# Crisis in the Labor Movement and the Fourth Anniversary of Daily Worker

E labor movement confronts risis of so serious a nature, as DAILY WORKER reaches its Fourth Anniversary, that everyone with the interests of the working class at heart is compelled to try and find a correct answer to two ques-

(1) What are the causes of

(2) What must be done to overcome it and to forge the new weak workefful weapon of our class?

What was formerly the strongest union in the labor movement—the United Mine Workers—is being desroyed before our eyes. Six hundred usand men, women and children in the mining sections are being starved, evicted, beaten and jailed by the coal parons and their government.

The strike itself has been outlawed by a whole series of state and fedetal injunctions.

The coal barons declare with the most brutal cynicism that they intend to destroy the United Mine Workers. The government, the courts especially, back the coal barons to the

Other sections of the labor movement have been brought within the scope of injunctions like that in the case of the Bedford Cut Stone Company, upheld by the supreme court, which outlaws the most ordinary nion defense activities.

Other injunctions make strikes il-al if they affect the production of ticles of interstate commerce and, as in West Virginia, injunctions legalize the "yellow dog" contract and sutlaw even attempts to organize workers into unions.

The legal precedents have been established to outlaw all strikes and organization campaigns of any imporance-to make any interference with the open shop a crime.

The open shop has become a recognized American institution enjoying protest. Instead it persecutes, hand the full protection of the government.

Unemployment is already increasing at such a rate, basic industry is slowing down so fast that the big apitalist papers and the special econnancial nanors make little attempt to disguise the seriousness of

the situation. Side by side with this development, which shatters one of the main bases of official labor policy-the fiction of permanent prosperity in the United States-is going on a process of retrustification.

The combinations of capital are becoming larger and more powerful, their grip on government is being riveted with a mighty clutch.

The position of the labor movement is made relatively weaker by the increased centralization of capitalist powers.

Combined with an absolute decrease in numerical strength and with demoralization and corruption having its source in the class cooperation policy flowing like a foul stream thru the unions, poisoning the membership. the labor movement enters the present period of industrial depression. organizationally and morally weak.
