is in retreat. The German bourgeoisie accepted the pact under the double pressure of Anglo-American capitalism. Locarno is responsible for illusions of a pacifist nature both in Germany and in France, Germany received no concessions in Locarno. England's aim is to alienate Germany and Russia. The Locarno pact demands a speedier establishment of the united front of the working class.

A Polish comrade declared that the Locarno pact and the coming entrance of Germany into the league of nations means certain advantages for Germany, particularly in the question of the eastern frontiers.

For Eight-Hour Day.

Comrade Heckert and Comrade Piquemal spoke upon the eight-hour day and the Washington agreement. Heckert declared that the Washington agreement was a maneuver on the part of the bourgeoisie to appease the working class. The ratification and the carrying out of the agreement by the bourgeoisie is being sabotaged by the reformists. The speaker described the abolition of the eight-hour day in Germany and the attitude of the Amsterdam Trade Union International to the question. He spoke further of the English trade union movement and its struggle for the maintenance of the eight-hour day and for the unity of the trade union movement. The Communists must place themselves at the head of the struggle for the eight-hour day, they must take part with all possible energy in the campaign for the eight-hour day from Nov. 15 to December 15. We must however, make it clear to the workers that only the mass struggle of the proletariat can bring about an improvement in the conditions of work.

The Cyclops sailed from South America ln March 1918, with a cargo of manganese. He had aboard 290 persons, officers, passengers and crew Nothing more was ever heard of her. She disappeared as completely as if a magic hand had brushed her from the world, leaving not one trace of her going.

The seas were combed, ports were searched, every clue followed intently, but never a trace was found of her, not even a spar of a drifting life preserver.

For some years, it was suggested that a German submarine had sent the collier to her doom, or that she had struck a submerged mine. Inquiries were conducted in Germany after war, but no German sub commander could be found who could throw any light on the mystery.

Yesterday her sister ship, the Orion, sailed out of the Roads with a cargo of coal. Her structure buckled in a heavy sea and she raced back to port with her forward tanks flooded and almost sinking.

The same defect, some officers be lieved today, may have buckled the Cyclop's structure and sent her to Davy Jones' locker.



Pressure on Germany

After several days of conferences between German potash manufacturers and British bankers on one side and the American state department and Wall Street bankers on the other a request for a \$26,000,000 loan for that industry to be floated in the United States was turned down.

The excuse of statesmen at Washington was that the German producers would not guarantee American consumers against a raise in prices. This is palpably camouflage. Finance capital invests in industries for the purpose of deriving monopolistic prices. As Marx well said, one cannot take the opinions of statesmen regarding their governments at their word any more than it is possible to believe what an individual says of himself.

G. B. S. in His Dotage

George Bernard Shaw, fabian scoialist and founder of the "smart aleck" school of literature, is being featured again by the Hearst papers as a renegade Communist. In fact the Chicago Herald-Examiner dubbs him "England's most famous Communist" and then proceeds to speak of his spectacular "about face," thus branding him a renegade and apostle. That is certainly not flattering to Shaw, who never professed to be a Communist.

The Shavian attack upon the Communist International and his infantile babbling against the Soviet Union contains nothing more than the exploded legends woven by the lie factories of the white guard press. He cannot even rise to his customary literary level when he talks of Bolshevik gold to British Communists, the Zinoviev letter and other myths. Shaw, like Wells and other literary fabians, dislikes the Bolsheviks because they refuse to take fabianism seriously. They listen to the advice of the muddle-heads and then follow their

As a novelist and playwright Shaw sometimes exposes the bourgeoisie very well, but when it comes to discussing political subjects his knowledge does not transcend the low level of the Hearst publications that syndicate his fiction as political argument.

The statement now made by the spokesman for the hard coal owners, that they will not accord any further recognition to the union, and a categoric denial of the other points offered by Pinchot as a basis for settlement, places the owners squarely before the miners as determined to wreck their union.

Let it be said now that the accept ance of the Pinchot offer by Lewis and his gang of treasury leeches in the anthracite was a brazen effort to cover up the results of a treacherous policy that has aided the operators against the miners themselves.

Nova Scotia Repeated.

The policy pursued in Nova Scotia -the keeping of maintanence men or the property during the strike, which action aided the "Beast of Besco" to defeat the miners, is again doing the work, this time in the hard coal, where the maintenence men are repairing and caring for the coal com pany property.

This has placed the operators in a position to be able to notify Pinchot and the Lewis gang that they repudiate any offer of settlement on any basis other than their own.

The progressive miners pointed out sometime ago that Lewis must pull out the maintainence men in the anthracite and call a national strike to save the union, and we wenture to say now, that had the union officials done so, the Pinchot proposition would have been more favorable to the miners and would have been gladly accepted by the hard coal owners.
