SQUARE FOR TWO MARTYRS: EXPECT RECORD GATHERING

Remains of Workers to Lie in State Until Wednesday Afternoon

Hundreds of thousands of workers are expected to stream toward Union Square at 5 o'clock today to participate in the funeral demonstration for Sacco and Vanzetti and to protest against their murder.

Following the arrival of the ashes of the two murdered workers at the Grand Central station at 5:15, a guard of honor headed by Mrs. Sacco, Luigia Vanzetti and Powers Hapgood, young militant mine leader and Harvard graduate, will bear the remains of two workers to Union Sq.

Despite the determination of Police Commissioner Warren not to permit a funeral parade in honor "of a couple of murderers who were convicted and executed according to law," thousands of workers will march from the Square to the Stuyvesant Casino, Ninth street and Second avenue, where the ashes of the two martyrs will be borne. The ashes will lie in state at the Casino until Wednesday noon under a twenty-four hour guard of honor.

FRENCH LABOR PROTEST AGAINST LEGION FORCES AMERICANS HOME

PARIS, Aug. 28 .- More than 1,700 Americans who have arrived in France during this week end have re-booked their passage for home, as result of the anti-American Legion demonstrations and the Sacco-Vanzett thruout the whole labor movement protest, according to the Cherbourg correspondent of the Intransigeant. The growing protest of workers against the convention of the American

Legion is rapidly gaining strength and many members of the American Legion are believed to be among those who have left Cherbourg.

BOSTON, Aug. 28 .- Fully a quarter of a million workers, drawn from the great industrial districts of Boston and vicinity, stood in intermittently falling rain, viewing the mighty funeral demonstration held here today in honor of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, international labor's martyrs.

Thousands of the more courageous workers battled with the police for the right to walk in the funeral procession itself, to participate in "The March of Sorrow."

Repeated clashes with the army of Cossacks under the direction of Superintendent of Police Michael Crowley took place on the way to the Forest Hills Crematory, where the remains of Sacco and Vanzetti were reduced to ashes with the most simple program possible.

MOSCOW, Aug. 28 .- Pravda, in commenting upon the legalized mur-der of Sacco and Vanzetti points out that when the growing indignation of the working class against the regime of the bourgeoisie and the bourgeois democratic dictatorship burst forth the capitalist class, with the assistance of the social democrats, tries to divert the workers attention from the threatening questions of revolutionary struggle and substitute therefore other questions that lead the toilers astray. American Labor Has Many Allies to Aid War Against Sacco-Vanzetti Slavers

By J. LOUIS ENGDAHL.

THE murder of Sacco and Vanzetti by the American ruling class is arousing strenuous and unprecedented protest by workers the world over. No martyrdom of a spokesman of labor, in the world's entire history, has evoked such demonstrations against the social system that ordered the sentence of death, as have taken place during the past week, that still continue.

Several factors are contributing to this historic development in the class struggle.

Sacco and Vanzetti were slain by the dominant imperialism in the world-the capitalist government of the United States.

There is hardly a worker or farmer, anywhere in the world, that has not some grievance against this American imperialism.

For the workers of all Latin America, the seven years' prison torture inflicted upon Sacco and Vanzetti, terminated by the savage death penalty carried out against them in the electric chair, merley crystallized their own years of misery under the "dollar diplomacy" of the Wall Street hangmen. To them, a voice raised against thelegalized assassination of Sacco and Vanzetti, is a protest against the blood bath visited by American military forces upon the peoples of Nicaragua; a protest against the looting and plundering of all Latin American countries.

For the workers of Europe, the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti, visualized sharply the dollar kaiserdom that has been aiding every European reaction in suppressing labor's efforts to rise. The murder of Sacco and Vanzetti parallels the murder of workers in Germany under the Dawes Plan, the slaughter of labor in Italy under the Wall Street financed fascism of Mussolini, the suffering resulting from the Hoover-aided overthrow of the Hungarian Soviet Republic, the misery upheld by American financial aid to the reaction in the Baltic states and the Balkans, especially in Poland and Roumania.

To the workers and peasants of the Union of Soviet Republics, the murder of Sacco and Vanzetti makes more apparent than ever the new war danger. They can see in it not only an increasing oppression of the workers in the United States, but also American imperialist participation in and leadership of the developing attack against the First Workers' Republic.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 28 .- The capture of Nanking by the Shantungese war lord Sun Chuan-fang is eategorically denied here by military authorities.

The troops formerly commanded by Chiang Kai-shek, who resigned two weeks ago, have taken over both the Shanghai-Hankow and the Shanghai-Nanking Railways and have repaired the breaks in them, local native newspapers claim.

Nanking was the seat of the right wing "government" set up by Chiang thruout China and the world to re-Kai-shek after his betrayal of the Kuomintang. Police Seek to Terrorize Paris as Thousands Are Seized in Raids

MANY WORKERS HELD IN JAIL AS AMERICAN LEGION COMES

Charge Poincaré Government Plans More **Drastic Measures**

PARIS, Aug. 28 .- While the frightened Poincaré government is doing everything in its power to counteract the fury of the French workers against the celebration for the American Legion in Paris, it is pursuing a policy of ruthless terrorism against all workers as a result of the Sacco and Vanzetti demonstrations here last week.

THOUSANDS HELD ON FAKE CHARGES.

Orders to hunt down radical working men and their leaders relentlessly have been issued to the French secret service by Albert Sarraut, the minister of the interior. Hundreds of workers have been seized merely for the possession of weapons or for having identification papers which the French police declare to be invalid. Thousands of workers in the provinces are being hunted out and arrested on charges of being "foreign agitators."

It has been announced that the government is contemplating still more drastic action against the workers in the near future. The raids against the French workers are part of the same campaign which is being conducted against the leaders of the French Communist Party and its organ, l'Humanite, whose acting editor, Vaillant-Couturier, is now threatened with imprisonment on a charge of inciting to riot during the recent Sacco and Vanzetti demonstrations.

POLICE INFEST PARIS.

The Communist Deputy, Marty, who is now serving a term in solitary confinement deprived of all privileges, for alleged attempts to cause mutiny among the soldiers, will also be prosecuted again under the new offensive.

Police terrorism is visible on the streets as hundreds of armed mounted and foot gendarmes patrol the boulevards. The United States embassy is still heavily guarded. and every measure is being taken to prevent the flight of the American tourists from Paris which was threatened after the first Sacco and Vanzetti processions.

Special precautions are being taken to make the stay of the American Legion comfortable. President Poincare has announced that he will attend most of the Legion ceremonies altho he had originally planned to be present only at the official dinner of reception.

A group of officers important in the American Legion, headed by James Barton, national adjutant, have laid a wreathe oz the grave of France's unknown soldier as a final touch to the "purification" farce which followed the framed up "desecration" by the Reds during the Sacco and Vanzetti demonstration.

Since the bodies of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were taken to the undertaking parlor of Joseph Lagone in the north end of Boston, over 40,000 workers are estimated to have viewed their remains

A conspiracy by the Boston police department made it impossible to obtain a large hall where the bodies could lie in state. Owners of halls in the city were warned not to rent their establishments.

The earth which received them must be emancipated from the slavery of capitalism. The crime must be revenged, and the necessary conduct must be a tenacious fight against bloody capitalism."
