

### 7,000 APPLAUD HERMAN'S WORDS AT HUGE MEETING

(By a Worker Correspondent) KENOSHA, Wis., (By Mail) .-- On Monday evening, June 4, there was scheduled outside of the city hall in Kenosha a monster demonstration of workers. The great gathering of 7,000 workers was organized by the "Committee of 1000" composed of trade unionists and sympathizers. The occasion for the gathering was the presentation of a petition calling upon the city council to prohibit the out-oftown gunmen who are housed inside the Allen-A Co. from continuing to make the mill their sleeping quarters The petition also called for the expulsion from the city of these thugs

Huge Demonstration.


Slowly the "Committee of 1000" marched through the city from the vicinity of the striking hosiery workers' headquarters, with numerous flares lighting up the posters carried by the marchers. Some of them read "The Gunmen Must Go!" "City Council Do Something For the Welfare of the Kenosha People," and "Remove the Gunmen Menace From Our City. At last the parade reached the square around the city hall, where the huge crowd of ten thousand workers had been patiently waiting. Cheers greeted the arrival of the "Committee of 1000." The strikers began to shout their enthusiastic locomotive call: U---N---I---O---N; U--N--I--O--N; U-N-I-O-N, which was greeted by the applause of all workers present. It was then that several workers and strikers began to urge the representative of the Young Workers League of America, Samuel A. Her-

man, to mount a chair and say a few words. They had previously heard him speak at open air meetings arranged by the Young Workers League, Local Kenosha, in the center of the downtown section of the city. The league member mounted a chair and the monster crowd gathered close about.

The league speaker called upon all those present to help the strikers picket the Allen-A Co. whenever they have the opportunity before work, during their lunch hour, or in the evening after through with work. 






Army of Independence Makes New Gains

The republican party came into existence playing a role that was not reactionary-a role that had a revolutionary phase. "Free Soil, Free Speech, Free Labor and Free Man" was inscribed on the banner of the Free Soil party which can more or less be called the father of the republican party. In the year that the convention of left-wing Whigs, Democrats and Free Soldiers at Jackson, Michigan, gave the name "Republican" to the party that was to lead the country through civil war to modern capitalism, many of the same forces were making civil war against the United States government in "Bloody Kansas." The names of John Brown and James H. Lane in Kansas were the "sacred relics" of the republican party.


The republican party played one of the biggest world parts in the bourgeois revolution.
