SHANGHAI, Sept. 23.—Recent reports warrant the following conclusions concerning the position of the revolutionary armies of Yeh-ting and Ho-lung. The advance of these armies thru Fukien towards Kwantung has aroused the revolutionary enthusiasm of the peasants in the Chaichow-Meikiang district where there has been an outbreak of peasant revolts.

The detachments of peasants have kiang, Chaochow and Fukshan. BOOK TRUST SEEN AS HUGE MERGER IS COMPLETED

\$5,000,000 Annual Trade By Doubleday, Doran

Eight publishing companies and subsidiaries are included in the merger just completed between Doubleday, Page & Co., and Doran & Co., of this city.

Both firms, notoriously non-union, have been fighting any attempt at organization of printers and other workers for many years, and one of the reasons for the removal of Doubleday, Page & Co., to Garden City, L. I., was an attempt to continue its open-shop character.

Over five million dollars a year in trade is involved in the new combine, and the merger is seen as a step in the greater trustification of the book publishing business, ultimately exercising a virtual censorship over the entire book field.

The Doubleday concern realized an enormous profit from the publication in 1906 of "The Jungle," by Upton

(Continued from page 1) from that pursued by the Boston Defense Committee.'

Carlo Tresca's speech, while not delivered in time to be printed in this issue of The DAILY WORKER, will be reported in Monday's paper. He is understood to be in agreement with Levine on the necessity of handling the present frame-up of Grecco and Carillo in a manner that will rally the whole working class back of their

The Civic Club's meeting was held at 18 East Tenth street and was presided over by Arthur Warner, editor of The Nation.

What is looked upon by many workers as the beginning of a new Sacco-Vanzetti frame-up is the coming trial on first degree murder charges of two Italian workers who are enemies of fascism and Mussolini's bloody regime in Italy.

They are Calogero Grecco and Donato Carillo who were arrested last Memorial Day charged with murdering two fascists named Joseph Carisi and Nicholas Amorroso. The last two named were members of the Fascist League of North America. When their bodies reached Italy they were given a state funeral by the Italian government.

Dressed With Skull and Bones. When killed they were dressed in the conventional fascist garb, part of which is a black shirt with cross bones and skull inscribed on it. This insignia, it is said, means "Intolerance to the enemy, death to the

Carisi and Amorroso were bound for the headquarters of the Fascist League of North America where they were to join several hundred of their colleagues and march in the Memorial Day parade.

On their way there they engaged in a knife fight with one or possibly two unknown men, who killed them. Held For Murder.

Charged with killing these two supporters of fascism, Grecco and Carillo were arrested and held on murder charges. While they do not resemble in appearance those who fought the Mussolinites, the fact that they are opposed to the existence of the black shirt government is used against class is careful, two more workers will be burned up to satisfy American "justice" and "democracy."

Advanced English (A and B) are for those who can express themselves both orally and in writing, but who wish to perfect their mastery of the language.

The commerce department contem plates a "distribution survey" of the entire country in connection with the 1930 census or shortly thereafter Hoover announced today. Cost Million.

A committee of experts from the ommerce department and the census bureau will consider the project prior to the next session of congress and may recommend legislation for appropriations. Hoover believes that the census would cost about \$1,000,000.



Invent X-Ray Machine Said to Prevent Burns Even if Dentist Crazy


